Summers, Ekanger, Cougars Clip Eagles

Big Blue's Comeback, Defensive Stand Shine

BOISE—With Sam Summers and Randy Ekanger leading the way, Caldwell High's football Cougars left the launching pad Thursday night in Bronco Stadium and figuratively landed on the moon.

They beat Capital's vaunted Eagles 19-14.

There are virtually no words to describe this spine-tingler. It was rock 'em, sock 'em football all the way with plenty of offensive fireworks between Summers and Ekanger against Capital's explosive Bruce Watson.

With 53 seconds to play, Caldwell—ahead by the final 19-14 count—was on Capital's five yard line. However, the game ended with the Eagles on the Blue and Gold's nine and throwing two futile passes into the endzone.

It was that kind of a game from the word "Go!"

Though he didn't start for the Cougars, Summers directed Caldwell's attack most of the way, and he kept the smooth-running attack flowing freely by capitalizing on Ekanger's ball-toting ability.

Summers ran 52 yards for Caldwell's first touchdown, which put the CHS crew ahead briefly 7-0, on a nifty piece of broken field running.

Then with Caldwell behind 14-7, Ekanger bolted across from 30 yards out in the third quarter. And with CHS still lagging 14-13, the hard-churning back went 20 yards on the second play of the last period for the winning score.

When it was all over, Ekanger had 188 yards in 23 carries for an 8.2 average. Individually, Watson's figures were more impressive—243 yards in 27 trips for a 9.0 rate—but no one could deny Coach Charlie Alvaro's Blue and Gold of its fourth straight conquest.

This win puts CHS into a tie with all-mighty Borah for the SIC's West Division lead, a lofty status not common to Caldwell four weeks into the season. Alvaro was surrounded by gleeful well-wishers and rival coaches shortly after the game, including Boise High's John Giannandrea and Borah aide George Nakano, a former CHS head mentor.

Alvaro said, "The defense did a standout job—we figured we had a chance if we could hold them to three TDs, so you have to credit our defense.

"We have a gritty bunch of kids with not a lot of talent like other clubs have, and we hung in there. Our offense did a good job tonight behind Summers, and Ekanger and (Dick) Baranco worked hard in carrying the ball.

First, Watson hit the center of the line for four yards to Capital's 36 after a short Cougar punt.

On the next play, Watson broke through the defense on his way to a 64-yard scoring sprint to put Capital ahead 14-7 with Ross Hoelzle's second PAT kick.

But the Cougars didn't panic and soon they were back within hailing distance on Ekanger's 30 yard TD bolt up the middle on a good burst of extra energy.

"Capital might have been down after beating Boise in a big game for them last week, but our kids were ready even if it was a Thursday game. We're real proud of our kids."

Caldwell went 61 yards in two plays, 56 yards in five plays and 67 yards in seven plays for its three scores.

After Summers' magnificent run up the middle and then to the left for the first Cougar TD, Capital came right back on a 79-yard scoring drive in seven plays to leave the halftime count knotted 7-7. Watson bolted the final yard for the Black and Gold's tally.

Then midway through the third quarter, the Tom Swindell-coached Eagles struck again.

After Caldwell's final TD, the Cougars dominated most of the fourth period and drove from their 40 to Capital's five. There Rod Aguilar's field goal attempt was blocked and Ekanger hauled down Steve Bastian with the ball at the 40.

Ekanger was Caldwell's last tackle to defend on that ill-fated blocked kick. Capital went down the field in a hurry those final 53 seconds. But when the chips were riding on the line, Caldwell batted away two end zone passes to win it.

Caldwell led in first downs 17-12 and lost total yardage by only 319-317. But on Bronco Stadium's scoreboard, the Cougars reigned supreme.

CALDWELL — Coach Wade Thomas's 9th graders have had a 50-50 season so far this year, but they are on their way to better days as of their last game.

The first game of the year for the ninth grade squad was against a rugged Meridian team, and the Jefferson Junior High crew lost a squeaker, 12 to 7.

They rebounded, however, to the extent that they turned the heat on against Ontario and left the field possessors of a 27 to 12 win over the Oregonians.

Coach Thomas, when asked to name some of the standout players on his team, began rattling off names faster than they could be written, but some of the better showings have been turned in by halfback Mark Hagood and fullback Dick Baranco on offense.

