Greetings from the shelter!

Here at the shelter, we have certainly seen a significant increase in the number of cats and kittens entering the shelter. The past 1 ½ years, we saw a decrease in the number of lost pets as many pet owners were home more and were able to keep an eye on their pets. In addition, pet owners found they had more time to spend with their pets and really enjoyed their company, so surrender requests were down as well. As most everyone has returned to work and resumed activities, more lost and unwanted animals are again in need of assistance.

We were able to address necessary shelter repairs and other updates, such as painting, when our animal population was lower. It also gave us the opportunity to seek new ways to provide a more comfortable environment for the animals in our care. One such opportunity that we discovered as a special grant from the Shelter Medicine Program Team at the University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine to apply for portals for our cat kennels. To apply, we had to share why the cat portals would benefit our shelter and provide pictures of our current kennels to demonstrate the need. We were thrilled when the notification came in that we would be receiving 24 portals, (valued at over \$2,800), which would provide enough for every kennel. It took some time and ingenuity to get all of the portals fitted for each of our different kennel systems, but it was certainly worth it in the end!

You may be asking why these kennel portals are so important to our shelter. These portals are installed between cages to allow cats the freedom to move between two spaces and have a separate areas to eat/sleep and to utilize the litter box. This also helps to mitigate some of the stress of the shelter environment. The other benefits to the double compartment housing, is that stressed cats can be handled less frequently until they are more comfortable as they can be coaxed from one side of the kennel while staff is cleaning the other side. Although, all of our cats and kittens get out of their kennels at least twice a day this provides even more exercise time. The large cats have enough space to completely stretch out and kittens love the extra space to play and especially enjoy zooming in and out of the portals.

Interestingly enough, studies have also shown that cats housed in double kennels are

adopted more quickly. The portals are able to be temporarily closed when an urgent need for additional space for incoming cats/kittens is needed.

All of us at LAHS have already seen the benefit these portals offer. We are so thankful to have received this grant to provide this much needed upgrade for our cats and kittens!



# In the Know.... Summer Safety

We all love summer as it brings us all outdoors to enjoy our favorite warm weather activities, time at the lake or pool, camping, sports and cook outs. When the heat turns up, the dangers to pets can increase too. To keep your dog, cat and other furry friends safe, make sure you are prepared. Here are some of the dangers to watch for:

### **Dehydration and Heat Stroke**

Dehydration and heat stroke are very real threats when the hot days of summer are upon us. Animals should always have fresh, clean water available at all times. Carry portable water bowls on dog walks and bring them on vacation or long car rides. To provide extra opportunities for your pets to cool off, you can use ice packs, fans (placed where pets can't access them), ice cubes, kiddie pools and sprinklers. Short -nosed dogs, like Pugs, Shih Tzus and Bulldogs, darker-colored pets, animals that are overweight or ones that have thick coats (like Himalayan or Persian cats), are especially prone to heat stress. Watch out for these symptoms:

- Excess lethargy/weakness
- Decreased urination
- Dry gums
- Refusal to eat
- Sunken eyes
- Decreased skin elasticity (Gently pinch your pet's skin near the shoulder up into the shape of a tent; if the skin is slow to snap back, your pet may be dehydrated.)

What should you do if you think your pet is dehydrated or suffering from heat stroke? You can cool them with a hose or wet towels and get them to a veterinarian as quickly as possible.

# In the Know.... Summer Safety Continued

### Pools and water

Despite what you have seen in social media videos, not all pets like to swim or have mastered the skill. If you are bringing your pet to the beach, boating or even the pool, be sure to buy a flotation device to keep your pet safe. It is also important to rinse your pet off well after a swim as pool chemicals, algae and bacteria in lakes can potentially cause health problems. If you are spending time in salt water, be sure to provide fresh water for pets to drink.

### Cars

Pets should never be left alone in a vehicle, especially in warm weather. Temperatures as low as 65 degrees can be dangerous as the inside car temperatures can easily exceed safe levels.

### **Ticks**

With all of the time your pet will be spending outdoors, one of the biggest dangers is ticks. During the summer, it is recommended that you check your pet for ticks daily and look thoroughly after walks or trips through wooded areas.

What should you do if you find a tick? Remove the tick as soon as possible, typically a tweezers or special tick removal tool will work well. Keep in mind that ticks carry a number of diseases and symptoms are often hard to spot, so it is best to contact your veterinarian for advice. Prevention is always the best, so prior to tick season you can ask your veterinarian what type of tick products are most effective and appropriate for your pet.

### **Bee stings**

Curiosity may not kill the cat (or dog), but it can get them stung, resulting in a great deal of pain and swelling. Although most bee stings are not considered life-threatening, if the pet's swelling is causing any breathing issues or the swelling is quite large, it is important to contact your veterinary clinic immediately. Never give over the counter medications, unless you have been directed to do so by a veterinarian.

### Sidewalks/Roads

Ever heard the expression, "It's so hot, you can fry an egg on the sidewalk"? Things like black pavement (or asphalt) can get very hot and can harm your pets' paws. Avoid asphalt/concrete, sand and rough pavement, pick softer routes, stick to the shaded areas and schedule walks for cooler times of the day.

These dangers may sound scary, but a little preparation and watchful eye is all you need to take the heat off your summer!
