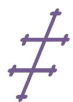

## An Encounter with Bro. Thomas Cole and the Stages of Life

*Nature has secrets known only to the initiated.  
To him she speaks in the most eloquent language.*  
--Thomas Cole, *The Wild* (1825)

While attending the Biennial Session of the Supreme Council in Washington D.C., I decided to accept a Brother's recommendation to see the National Gallery of Art. I am not an art aficionado, and I was uncertain about going. To my amazement, it was a wonderful experience. After seeing several unimpressive old paintings, I was immediately drawn to the symbolism of a four-piece series entitled *The Voyage of Life*, created by Thomas Cole in 1840. As I looked around the gallery off the East Garden, these paintings denoted *Childhood*, *Youth*, *Manhood*, and *Old Age* were hanging in each of the four corners.

One of the four pieces, the last in the series, *Old Age*, made a deep impression on me, as I experienced the painting's beauty blended with the Gallery's own architectural majesty. The painting was God's prized work of humanity within the totality of the created world. Collectively, these paintings were far and away the most impressionable to me, and I left the Gallery intent to learn more about the artist.

Upon returning to my hotel room that night, I began to research Cole and the paintings. He was considered America's leading landscape painter during the first half of the nineteenth century. Cole was born in Bolton-le-Moor, Lancashire, England on February 1, 1801. In 1818, his family emigrated to Ohio. Regarding this series, Cole's diary entry for March 24, 1839, reads:

I have received a noble commission from Mr. Samuel Ward, to paint a series of pictures, the plan of which I conceived several years since, entitled, *The Voyage of Life*. I sincerely hope that I shall be able to execute the work in a manner worthy of Mr. Ward's liberality, and honorable to myself. The subject is an allegorical one, but perfectly intelligible, and, I think, capable of making a strong moral and religious impression.

In a bit of unexpected serendipity, I learned that Cole was a Freemason. Cole became a Freemason in 1822 while travelling the new National Road between Pennsylvania and Ohio by joining Amity Lodge No. 5 in Zanesville, Ohio. According to David Bjelajac's 2011 article from the *Journal for Research into Freemasonry and Fraternalism*:

During the summer of 1822, he joined the Lodge of Amity No. 5 in Zanesville, Ohio. Needy itinerant artists depended on the welcoming handshakes of lodge brothers as they traveled from one unfamiliar town to the next. Lodge members could be expected to commission paintings, lend money and assistance, and provide references to brother masons in nearby communities. Within a few weeks, Cole advanced through all three of freemasonry's craft degrees.

Bjelajac states that the paintings track the progressive path of three craft degrees:

Cole's *Voyage of Life: Youth* draws upon these lessons of freemasonry's Entered Apprentice degree. The picture represents an overly imaginative young man on the river of life unwisely transixed (sic) by an exotic, castleshaped cloud in the sky. Having declared his independence from a nearby guardian angel, Cole's youth is oblivious to his immediate surroundings

and fails to notice that the river he navigates takes a sharp right turn toward rocky rapids.

These paintings capture, by the passage down the river of life, the care-free innocence of childhood, blind ambition of youth, trials of manhood, and the cyclical return to heaven by death at old age. Each painting shows the voyager and his guardian angel in a different part of the river, with the boat's direction sequentially reversed. *Childhood* contains smooth waters, symbolizing the sheltered experience of our primitive years. In *Youth*, the man has a firm grasp of the tiller, symbolizing the effort of taking control of one's life. His forward thrusting pose demonstrates his energy and enthusiasm toward the sky of his ambitious dreams, while in the bottom right the river begins to turn turbulent. In *Manhood*, the figure is now grown, and he has let go of the tiller, which has disappeared. In the face of peril and danger, he has turned to God in prayer. Of *Manhood*, the sonorous words of Dr. Ellen Miles, Curator Emeritus of the Gallery, convey its impressionistic power:

Trouble is characteristic of the period of *Manhood*. In *Childhood* there is no cankering care; in *Youth* no despairing thought. It is only when experience has taught us the realities of the world, that we lift from our eyes the golden veil of early life; that we feel deep and abiding sorrow; and in the picture, the gloomy, eclipse-like tone, the conflicting elements, the trees riven by tempest, are the allegory; and the Ocean, dimly seen, figures the end of life, to which the voyager is now approaching. The demon forms are Suicide, Intemperance, and Murder, which are the temptations that beset men in their direst trouble. The upward and imploring look of the voyager, shows his dependence on a Superior Power, and that faith saves him from the destruction that seems inevitable.



In *Old Age*, the river waters have calmed and flow into eternity, as the landscape has entirely faded away. An angel descends from heaven, with another gesturing forward. The man is calm with the assurance of his faith and the fulfillment of the promise of heaven. Both of his hands are up, perhaps in a Masonic fulfillment of the promise of heaven. Both of his hands are up, perhaps in a Masonic gesture, as if to peace-

-fully surrender himself up Jacob's ladder, which Cole might have seen on a tracing board.