Also, the Caldwell cause has been aided in great part by offensive center Tom Iverson. Steve Vis, a tackle, goes both ways, as do Baranco and Hagood, and on the defense they are as-

sited quite ably by linebacker Jerry Thompson.

The games the Caldwell team has remaining are with Nampa Central Junior High, Vallivue Junior High, Nampa West Junior High, a repeat game with Meridian, and a possibility of their meeting the Ontario team for a second time is also in the offing.

They will be meeting Nampa Central Junior High this Friday at 4 p.m. at the Caldwell High football field, and there ought to be a good game.

The eighth grade team is not composed of slouches either.

So far this year the eighth graders have played two games and have yet to be scored upon.

They won their first game from Meridian by a 14-0 count, and the second game saw the Caldwell eleven come out on top by a 13 to nothing count.

Among others, Ken Mallea and Rick Jaynes have been turning in standout performances for the eighth grade crew.

The award is sponsored by Idaho Department Store and The News-Tribune for conference games in the Southern Idaho Conference played by the Cougars.

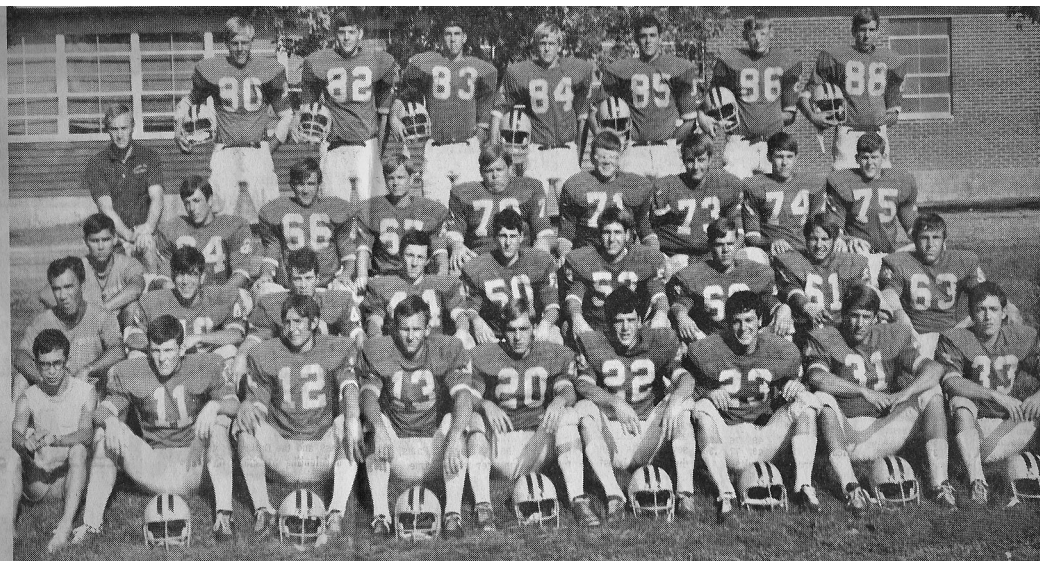
Tackle Steve Vis was named last week's winner for his game against Ontario Sept. 5, and he is eligible to win again since the Ontario game was a non-SIC battle.

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Cougars' Vis Gains

TWIN FALLS (Special) — Tackle Steve Vis is a second offensive team selection on the All-Southern Idaho Conference's 1969 football team as Caldwell High's only representative.

The All-SIC selections were announced today, and both Nampa's Bulldogs and Meridian's Warriors were blanketed without a berth on any of the three teams chosen.

Two offensive teams and one defensive unit were selected by sports writers and sports-casters in the SIC's member cities.

In the 31 positions selected—three teams minus two guards not chosen on the No. 2 unit—

Borah captured 10 places, Boise nine, Capital five, Idaho Falls three, Skyline two, Caldwell and Minico one each. Blanketed from the team in addition to Nampa and Meridian were Pocatello, Twin Falls and Highland.

Record-breaking Idaho Falls quarterback Tom Moriarity was named back of the year in close balloting, edging Capital's Bruce Watson for the honor. Don Hutt of Borah was voted lineman of the year, and Borah Coach Dee Pankratz was selected as coach of the year after the Lions finished with a 10-0 record.

Boise High's Mike Mohrman was chosen on both teams, the only player to achieve this feat.

All-SIC No. 2 Team

He made the No. 1 team at tackle on both the offensive and defensive units.

