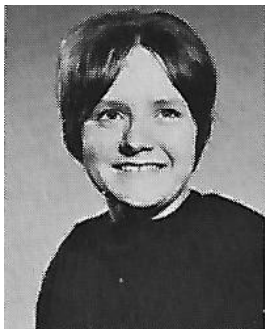

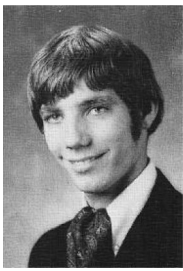
What would you like to be when you grow up: An irresponsible, fun loving, crazy kid forever—all of those qualities I've admired in others.

Someone had to get picked on so guess the new kid was fair game, haha. Interestingly enough, I play sports all through Jr High and did swimming and track my Soph year... but wasn't "home grown" as I found out was important at CHS.

I "stuttered" through my Jr year, but had to pick one last class, and decided on Yearbook. I had a blast in there, and was elected Yearbook Editor our Senior year. Finally some respect (and the ability to get my photo throughout the yearbook... :-)) But I changed... I took on CHS as my home. Instead of feeling sorry about things, I embraced the Yearbook responsibilities, and started to try to meet as many of our classmates as I could. Some were just out of reach, but I got to know some of the kids that others would just "pass" by in the hallways.



At the 10 year reunion, Jon Haws and I were friends at and after HS, and lived in the same town in WA. He and I both drove from the Seattle area to Caldwell to attend. It was my first experience with coffee and "No-Dose" at that time since we drove after work all night to get there (about 10-11 hours)...

Back then, the internet was just taking off, and there wasn't as much info to find, so when I found out someone has passed away, I would write or call.

One classmate that has always stuck with me was someone I knew but only in passing was Ron Achamire. He was tall, blonde, shy, introverted, but seemed like a nice guy. Not sure if he had many friends at CHS. But I remembered meeting and talking with him several times and even has some classes with him.. He seemed like one of the "forgotten ones". I told her I remembered talking with him... and finally got the courage to ask how he died. There was a loooong pause, and she said one word, "alcoholism". I was dumbfounded. What do you say? I told her he will be remembered as a classmate at CHS, and she said "thank you".

That still sticks with me. I would have never pictured him like that, maybe if I had done more, tried more to listen to him... but I was self absorbed in my world to do the "many" that I forgot the "few".

Then were was Jane Buettgenbach. I had her in a few classes and spoke to her quite a bit, but we were never close. She died of cancer. I found her phone number here in Beaverton, and called... 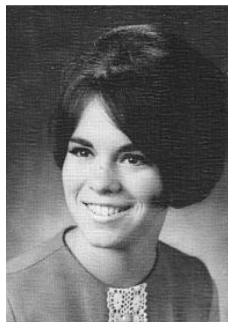
My favorite pastime or leisure activity is FAMILY, grandkids and now my new Mustang Convertible.

I retired in 2014 and we moved back to Boise in 2016. We are moving to Santa Fe this fall.



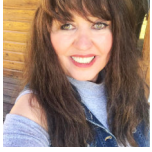

3. I was accepted into dental school, medical school, and surgery residency, to all of my first choices. These events allowed me to further my education and help tens of thousands of patients.

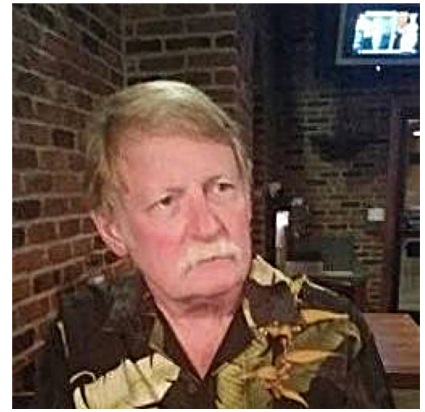
The achievement I am most proud of is my son Nick, because he became the person he is.

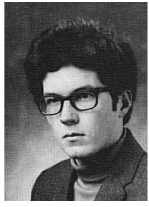
The greatest "gift" I received that, at the time, I did not perceive as a "gift" was **my work ethic.**

We have also had the great privilege of making a few Christian mission trips into eastern Europe, and would go again if the opportunity arises. Those have been life-changing.



