



Rules for the Road seminar scheduled for southern Illinois

Illinois Farm Bureau will host Rules for the Road transportation seminars for members in February and March. These seminars are designed for IFB members of all experience levels, whether driving semi or pickup trucks, to learn about the latest transportation laws and trucking regulations.

Each seminar will typically feature Illinois State Police and representatives from the Department of Transportation. Attendees will have the opportunity to ask questions about real-life experiences and agriculture-related questions about trucking regulations.

IFB Associate Director of Transportation and Infrastruc-

ture Rodney Knittel will present information about compliance, new regulations and safety.

A seminar will be held in Union County at the Union County Farm Bureau office on February 24, 2026. A meal will be provided at 5:30 p.m. with the presentation beginning at 6 p.m.

A virtual seminar will take place on March 19, 2026 for those who cannot attend the in-person meetings. More in-person options are available statewide.



IFB policies that are national in scope are forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation for consideration during its policy-development process. Policies adopted at the AFBF annual meeting become both AFBF's and Illinois' public policy positions on national and international issues.

Our members are great cooks. And, many not only are great cooks, they do the ultimate balancing act of cooking on the go for a busy family, while keeping it healthy to meet various dietary needs and tastes, and keeping it affordable. Whew – that's a big job!

NO-BAKE CHOCOLATE PEPPERMINT COOKIES



Serves: 24 cookies Prep time: 20 min Cook Time: 10 min

INGREDIENTS

4 candy canes or
8 peppermints
12 ounce dark chocolate, chopped
1/2 teaspoon peppermint extract
24 butter crackers (such as Ritz Crackers)
1 pinch flaky sea salt, for topping

DIRECTIONS

Step 1 Line a cookie sheet with parchment or wax paper. Set aside.

Step 2 Place the candy canes or peppermint mints into a zip top bag. Using a rolling pin or heavy skillet, crush the candies. Remove the candies from the bag into a bowl and set aside.

Step 3 Fill a sauce pot with a few inches of water. Place the pot onto the stovetop and bring to a simmer. Put 3/4 of the chocolate into a large glass bowl and place the bowl over top of the simmering pot of water to create a double boiler. Stir with a rubber spatula until the chocolate is completely melted. Once smooth, remove the bowl from the heat. Add the rest of the chocolate and the peppermint extract and stir until fully melted. (Adding in the last 1/4 of the chocolate will prevent the chocolate from getting too hot.)

Step 4 Using a fork, dip the butter crackers, one at a time into the chocolate, shaking off any excess. Place the chocolate dipped cracker onto the parchment lined sheet tray and sprinkle the top with the crushed candy. Repeat with remaining crackers.

Step 5 Let the chocolate set at room temperature. Once dry, store in an airtight container in a cool, dark place.


Carrier Mills Stonefort Elementary School Teacher Erin Parks Gets Recognized


Scholarship Recipients recognized at Pulaski-Alexander Annual Meeting


New programs and resources hitting the Pulaski-Alexander and Massac Agriculture in the Classroom!


All donations will be dispersed back to food donation centers and blessing boxes throughout the counties we serve!

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

Chocolate Farming

whe cacao tree grows in the tropics. This delicate tree lives in the understory of the tropical forest, where it is sheltered from the sun and wind by taller trees.



In the past, some cacao farmers cut down large sections of rain forest to open up new fields to grow a hybrid variety of the cacao tree without shade. In addition to destroying valuable rain forest land, farmers needed to apply chemical fertilizers and pesticides to ensure the growth of the hybrid trees.

Fortunately, most of today's cacao farms practice sustainable methods of growing cacao under the shade of taller trees. Sustainable farmers use environmentallyfriendly techniques such as planting tall, beneficial, native crops such as banana, cashew, or coconut trees among the cacao trees, thus providing shade canopy. These "shade farms" provide the habitat needed to host the insects that naturally pollinate the cacao as well as those that feast on cacao pests. These types of farms also maintain the natural systems that keep the soil fertile—eliminating the need for

Harvesting Cacao Seeds

Chocolate is made from the seeds of the cacao tree. They grow in a football-shaped fruit called a pod. Farmers harvest the pods by hand, then cut them open and scoop out the pulp and seeds, which they cover with burlap or banana leaves, or place in wooden boxes, to ferment. This process reduces the cacao's natural bitterness and begins to release the chocolate flavor. After a few days of fermentation, the seeds from the cacao pod darken into

rich brown cocoa beans, which the farmer dries in the sun before taking them to a collection site for shipment to chocolate factories around the world.

There are three main varieties of cacao tree:

Criollo produces a very high quality bean. It is most rare and highly prized for its flavor. It is grown mainly in Central America and the Caribbean.

Forastero, cultivated in Africa and Brazil, produces a bean with a strong chocolate taste. It provides approximately 80% of the world's cacao.

Trinitario, a disease-resistant and easily-cultivated cross between the Criollo and the Forastero, has smooth pods and flavorful beans. It is grown mainly in Central and South America and Asia.
