Who is the "Lady in Waiting" - the statue on top of the fountain in Memorial Park? The fountain was placed in the park because of a beguest of one man, John W. Underhill. Underhill, a black merchant, lived in Mays Landing during the 1920s. The statue, a four foot six inch maiden stands on top of a granite pedestal, which is surrounded by a thirty-foot wide octagon basin. From the base of the fountain to the top of the statue it is twelve foot high. Originally when the fountain was placed in 1932 the plumbing was attached to the Township water supply and pumped over 1,000 gallons of water per day. The water then drained into the Township sewer system. The fountain provided a beautiful background for many of the Township activities. Many people remember the goldfish that swam in the greenish water and the brass frogs that sat on the fountains edge. Eventually, erosion took its toll on the fountain and it guit functioning. The statue was placed in storage to preserve it. The statue was dubbed the "Lady in Waiting" by the media in regards to the townspeople hoping it would be returned to its proper place in the park. In 1974 the Township using the remaining funds in Mr. Underhill's estate, refurbished the statue and fountain.