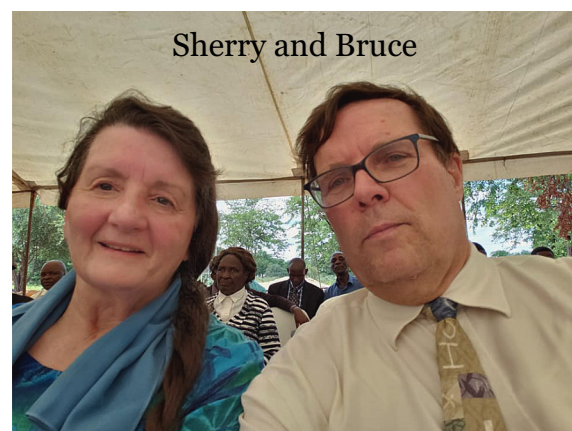

Sisters reunited after 45 years

BATAVIA - Two sisters, separated for 45 years by half a continent and miles of misunderstandings, were back together recently in western Boone County, talking, laughing, hugging - catching up.

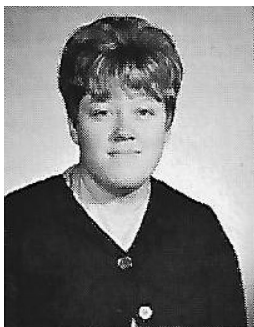
BATAVIA - Two sisters, separated for 45 years by half a continent and miles of misunderstandings, were back together recently in western Boone County, talking, laughing, hugging - catching up.

Stella Craft, 55, drove with her husband and daughter in their RV all the way from Kuna, Idaho earlier this month to come to the big sister she called "Lindy," who took care of her after their mother died when Stella was only 15 months old.

"Lindy" - Linda Armer, who now lives in Batavia - was only 10 in 1954 when their mother, Jimmie Estep, died at 42 of a stroke, leaving her husband Marshall with six children to take care of. A seventh child, their oldest daughter Frances, had died of leukemia at 17, before her mother's death.

Marshall was working in the lead mines at Compton when his wife died. Their oldest son, Graden, was 15, and the others were stepsiblings, down to baby Stella Ruth, just 15 months old.

For a while after her mother's death, the oldest daughter, 14-year-old Ruby, was in charge of the house and the younger children, but after two months of heavy family responsibilities, Ruby left home to make her own way.



"After that, I did the cooking and cleaning and taking care of Stella and Leon," Linda said. "I'd get up at five, cook their breakfast, make their lunches and fix Stella's food."

With no one at home to watch the little one, 10-year-old Linda would take her baby sister to school with her, carrying her up to the top of a steep hill, where they would catch the school bus.

"My teacher didn't care," Linda said. "Stella would take a nap on a quilt under the teacher's desk."

Darwin Clark of Harrison drove the bus to the Kingston school during that time, and vividly remembers the little 10-year-old girl who would struggle up the hill in the Crossroads community, carrying her baby sister in her arms.

"It was quite a load for her, to have to step in and be a mother to the baby and the other little boy when she was just 10 years old," Clark said recently. "It was a heartbreaking situation. I admired her and felt sorry for her. She was just as kind as she could be to those little children."

When Linda was 18, her father sent her to Texas to work and send money home.

Stella, who was only seven when her Lindy left home, had to adjust to another loss in her life.

"Daddy would cook our breakfast and dinner," Stella said. "And I went over to [cousin] Ada Beaver's, and she'd take care of me while he was at work."

Ada, who lives near Compton, has vivid memories of her first cousins when they were children, especially after they moved to live near her several years after their mother died.

"They had to walk everywhere they went," Ada said. "I always loved them and helped take care of them. Uncle Marshall would leave them with me while he went to town to get groceries."

The girls' father died in 1961, not long after the big flood in Harrison.

"Daddy's heart exploded on him at Ponca," Linda said. "He was just sitting on the counter at the store, waiting for the mail."

After her father died, little Stella went to live with relatives in Idaho, where the situation soon became a deeply unhappy one for the little girl.

"I remember losing everything at one time, and going to a strange place where I didn't know anybody."

