

Chris provided extensive documentation to Parks & Recreation indicating all the garden club does and contributes to the village. One of our more impressive contributions is our service volunteer hours, based on approximately \$35 per hour, generated approximately \$93,100 for the past year. Their response was the fees will be implemented for private rentals (birthday parties, etc). What is Horticulture?

orticulture is the science and art of growing plants. Horticulture can be practiced on a smaller, personal scale with home gardening. It involves plant propagation, soil management, landscape design, and the care and cultivation of plants for food, beauty, and environmental benefits.



Horticulture's Role in Contemporary Society

Antioch Garden Club supports urban gardening and community gardens that have become increasingly popular. AGC provides colorful plants, maintaining them in small spaces in our village.

AGC works with the Village of Antioch combining resources to improve the aesthetics of underutilized public space. The village allows AGC to design, plant, and maintain five public areas. Combined with the village's own landscaped areas, the AGC-maintained areas offer a touch of nature not usually seen in a small village. AGC plants annuals and perennials for the benefit of the viewer to enjoy. Some of these plants are "native" and others are from distant lands. The plants provide blooms year after year in different seasons.

Benefits of Flower Gardens

- * **Personal Enjoyment**: Flower gardens can offer joy and satisfaction from nurturing plants and witnessing their growth and enjoying their blooms.
- * Environmental Impact: Gardens support pollinators like bees and butterflies, improve air quality, and can help reduce urban heat.
