# AGC Plant Sale is May 17

he club's plant/perennial/bake sale is on Saturday, May 17<sup>th</sup> from 10 a.m. to 1p.m. at the Williams Park pavilion, 741 Main St. in Antioch (behind the library). We'll need donations from all club members in the form of annuals, perennials, herbs, indoor houseplants, preserves, books, garden-related items, and volunteer time.

I'd like to know what you'll be bringing so that I can make-up colorful plant IDs. I'll be bringing pots, trays and Craft Stix to the April meeting for you to label your plants. If someone you know has plants to divide, give them pots and arrange for them to bring to bring the potted plants to our sale. Think about dividing and propagating houseplants, starting seedlings and those perennial beds of yours in need of thinning. Try to get your plants into pots by April 18 or so, so they can be established and fill-out their containers.

Sadly, the club doesn't yet have two volunteers to conduct the bake sale that has been so successful in past years. If interested, please contact past organizers Nancy Zitkus or Betty Collins for questions on this easy volunteer position.

Saturday, help is needed for set-up, starting at 8 a.m. You'll deliver the plants at the north side of the pavilion, where you'll park your vehicle. The plants get priced before being placed on the appropriate tables. When the sale begins at 10 a.m., it's a madhouse for an hour, with buyers asking about our plants and seeking advice. We'll tidy and condense tables as the plants disappear. Nancy Colby has arranged a lunch to be delivered during the lull before we wrap it up around 1 p.m., tidy the pavilion and call it a day!

Local beekeeper, Peter Poli, will have a display of his organic honey, soaps, and scented wax products. We receive 10 percent of his profits that day. Please support him, by buying local, and getting the advantage of the kickback to our club. I've also asked a local knife/tool sharpener to attend this year.

When you help, you're bound to pick up new horticulture info and have fun at the same time! Of course you'll be able to shop/set aside plants for yourself. We trust our members to pay after the initial buyers rush subsides.

Mark your calendars, and tell your friends about our sale! There are many competing plant sales in May. We know that locally-nurtured plants will survive and thrive in our