In an 1840 letter to his dear friend Ver Bryck, Cole discussed his progress on the series:

You ask me how the Voyage of Life is progressing. I can hardly say. I think the first picture is about finished, that is, will be in three or four days. But it generally happens that when I have just finished, I have not half done. Little things that appear easy, and of a few minutes only, sometimes, by some unaccountable infelicity, if I may use such a word, require days. The Angel's face has given me a great deal of trouble. Angels' visits to me are really so few and far between that I forget their features. Sometimes the expression would be sulky, sometimes cross, and sometimes silly. I have, at length, finished one which I suppose will be found a compound of all the expressions of which I have spoken. But I will not disparage myself. I hope the picture is the most complete one I have ever painted. I should be happy to have you see it. I want other eyes: mine are accustomed to the picture.

While the stages of life are not as clearly demarcated as the edges of paintings, it is nonetheless possible to know, in the words from Albert Pike's *Esoterica*: "whence came you and wither do you travel." Men wonder occasionally what separates youth from manhood, even, perhaps, among older immature men. In the movie "33 & Beyond: The Royal Art of Freemasonry," Dr. James T. Tressner, 33°, GC, states :

Men don't become fully autonomous adult males without some form of initiation. For many, it is the military, or some other organization like that. If you go way back in history, in every society which we have record, there has been a necessary moment, a necessary point in which the man goes through a ceremony, a ritual, an understanding which divides his life and he talks things which happen before and things which happened after."

Throughout time, as Tressner states, men have noted the stages of life by different metrics, but it has always been considered. There are numerous ways of dividing one's life, such as by astrological events, such as the Zodiac. A popular demarcation is made based the astrological transit of the planetary returns. Under this system, a planetary return occurs when a planet makes one full orbit and returns to the same

sign and degree that it was in when you were born, with the most significant being the outer planets, Jupiter, Saturn, and Uranus. Jupiter returns approximately every 12 years and signifies phases of growth and development, first into adolescence and puberty and secondly into adulthood. Saturn returns approximately every 30 years. It first marks the aging process with the fullness of responsibility and, secondly, the next phase of life, usually retirement. Uranus returns every 84 years and marks the completion of life. However, one of its most important points is noted at the half-way point, when mid-life crisis and pre-menopause typically occur, around 42 years.

As I reflected on these paintings, I examined my own life and where I was in the continuum. I also thought about my father, who is 90 years old, and firmly within the "Old Age" painting. We often sit and discuss what is to become of certain possessions and my children's future, which gives him peace.

I personally find comfort in evaluating the sands of time and thinking about where I am in this great experiment called life. I am thankful for living long enough to feel content with life's blessings such that every day is a gift.

I humorously recalled my youthful aspirations and being a millionaire by age 30, believing such material goals to be of the utmost importance. As I embarked on my own voyage in collage, rudder firmly in hand, I too was knocked back by the waves of reality. While I hope to be within Cole's category of adulthood, I have not always let go of that rudder and turned to the Great Architect as I should. I look forward to the peaceful waters of older age, and I hope I can welcome that final day with open arms just as Cole envisioned. I believe this is the goal that we labor towards as Masons.

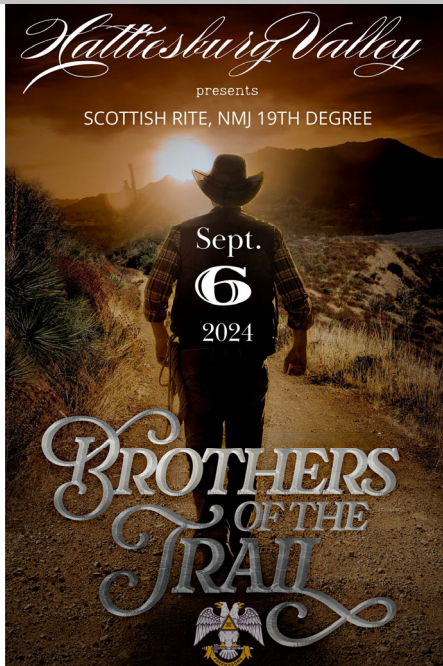

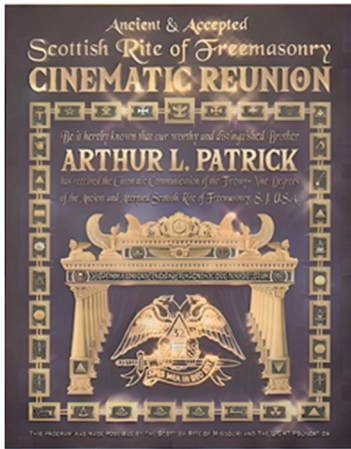
