EXAMPLES:

In other words, Los Angeles is a place where anyone, no matter their backgrounds, can <u>achieve</u> unimaginable success. This idea <u>is present</u> in *La La Land* because both Seb and Mia move to Los Angeles in order to succeed in their chosen fields: acting and music.

This quote <u>illustrates</u> the danger of simply walking into Mordor. Boromir <u>rationalizes</u> his argument that the journey ahead will be perilous. He <u>conjectures</u> that they will probably have to, at the very least, battle a few monsters to get into Mordor.

By saying "you shall not pass", Gandalf <u>shows</u> his disapproval of Balrogs. His volume <u>transforms</u> the simple phrase into a command. This command <u>intensifies</u> the scene.

Naruto's phrase "Believe it!" <u>negates</u> his lack of ability. Despite being the weakest ninja, his dialogue <u>emphasizes</u> his determination to succeed.
