I didn't take education in school seriously until I went to college. It wasn't until after college I realized I had a hearing problem which explained why I was so bad at spelling. I always tried to sound out a word and spell it. That didn't work for me. Not hearing the correct words from teachers made me think school was a waste of time. There were a couple of teachers that inspired me to learn and to listen more intently. Broomhall was one and he drove me to learn more about all sciences. Before college I never studied for an exam and always did my homework before leaving school. I didn't really care about grades. College changed everything for me. I fell in love with computers, Biology and Physics and studied Math, Chemistry, and business accounting. No, it doesn't make any sense, but I wanted to learn as much as I could. I graduated from Linfield College in McMinnville Oregon in 1974. I ended up with a major in Biology and Physics and minors in Chemistry, Math, and Business. I wanted to go into Pre-Med but my GPA of 3.5 was too low for any Medical School to accept an application.



At college I met and married Tammy Bertsch who went on to become a Med Tech and worked in Boise and Ontario hospitals. We returned to Caldwell and I continued to work in the Family's NAPA store. I said continued, because I worked there during holidays and every summer since I was 10. While working at NAPA I tried my hand at metal sculpture thinking if I made better and more realistic sculptures than anyone else people would buy my sculptures and I would be a success. Not so. Getting great compliments and articles in newspapers didn't sell sculptures. However, some of the leftover sculptures decorate our home, which needed decorating.

Five years later, just as the IBM PC came out, I started to work in a Computer Time Sharing Company in Boise. I wrote code, wrote manuals, and taught people to use our accounting programs. We added software for political and church organizations and started to write a Bible program. First Interstate Bank came to us to write a "Payroll System" to process Payroll for their customers. We were processing payroll for companies in 15 different states. But the PC got better and people wanted to do the work themselves. The Time-Sharing company went out of business eleven years after I started there. While there I became "certified" in different computer programs and the Windows OS. I was a "Beta Tester" for Word Perfect, Lotus 1-2-3, Page Maker, and a couple of other programs.

From there I worked for Sheldon Morgan in his glass and door company for a summer. I loved the work and the opportunity but I was looking for something different and I was having arthritic problems and so moved on.

The next three years found me working at a high-end hardwood door company in Nampa. I created their stock room and tried to be a sales manager in the first year. Not being a salesperson, I was moved to working in the glass department. I enjoyed making glass panels for doors, sidelights, and transoms. I tried my hand at carving wood, but I needed more experience as I was too slow. The last year found me back in the stock room as I took over running the stock room, purchasing all the inventory, supplies, and anything the company needed. I was the Employee of the month twice while being there. Because of the Spotted Owl problem in California the company's sales suffered. We were selling over \$250K in doors and glass a week (around 100 to 150 doors) which continued to dropped the next 3 years. Sales worsened and the company went out of business two years after I left it.

After working there, a second time for over 23 years my brother decided to take over the business and left me without a job and many thousands in debt. You could say I am unhappy about my brother. 
Rosandick - Kerry Ellen Elliott

- Mrs. Leasure-Drill Team--can only imagine what our parents thought about our slightly risqué St. Louis Blues routine!








Rosling - David
