DCM Report

Hello Friends in District 4,

I hope you like me are enjoying the change from Summer to Fall.

We were all asked by Rio to share with our Districts some of what we learned at the September Voting Assembly, so here you are. The Assembly was a total virtual event as I reported last month. This was due to the forest fires. It was very well attended, however there were only 5 of us from the District 4 committee. Our treasured Past Delegate was also in attendance.

First off ,the General Service Committee's (GSC) name has been changed to Area Service Committee (ASC). This committee is made up of the elected Area officers and appointed committee chairs. This was done to avoid confusion with the General Service Conference that uses the same acronym.

For my rotation of DCM, I have been assigned to the Website Committee. The BC/Yukon Area 79 website is now available in over a hundred languages. We are also considering adding a tab for GSRs so they may more easily access information to fulfill their duties. Please have a look at the website https://bcyukonaa.org/ and get back to me if you have any ideas on changes you would like to see to the website.

Finance report for Area 79 – At this time 7th Tradition Contributions are down \$6,000 than what was budgeted for the Area to carry out what was planned at the 2022 Voting Assembly. Having this recent assembly online saved \$10,000. The budget for 2024 was presented and set at \$233,260. Contributions from the fellowship required will be \$217,000 to meet this budget. 3% inflation was used to calculate the budget. The Prudent Reserve has been set at \$50,000 or 3 months operating expenses. The Treasurer stated that the Area Service Committee's view towards the budget is that it is most important to look at the services that the membership wishes the Area to provide than do we have the money? They are therefore putting it out to the membership what is needed for contributions in order to meet the budget.

One of the services provided by Area is sending Districts speakers that we request for workshops. Area Finances will be posted monthly on the password side of the Area website, you could ask your GSR to get this information for your group. AAWS Finance – Revenues are high but expenses are higher. AAWS likes to have 45 days of cash, right now they are down to one week. The cash flow challenges are due to cost of travel increasing, replenishing literature inventory and vendors being slow to pay invoices. The Reserve Fund is at 12.5 million, or 11 months of operation. From both of these reports you can see that our contributions are needed.

The big topic on which we had a lengthy sharing session was the Plain Language Big Book project. Non-Trustee Director AAWS, Clint M and our Delegate Rio facilitated the session. They answered many questions.

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Rio spoke on this topic at the Delegate report in Courtenay in August. This idea of a Plain Language Big Book began in 2016 at the 66 th General Service Conference. There is a possibility that a draft may be available a few months after the next General Service Conference. So far there are 139 pages completed it has only one forward, there is no name as of yet and the cost so far is \$150,000.

The writer is anonymous and it is not known if an alcoholic or not. It is being written at the 5 th Grade level. So far there has been gender neutrality language used and language is going to be gender neutral where it isn't obvious. Some thought that the membership should be given a chance to approve the draft once it is completed. Most felt that our Trusted Servants need to be trusted. A quote 'AA changes at the speed of trust' was mentioned. Samples of the writing can be found in the Literature background material for the 73 rd Conference. You can find more information in the Delegate Report on the public page of the Area website under the News/Delegate tab. Rio is also available to all of us to have a more informed discussion, you can reach her through the Area website.

Would you like to help connect people coming from treatment centres to our AA community? If so contact the Treatment & Samp; Accessibilities Chair to learn more about our Bridging the Gap program. If you would like to do the same for those being released from jails please contact the Corrections Chair. Both Chairs can be contacted through the Area website, both would love our help! There is a hybrid Grapevine Writing Workshop being held on Oct 14/23. You can find the poster on the Area website and on our very own website comoxvalleyaa.ca.

Literature - a booklet in large print 'AA for the Older Alcoholic-Never Too Late' and the revised pamphlet 'Young People in AA' are now completed. I am not sure how quickly we will have these in our Literature supply. The Daily Reflections is now available in audio format. Work is still being done on the BC/Yukon First Nations, Inuit & map; Metis Recovery story project. There will be a collection of audio and written stories. If you wish to be involved you may contact the Area Literature chair through, you guessed it, the Area website!

The 73rd General Service Conference Final Report is now available at aa.org: https://www.aa.org/2023-general-service-conference-final-report

As usual all of the minutes of this Assembly will be available through our Area Newsletter Grassroots posted on the Area website, the password is aagrassroots.

There were three motions submitted, only motion # 3 was passed. Motion #3 was dealing with paying travel costs for the ASC to attend the Regional forum in Vernon May 10-12, 2024. More information on the regional Forum to come, for now just save the date! There were 4 Floor Actions none of them passed. I feel my report is long enough so I will not go into more detail about these. I have a full report of the assembly, please feel free to contact me if you would like it or if you have any questions.

