Fall Gardening "To-Do" List

- Clear away spent plants and continue deadheading.
- ◊ Plant evergreens, garlic, rhubarb and shallots.
- ◊ Transplant strawberries.
- Divide and plant peonies.
- Harvest cauliflower, potatoes, radishes, rutabagas and tomatoes.
- Prepare forced hyacinths and tulips.
- Winter over begonias and chrysanthemums.
- Plant fall bulbs: tulips, crocus, daffodils and hyacinths are just a few!



Zinnias continue to bloom in our Mini-Park garden in October! Now is a good time to collect seeds from spent blooms.

- Wrap trunks of smooth-barked and young trees with heavy paper or burlap to prevent sunscald and rodent damage.
- Plant or transplant deciduous trees and shrubs; once their leaves have fallen, they're dormant and ready to be planted.
- Protect tender plants from light frosts by covering them overnight with sheets or plastic. Be sure to remove covers very shortly after the sun comes up the next day.
- Put up a birdfeeder for winter so birds will have time to find it before it snows.
- Use a low-voltage electric heater to keep your bird bath "open" all winter.



 After the first killing frost, remove all dead plant debris from the annual beds. (NOTE: See Cindy Cartner's article on page 5 about leaving leaf litter for overwintering pollinators.)

• Also after frost, dig up dahlia tubers, dry and store in a cool, dark place over the winter.

Roses in our Mini-Park garden are blooming for probably the last time before frost. Deadhead roses in October but, in general, it's best to wait until late winter or early spring to prune so there is no new growth as the snow flies.

Horticulture Committee Report

all is upon us. Soon we'll be readying our gardens for their winter rest. A warm blanket of leaves will help newly-planted and established perennials survive drying winds and severe cold temps.

LET'S LEAVE the LEAVES!

Leaf litter and spent material play an important role in the life cycle of butterflies, moths, bees and birds. Many pollinators over-winter in leaf litter, and some use hollow plant stems as nesting sites.



Cleanup in the Mini Park garden will include hostas and annuals zapped by first frost.

Clearwing moths and **Luna moths**, climb down from their host plants and pupate in the soil, forming sturdy cocoons that blend in with the leaf litter. Individuals that pupate late in the season will over-winter beneath the leaves and emerge as adults the following spring.

The **Baltimore Checkerspot** caterpillar over-winters in leaf litter. Near the end of October, fully grown caterpillars that have not yet entered the pupal stage move out of their web and into the leaf litter, where they roll up in leaves and debris to hibernate through the winter.

Mason and **Leafcutter bees** use the hollow stems of previous year's plants, such as Joe Pye Weed for their nests. The solitary female bee provides food in her nest with food for the offspring.

Some can't get past the untidy, yet natural, appearance of leaving the leaves. Those might consider a compromise by clearing debris just from the front yard area gardens, while leaving unseen backyard areas natural.

Mother Nature has a plan, and it's been working fine since day one. Let her work her magic!

mented an additional service for homeowners to fight against identity theft and mortgage fraud, called "Property Check". This new 24/7 service is free to use and allows residents to sign up on the Recorder's website, alerting them whenever a document has been recorded against a specific name or property address. Users create and maintain their

own name list that is cross-checked as each document is recorded in their office. If a matching name entry is found, an email and/or text message is sent out immediately. Recorder's Website at Lakecountyil.gov/Recorder/PropertyCheck.

- Antioch First Fire Protection District, Antioch Township, and the village of Antioch have partnered to bring a free emergency alert system to residents: Hyper-Reach. This telephone-based mass notification system will be used to inform Antioch residents about local emergencies, hazards and other threats: Hyper-Reach is fully operational and ready for Antioch residents to enroll. There are five simple ways to activate Hyper-Reach, Visit hyper-reach.com/ilantiochfiresignup.html.
- Norma reminded us to always be alert in the mall parking lots. Never go to your car if you see a van parked close to your car. Go back into the store and ask for security to take you to your car; they may be hijackers in that van.
