Plant Sale

Saturday, May 14, 2022

Yikes, our Plant Sale on Saturday, May 14, is right around the corner now. Finally, let's get into the fresh spring air and do some diggin'! Bring your potted houseplants, herbs, veggies and perennials in containers wiped-clean. ID craftstix labeled with ultra-fine markers should include:

Name of plant, common and/or horticulture

Sun requirements (full sun, part shade, shade)

Color (blooms) and height of plant, bloom time

Please write on only 1 side of the craftstix. We'll put the price on the opposite side.

IMPORTANT: If you suspect/know that your soil has jumping worms, PLEASE do not bring them to our Sale! AGC cannot be the source of this invasive pest to our buyers.

Baked goods can be packaged in smaller lots, possibly in plastic deli boxes. Donate clean, gently-used garden-related books, planters, and garden décor.

No plastic pots, please.

Deliver your plants/items to the north side of the Williams Park pavilion, where we'll park our cars. The south entrance will be for the public to line up. Deliver plants from 8-9:30 a.m., no later. Much work needs to be accomplished before the 10 a.m. stampede. We'll need "all hands on deck!"

You can select plants for yourselves. Store them in your vehicles, and be trusted to pay the cashier once the big rush subsides. (Full price if taken before noon, when ½ price takes effect.) Do not walk past the public with purchases as they wait in line for us to open.

We'll cover the picnic tables with tablecloths first.

ID signs will be attached to the tables (sun, hostas, etc.).

Plants will be priced and delivered to the proper tables.

Plant ID descriptions will be placed into pots.

A brief meeting/group photo takes place at 9:50 a.m.

I'll have green aprons available to wear.

PLEASE <u>bring your red wagons/carts to assist buyers</u> with multi-pot purchases. (Sort of like a purse - the more room you have the more you'll stuff into it ...) Wagons/carts are needed to transport plants from arrival to the proper tables and to buyers' cars.

These plants come from our local soil and growing conditions, so they will more easily adjust and flourish in their new homes. Save some of YOUR plant dollars for our sale. I'm hoping a local beekeeper will again be there to give 10% of his profits to our club, so please stock up. **And don't forget, there will be a knife and tool sharpener!** Come and enjoy the camaraderie, knowledge, and enthusiasm of your fellow gardeners.

present and voting shall be required for passage-a quorum being present.

Disposition of funds:

Total assets shall be liquidated after pay-

ment of just debts, those remaining funds shall be allocated to other philanthropic organizations to be determined by members in attendance.

No portion of such funds shall be distributed among individual members.

Proven Winners very graciously gave us 40 copies of "The Gardener's Idea Book," free to take.