Rounding out the No. 1 team's backfield with Moriarity, who crossed all but one passing record on the SIC books and tied that one, and Watson were Steve Bastian of Capital and Barry Rogers of Minico.

Watson topped all vote-getters with 18, while Moriarity had 16, Bastian 14 and Rogers 12.

In front of them on the first offensive team, and their votes, were: ends Hutt of Borah, 16, and Darrell Baldwin, Idaho Falls, 15; tackles Rick Rogers, Borah, 14, and Mohrman, Boise,

guards Doran Dahike, Capital, 10, and Dennis Woodbridge, Borah, 8; and center Mark Catfield, Borah, 10.

The second offensive unit is comprised of backfield stars Dennis Olson, Idaho Falls, 8; Phil Stanley, Boise, 8; Tom Hickey, Borah, and Steve Jolley, Borah, both 11. The line on the No. 2 team features ends Jim Ellsworth, Skyline, 11, and Jack Willing, Boise, 7; tackles Scott Patrick, Capital, 7, and Vis, Caldwell, 6; and center Mark Hall, Boise, no votes listed.

There was no clear decision for guards on the second team as seven men wound up with two votes; so no guards were selected.

On the defensive unit, which is the only one selected annually, the voters picked: ends Bronson, Borah, and Rico, Boise; Mohrman, Boise, and Miller, Borah; tackles Elaine Ray, Capital, middle guard, Dave Higley, Borah, Lynn Burgess, Boise, and Travis Bowen, Skyline, linebackers: Rich Bishop, Borah, and Andy Brasse, Burdick, cornerback; and Chuck LeDue, Boise, safety.

The special honors were decided in close balloting. Moriarity was named back of the year with four votes; Watson had three; Bastian two; and Brassy, Hickey and Rogers one each. The

lineman voting ran with Hutt five, Mohrman four, Baldwin two and Capital's Vance one.

Pankratz took coaching honors with five votes, while Mahlon Rasmussen of Skyline had four, Karl Elliott of Nampa two and Charlie Alvaro of Caldwell one vote.

This year marks the second straight season that Pankratz has won the coach of the year laurels. Borah has won 21 straight games dating back to Nov. 3, 1967, when it lost a 25-21 nod to Capital. Then the Lions won their season finale and swept through two straight 10-0 campaigns.

I got kicked off the field by Referee Caldwell from Boise; but I deserved to be so evicted. I shot off my mouth.

