Class of 1970, 50 Years Later

I have fond memories of school years in Caldwell. I am fortunate to have lived in Caldwell and graduating from CHS in 1970. I formed friendships during my school year, many maintained over time and distance. After 50 years of living, beyond graduation, I recognize my time at CHS helped me achieve more than imagined in 1970.

My memories of academic time at CHS are more vague than those of my social life. But a few educational experiences and classes stand out. I have relied heavily on the typing skills learned in the 9th grade from Ms. Gillette at Jefferson Jr. High. At CHS, Mrs. Myrna Moore helped me appreciate literature and strengthened my writing skills. While math experiences are sketchy, I still apply the algebra lessons learned from Ms. Brock (9th grade) and geometry from Mr. Lawrence (grade 10). Many of us enjoyed Biology with Paul Bromhall (I later was privileged to work with him as fellow teacher). I remember rising early to attend his 7:30 am Advance Biology class that, for the first time, allowed a small group of seniors to get out of school at 2:30 (the precursor to the

now, typical, flexible school day). I remember coaches well – Charlie Alvaro (I served as his teacher aid senior year), Cisco Garcia (track), Steve Kuharski (sold me his old stereo/turntable – my first one). I appreciated choir teacher, Ms. Wagoner, and her influence on my continued interest in music theory, musical arrangements, and harmonies.

Spending most of my early academic life in Caldwell, I moved to Oregon for a year in the 8th grade. I left as Craig Hunt and returned a year later as Pete Hunt. I returned to a group of classmates with whom I spent many a fun time over the next four years. I was part of a freshman garage band, the Henchmen, with

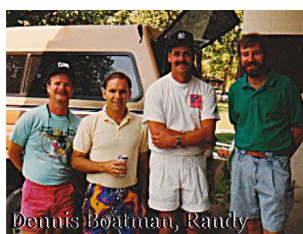
Jim Klahr, Tim VanSlyke, Tom Cochrane, and Steve Brown. I spent concentrated time with Steve Larson and Chuck Krause (and later, Barry Curry – class of 71) during our years of summer work at Symms Fruit Ranch and time with many classmates sitting at their homes, listening to the latest records. I was fortunate to

have some running talent that brought me success in track (see attached News Tribune pictures). 50 years of recollections allows one to remember memorable times and personal successes, but also recognize deficiencies and lost opportunities.

I was fortunate to be able to serve as one of the CHS officers (Chaplain) during my senior year (see picture). But, I've not felt I lived up to the expectations of that office. As is often true with adolescents, I was consumed more with personal gratification and self-interest, took friendships and relationships too casually, and participated in far too many attention seeking and risk taking behaviors. I lacked the maturity required for living a worthwhile and useful. But, 50 more years of living has allowed me to understand those regrets of youth and steer me toward a life of greater decency.

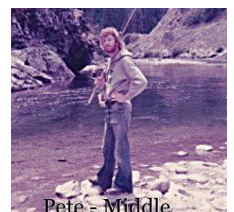