Stella tells a heartbreaking story of abuse. She said her Idaho relatives did not want her to have any contact with her family back in Arkansas, and never gave her the letters Linda and the others wrote her.

"I believed that nobody wanted me, nobody cared about me," Stella said.

Back in Arkansas, her big sister could not understand why the letters she wrote to her little sister kept coming back from Idaho marked "Return to Sender."

"I didn't think Stella cared about me anymore," she said.

Linda managed to go to Idaho to see her sister after she had been there about a year. "I knew something was wrong, but Stella wouldn't tell me what was it was," she said.

"I missed my Lindy," Stella said. "I had a couple of pictures of her. But I really didn't think they cared about me anymore."

Linda stayed in the Boone County area, married, and had three children of her own.

"Every time I'd have a baby, I'd think about Stella," she said. "I wrote her I don't know how many times, but all her letters would come back. I thought she didn't care."

Stella finished high school and became a licensed practical nurse, paying for her own education. "I got into building computers when I got tired of nursing," she said. She married and has one daughter.

Their cousin Ada managed to keep in contact with Stella over the years, and it was through her that the two sisters have finally gotten back in touch with each other.

When Linda answered the phone about two weeks ago, she heard her baby sister's voice.

"I said, 'I'm coming down,'" Stella said. She and her husband Tony Craft and college-student daughter Meika all drove down in their RV from Idaho and spent a week with Linda in her Batavia home.

"She ended up on my porch," Linda said with a big smile. "Boy, I was so happy - I was jumping up and down. I made her homemade cinnamon rolls. I made her a Hawaiian pie and cowboy cookies."

When they arrived in the Ozarks, the scene of her happy early years, Stella was overcome with emotion, which reached its peak when they arrived at Linda's home.

"I was nervous and excited," she said. "Everything was going the gamut because we hadn't seen each other in so long."

The sisters spent their week together talking, going to see their cousin Ada and other relatives, visiting some of the scenes of their childhood, and making a trip to the cemetery.

Cousin Ada was also delighted to see Stella while she was here, and had the sisters over to eat dinner with her, and spent another evening in Linda's home visiting.

"I was so glad to see Stella," Ada said. "I told her to move back here. I always loved them because they had such a hard time."

A highlight of Stella's visit was having the chance to help her big sister celebrate her 65th birthday with a big surprise party at Western Sizzlin'.

"It's like I never left," Stella said. "I feel very accepted."

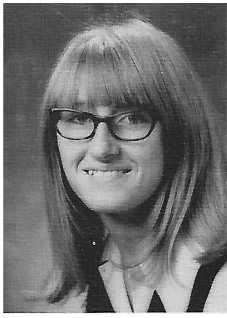
The sisters said the best part of their visit has been just talking to each other.

"We've just been sitting here, talking about when Stella was little," Linda said.

"A lot of it I knew, a lot of it I didn't," Stella said. "All of the memories I had before I left carried me through."

Linda and Stella say they'll stay in close touch now that they've re-established contact. Linda is already planning a trip to Idaho to visit her rediscovered baby sister.

It might be 1,653 miles from Batavia to Kuna, Idaho - but the road to a sister's house is never long.

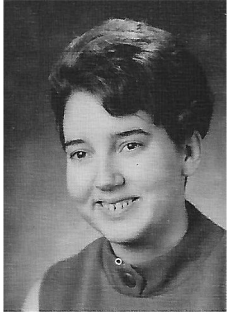

From 30th Reunion

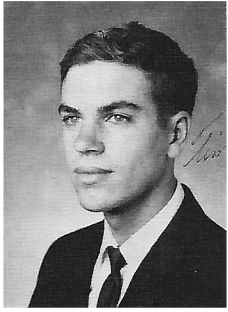

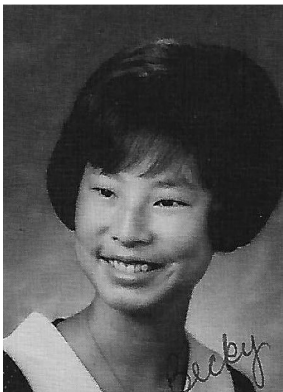
