In 2024, we established two new community gardens and maintained 14 early learning center gardens; throughout Southwest Florida. These gardens provided fresh food to both community members in need and students participating in our early learning programs, facilitated through our community partnerships.

In 2024, we collaborated with 641 volunteers to remove 2,192 pounds of coastal marine debris from beaches across Southwest Florida. In 2025, we plan to repurpose most of this debris for our art installations, aiming to raise awareness about the impacts of Hurricane Ian, Hurricane Milton, and regular debris on our coastlines.






In 2024, we engaged 103 volunteers to enhance the education of 902 young students through our nature-based early learning program. This initiative aims to cultivate environmental stewardship among students by integrating STEM activities into their learning experiences

In 2024, we stored 400+ pounds of the coastal marine debris. We meticulously sorted the materials in preparation for our inaugural art debris installation, a collaborative project with Professor Steve Hughart II and his students at Florida Gulf Coast University's Bowers School of Music & Art.