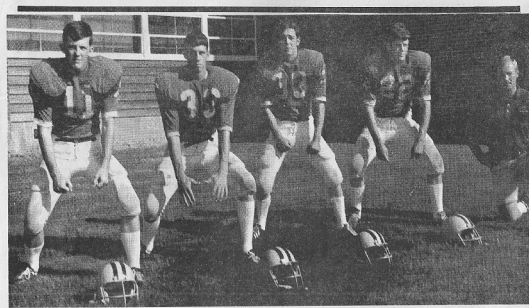

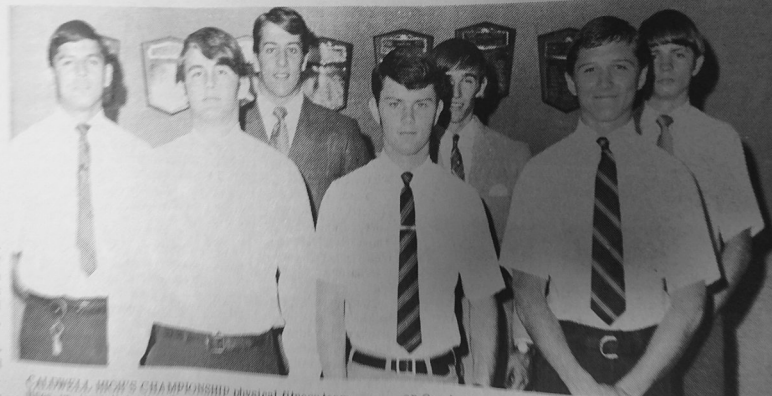

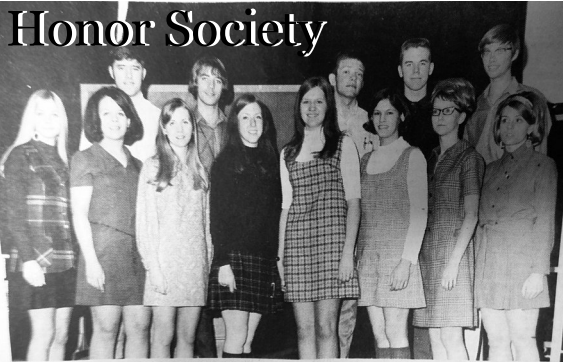

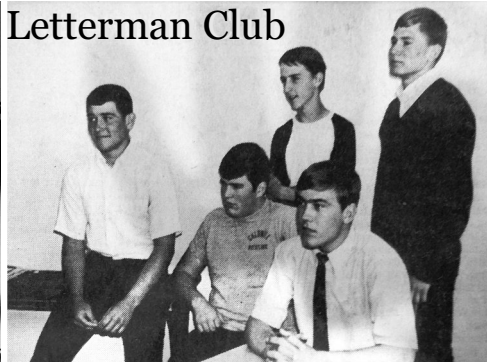

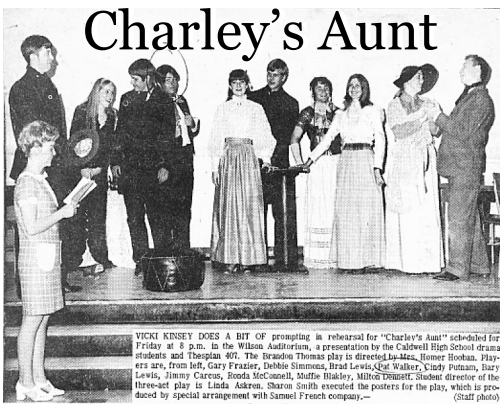

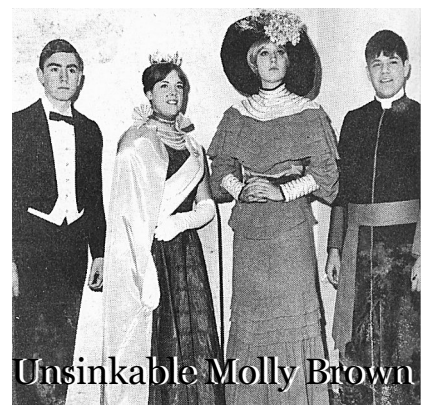

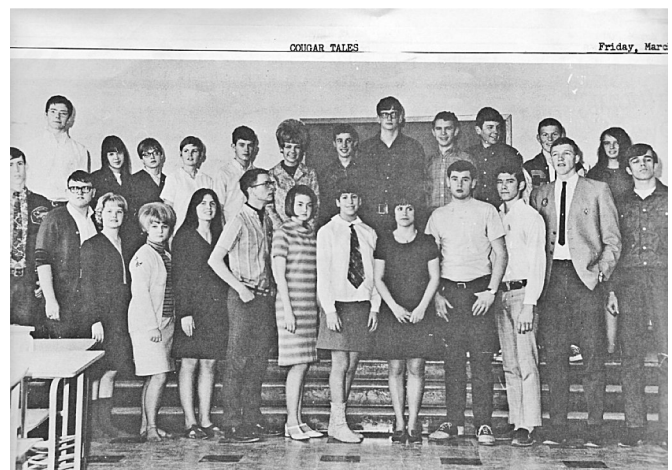

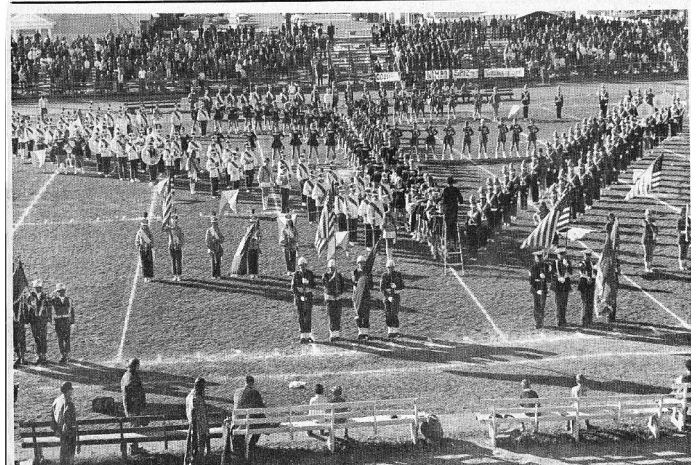