Don't forget the 2025 International Convention will be in Vancouver July 3-6. Trish L. is heading this event and more information will be available January 2024.

District 4 news- The Committee Chairs are doing their parts to carry the message of AA in our community. I am hoping for an improved attendance at our District meeting now that summer is winding down. I am so thankful for the GSRs and DCCs that are stepping up to keep our District not only running but hopefully flourishing.

Step Ten

Step ten is the first of the "maintenance steps." It provides a daily check of our mental and spiritual status. Having completed the overhaul work of steps four through nine, step ten is our key to practicing the A.A. way of living in our daily lives. Character defects, like our disease of alcoholism, can be cunning, baffling and powerful. Though steps four through seven relieve much of our pain and difficulty, old defects can assume new symptoms and seemingly different defects can appear like a new strain of the flu. These defects are deadly for alcoholics: if left untreated, we will drink. As with all the steps, we need to be rigorously honest, both in our inventory and in promptly admitting and addressing it. We must thoroughly examine our motives and guard against the comfort of using rationalization to justify questionable conduct. I love this passage from the Twelve and Twelve: "Our first objective will be the development of self-restraint. This carries a top priority rating. When we speak or act hastily or rashly, the ability to be fair-minded and tolerant evaporates on the spot. ... Nothing pays off like restraint of tongue and pen." The better we get at self-restraint, the sweeter are our evening inventories! "An honest regret for harms done, a genuine gratitude for blessings received, and a willingness to try for better things tomorrow will be the permanent assets we shall seek."


Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the AA name ought never be drawn into public controversy.

I was tremendously relieved, when I first entered into Alcoholics Anonymous to learn that AA will not, or more importantly, cannot force its membership to take sides on any issue that is not founded in its primary purpose of carrying its message to the next suffering alcoholic. Tradition Ten, in its long form, states that in matters of politics, alcohol reform or sectarian religion, AA as a whole should not express any opinion which may arouse heated debate. I entered the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous a ripped apart lost soul. While I truly appreciated the outstretched hands of welcome, I was a little untrusting of the motives from the membership. The thought would pop through my head, "what do these people want from me?" You see, ever since early adulthood I have been approached by several smooth talking, sparkling -eyed hucksters who have all made reasonable messages of world peace, revolution or personal salvation. Although wellintentioned with all these various movements, very few of them left enough of a lasting impression for me to stick around. For usually one of two things happened, either that particular issue had lost its relevance or the in-fighting became so unbearable that a group would ultimately disband. In my case, I generally had always felt like an outsider. I never identified what I believed, but one thing for sure, I've come to recognize that since I got sober, my personal views, beliefs and my life in general has been changing and evolving. The attitudes and views I had in early sobriety are really not the same as they are today. I may vote differently, spiritual matters have taken different twists and turns, and ideas on alcohol reform and treatment have changed. So if a single individual can have such a drastic change of heart in several matters, how can anyone believe they can keep a group growing strong if they allow such heated topics to enter into the debate and stay? The pioneers of Alcoholics Anonymous have paved a way for all of us to pursue our own personal desires, yet to remind us that whatever our protestations, we must remain true to our groups and keep whatever outside issue out of AA starting at our group level. Nothing can so split us apart without the application of Tradition Ten.

Archives

October 1943 – A second A.A. Group forms in Canada when alcoholics begin meeting in Windsor, Ontario.

October 1944 – Reader's Digest publishes an article titled, "Maybe I Can Do It Too" about how A.A. member Edward G got sober. For the next four years, this article would appear in translation in several of the publication's international editions.

October 1953 – The Big Book is introduced in Belgium. Within months after its introduction, A.A. Groups begin forming in Brussels, Flanders, and Wallonia.

October 1954 – The "Alcoholic Foundation" becomes the General Service Board of A.A.

October 1956 – The first overseas General Service Board is established in London, England to serve A.A. Groups in Great Britain and Ireland.

October 1957 – Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age is first published.

October 1958 – Alcoholics Anonymous is called upon to play an advisory role in the TV broadcast of "Days of Wine and Roses". The play, examining the lives of an alcoholic married couple seeking help from A.A., will reach an international audience when produced as a movie in 1962.

October 8-11, 1969 – First World Services Meeting is held in New York. Representatives from General Service Offices from around the world hold a meeting to exchange ideas on literature distribution, service structure, publishing, and finance. The countries in attendance were Australia, Belgium, Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, Finland, France, Germany, Guatemala, Holland, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, South Africa, United Kingdom, and United States.

October 1991 –800 Native Americans from 100 tribes in U.S. and Canada attend the First Native American A.A. Convention in Las Vegas, NV
