March 1941: The Saturday Evening Post article on AA by Jack Alexander creates national sensation: AA membership will quadruple in one year from 2,000 to 8,000? Thousands of appeals for help were mailed to the NY office. The office asked Groups to donate \$1.00 per member for support. This began the practice of financing the General Service Office (GSO) from group and member donations.

March 1941: Cleveland forms the Fellowship's first women's group & also the first Black women's group.

March 1946: The Twelve Traditions of AA are first formulated and published.

March 31, 1947 : the first AA Group is formed in London, England

March 22, 1951: William Duncan Silkworth "the little doctor who loved drunks" dies in New York at Towns Hospital, "Silky" treated Bill W. & 1000's more

March 21, 1966: Ebby T. who was sober 2 months through the Oxford Group when he carried the message to Bill W. died at age 69 with two years of sobriety.

March 1966: First A.A. group in Ecuador founded.

March 18, 1974: First known meeting in Uruguay is held in Montevideo.

March 1978: The A.A. Grapevine's circulation reaches 100,000.

EXPERIENCE, STRENGTH, AND HOPE—13th Birthday

STEP 3: Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood him.

My name is John and I'm an Alcoholic. I have chosen as my topic, wisdom.

AA encourages us to adopt a manner of living which requires rigorous honesty; to be selfless; to practice humility; to recognize in ourselves our humanity and moral frailty.

And when we were wrong, promptly to admit it.

We are reminded that all of us, from time to time, are emotionally ill, and frequently wrong.

The more I ponder the words in The Steps, the greater my appreciation of their wisdom.

I've been thinking about the qualifier in Step 3 as we understood him and reflecting on the inclusivity inherent in it. This inclusivity is a great theme of AA;

all are welcome, without judgment, for the good of all.

Many of us find the welcome spirit in AA and most of us are amazed and affected by it. Expressions like,

"I feel wrapped in a blanket when I'm in these rooms,"

"I feel a connection here with you folks like I never felt anyplace else"

are heartfelt and readily heard.

The rooms of AA are a sanctuary, a place of refuge. Now the word sanctuary originally meant consecrated to God; a place deemed holy by God or by man. Later the meaning expanded to involve the granting of safety or protection from some type of danger, often implied to be a persecuting, oppressive power. Sanctuary then involves a moral action; at times calling to account decisions made by worldly powers; a curtailment of power.

The writers of The Steps were aware that all must be made welcome and wanted; the phrase, "as we understand him", clarifies the equality of belief that is paramount to us. It is another reflection of humility and selflessness.

Finally, I'd like to share a little story.

One day a young woman went walking into the woods and became woefully lost. She wandered about for hours, not meeting anyone nor finding any way out. Eventually as the light was fading she spied ahead in a clearing a figure. Crying out she ran to the person, "Hello hello, thank goodness I've found you. I've been hopelessly lost for hours and had almost given up hope of rescue. Do you know the way out of here? Please help me to get out!!!".

The little old lady replied, Oh my dear, my dear, I can't show you the way out but I can show you where not to go.


