One month after that, Amante changed rate to Hospital Corpsman and last duty station at Great Lakes where he was honorably discharged in Aug. 1969. 
Walter "Wally" A. Marczak March 4, 1944 - April 17, 2023




setting for many family gatherings. He is survived by his loving wife of 66 years, Norma; son Dwayne Peck; daughter Julie Zackrison and other beloved family members.
