

Climate change impacts USDA planting zones over time

e all know about climate change and USDA planting zones. Looking at the change in planting zones from 1990 and 2015 provides a stark visual on what is happening in our state. In 1990, the vast majority of the state was in planting zone 5 (5A or 5B). By 2015, the state was primarily zone 6 with the very southern tip of the state moving into zone 7.

These changes mean we have more options for planting than we did in 1990. Less hardy plants will now survive our winters. On the other hand, climate change can be especially hard on native plants, because they were established at a time when our climate was different. The University of Maryland extension warns about the following impacts of planting zone changes on native plants:

- Higher temperatures cause native plants to experience more heat-related stress. Heat stress causes higher water demand, a situation made worse by longer droughts.
- Higher atmospheric carbon dioxide (CO₂) levels preferentially promote the growth
 of invasive plant species, decreasing the space
 needed to support natural areas.
- Elongated growing seasons cause earlier leaf out and bloom times, which in turn affects the animal species synchronized to the life cycles of native plants, especially pollinators.



The latter point, the synchronization of bloom times and pollinators, is cause for concern. In addition, as pointed out above, higher temperatures have occurred along with increased drought. Both factors need to be considered as our gardening methods, plant choices, and garden design evolve.
