- CNN Nepal earthquake



US journalist prohibited drones Hobby vs commercial

Obama directed FCC

- fast track rules
- allow more commercial use

FAA still reviewing

> 2015 will be the year journalists can use drones

USA in five years:

- \$5b business
- Shortage of pilots



Legal for NZ journalists Scientists, Volcanologist Fire fighters, Farmers

CAA constantly update rules Aug 1 update makes difficult for all drone users





USA commercial drones (journalism, real estate, wedding)



The FAA currently authorises business purposes on a case-by-case basis.

You may not fly for commercial purpose without the express permission from the FAA (onerous).









In line of sight

NZ rules were simple for small drones: keep in

Only in daytime

Give way to crewed aircraft

Below 120 metres

4km+ from aerodrome



NEW – additional requirements for NZ drone users: UNIVERSITY

- in controlled airspace, obtain an air traffic control clearance issued by Airways
- not fly in special-use airspace without the permission of the administering authority
- have consent from anyone you want to fly above
- have the consent of the property owner or person in charge of the area you are wanting to fly above.









Controlled/special Air Space

... most of NZ





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Shielded Operation (teachers' option)

No need for a pilot licence or Air Traffic Control authorisation if flying as a shielded operation

CAA defines: "an operation of an aircraft within 100m of, and below the top of, a natural or man-made object".

4km+ from aerodrome

100 metres









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Difficulty for Journalists

Public paranoia about drone use

Journalism's tainted image (paparazzi)

Unable to get permission for happening news Earthquake Floods Droughts Weather damage Traffic snarls





Few real transgressions -- despite public paranoia

- While CAA investigated all complaints, most turned out to be within the law, with enforcement action only taken over 15 complaints, the first in July 2013.
- 79 complaints lodged this year a record high.
- First drone user accused under new rules to trial next year




