The Maricopa County Justice Museum & Learning Center 2022 Art Contests

This year's theme is:

Celebrating Civil Rights and Diversity

We encourage students ages 5 to 12 to submit drawings for our 2022 Justice Museum Calendar, and those ages 12 to 15 to submit artwork for a display in the Justice Museum and/or on the website.

Some 'firsts' in diversity and civil rights in Arizona include:

1892 — Sarah Herring Sorin became the first female lawyer in Arizona.

1929 — I.J. Lipsohn was the first Jewish president of the Maricopa County Bar Association.

1940 — Mary Stella Cota-Robles became the first Hispanic American female lawyer in Arizona.

1946 — Wing F. Ong was admitted to the Arizona State Bar and became the first Chinese American elected to the Arizona Legislature.

1946 — Charles Bernstein became Arizona's first Jewish judge on the Maricopa County Superior Court and, in 1959, became a justice of Supreme Court of Arizona, serving as chief justice in 1962 and 1967.

1948 — Hayzel B. Daniels was the first male African American lawyer in Arizona and, in 1965, the first male African American judge in Arizona.

1976 — Jean Williams became the first female African American judge in Arizona (Tucson).

1953 — Lawrence Huerta, from the Pascua Yaqui Tribe, was the first male Native American lawyer in Arizona and, in 1967, was appointed to Maricopa County Superior Court.

1954 — Raúl Héctor Castro was the first male Mexican American County Attorney in Arizona.

1965 — Lorna Lockwood was the first female elected to both the Arizona Superior Court and, in 1970, as Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court (first female to serve in the U.S. as Chief Justice of any state Supreme Court).

1965 — Valdemar Cordova was the first male Mexican American judge appointed to the Maricopa County Superior Court and, in 1979, was appointed to the US District Court for the District of Arizona.

1977 — Thomas Tang was the first person of Chinese American to be appointed to the US Court of Appeals, as well as the first to be appointed to the federal judiciary at any level.

1979 — Roxanne Song Ong became the first Asian American female lawyer in Arizona and, in 1986, she became the first Asian American female judge in Arizona. In 2005 she was the first woman and minority to be appointed chief presiding judge of the Phoenix Municipal Court.

1979 — Joe W. Contreras was the first male Mexican American appointed to the Appeals Court in Arizona.

1981 — Justice Sandra Day O'Connor became the first female confirmed to the US Supreme Court.

1985 — Gloria Ybarra was the first female Mexican American judge in Maricopa County.

2005 — Barbara Rodríguez Mundell is the first female and the first Mexican American presiding judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court.

2013 — Raner Collins was the first male African American appointed as the Chief Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Arizona.

2016 — John Lopez IV was the first Mexican American male appointed as a Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona.

2018 — Kyrsten Sinema, admitted to the Arizona State Bar in 2004, became the first female senator from Arizona and the first openly bisexual woman elected to the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate.

DEADLINE: The deadline is July 15, 2021.

HOW TO ENTER: Artists between the ages of 5-12 are invited to submit hand-drawn, homemade artwork (hint: we like color, anything from crayon to paint is great) created on 8.5"x11" white paper reflecting the theme. The Calendar Committee will choose the winning artwork (13-18 submissions), which will be featured in a 2022 calendar to benefit the Justice Museum. Contest runs from May 1, 2021 until July 15, 2021. Submissions should be scanned at 300dpi or higher, and saved as a .jpg or .pdf file. Artists do not have to be formally affiliated with the Justice Museum or the Maricopa County Bar Association to enter, but they do need to be between the ages of 5-12 by Wednesday, July 1, 2021.

Complete the entry form & waiver below.

WINNERS will be notified by August 15, 2021 and will be invited to attend the Justice Museum Founders' Breakfast in November 2021.

CALENDARS will be available for purchase to benefit the Maricopa County Justice Museum & Learning Center in October 2021.


Pictures should reflect the artists' visual representation of **Celebrating Civil Rights and Diversity**

DEADLINE: The deadline is July 15, 2021.

HOW TO ENTER: Artists between the ages of 12-18 are invited to submit artwork reflecting the theme that also includes a brief description. The Calendar Committee will choose the winning artwork, which will be displayed in the Justice Museum. Contest runs from May 1, 2021 until July 15, 2021. Submissions should be scanned at 300dpi or higher, and saved as a .jpg or .pdf file. Artists do not have to be formally affiliated with the Justice Museum or the Maricopa County Bar Association to enter, but they do need to be between the ages of 12-18 by Wednesday, July 1, 2021.

Complete the entry form & waiver below.

WINNERS will be notified by August 15, 2021 and will be invited to attend the Justice Museum Founders' Breakfast in November 2021. Winners' artwork will be on display at the Breakfast prior to being on display at the Justice Museum.
