# **Rural Nurse Practitioner Scholarship**

We are pleased to announce that the Illinois Farm Bureau® Rural Nurse Practitioner Scholarship Program is now open for applications. This program offers 15 scholarships, each valued at \$4,000, to support nurse practitioners committed to serving rural communities in Illinois.

For over 33 years, this scholarship initiative has been instrumental in fostering a robust network of rural health practitioners, addressing the primary healthcare needs in Illinois' rural areas. # Grower Requirements to comply with Endangered Species Act

New mitigation measure requirements may appear on pesticide labels as a result of changes to US EPA's Endangered Species Act. US EPA lost numerous lawsuits, most recently in September of 2023, as a result the US EPA is implementing changes in pesticide use to meet their requirements under Endangered Species Act (ESA).

The ESA is intended to protect and promote the recovery of species that are in danger of becoming extinct. Threats to a species from habitat destruction, pollution, over-harvesting, disease, predation and other natural or man-made factors must be reviewed and evaluated before an animal or plant can be placed on the federal endangered or threatened species list. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Marine (See ESA on page 11)

The Endangered Species Act passed decades ago, aims to protect our nation's endangered and threatened species. Recently, advocacy by environmental groups, enabled by this legislation, has driven changes to the environmental policy that will impact Illinois farmers' access to key crop protection tools. The Herbicide Strategy, finalized in August 2024, and the recent proposed decision by the US Fish and Wildlife Service to list the Monarch butterfly as a protected species are two examples of changes that will affect Illinois growers.

Please join Illinois Soybean, Illinois Corn, Illinois Farm Bureau, and local County Farm Bureaus for a grower-focused discussion designed to prepare Illinois farmers for these changes. Subject matter experts from all

three organizations, and Dr. Karla Gage, Southern Illinois University, will guide growers through these changes and discuss their potential impact on farms.

### **POLICY DEVELOPMENT** ENDANGERED What's Your View? SPECIES

#### **Policy #19** ENDANGERED SPECIES We Support:

1. A moratorium on additional listings under the Endangered Species Act (ESA) in its current form until such time as it is amended and updated to accommodate the needs of both endangered and threatened species and humans with complete respect for private property rights within the framework of the

2. Endangered and threatened species protection that is achieved through providing incentives to private landowners and public land

users rather than by imposing land use restrictions and penalties.

3. The burden of proof for listing being on the petitioner, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service or the National Marine Fisheries Service (together, the Agencies), rather than on the general public.

4. Scientific and peer-reviewed data being used as the basis for listing a species, as well as the basis for the development of United States Constitution. regional or state conservation plans involving those species.

5. A legitimate state-level process of involving stakeholders, including farm

Illinois Farm Bureau's grassroots policy-development process provides members the opportunity to express thoughts and ideas on important issues impacting agriculture. When properly supported through the grassroots policy-development process, these concerns are considered and may be adopted by the voting delegates at the organization's annual meeting each December.

Policies approved at the annual meeting direct IFB's legislative priorities and programming. It is from this grassroots input and direction that Farm Bureau realizes its strength as an organization to serve the needs of the members. Adopted organizations, the Illinois Department of Agriculture, and agricultural representatives, in discussions around listing decisions and conservation planning.

6. A more efficient process for the delisting of species that allows the Agencies to achieve the stated objectives of the ESA: to recover and delist species.

7. Reasonable assurance mechanisms at the federal and state level that allow farmers to conduct normal farming activities without fear of liability under the ESA and Illinois' Endangered Species Protection Act.

#### policies become the public policy positions of IFB.

IFB policies that are national in scope are forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation for consideration during its policy-development process. Policies adopted at the AFBF annual meeting become both AFBF's and Illinois' public policy positions on national and international issues.

#### We Oppose:

1. The recognition of species that are considered under threat versus endangered to be a factor in liabilities to private landowners.

2. A definition of critical habitat that includes areas without the current presence of an endangered species.

3. The listing of the monarch butterfly as a threatened or endangered species.

4. Any group that receives funding pursuant to the ESA or as a result of litigation associated with the ESA, from being able to petition, support or encourage the listing of a species.

### SWEET POTATO QUESADILLAS

#### DIRECTIONS Step 1

Poke holes into the sweet potato and microwave on high until soft throughout when poked with a fork, 3 to4 minutes. Let cool before peeling, at least 10 minutes.

Step 2

Peel sweet potato and mash flesh in a bowl. Stir in pecans and nutmeg. Spread mixture over half of the tortilla. Sprinkle onion and feta cheese over the filling.

Step 3 Fold tortilla in half and press edges together to prevent filling from spilling out.

Step 4

Heat oil in a medium skillet over medium heat. Cook quesadilla until golden brown, about 2 minutes per side. Remove from the skillet and cut into wedges.

# **Southern Illinois Young Leaders** at IFB Young Leader Conference

PEORIA – 418 young leaders in agriculture from across the state met in Peoria for the Illinois Farm Bureau Young Leaders Conference, held Feb. 7-8.

Among them, Josh Reinhardt represents District 16, Samuel Deisher represents District 17 and Katelin Stratmeyer represents District 18 on the 2024 State Young Leader Committee.

Members from Franklin, Jackson and Perry counties as well as the SIU Collegiate Farm Bureau attended the 2024 conference, which featured industry experts from across the ag landscape, educating the attendees on a wide range of topics, including succession planning, USDA programs, communication with generations, the resolution committee process, grazing land practices, ground leasing negotiations and much more.

The keynote address was given by Elaine Froese, Elaine Froese, CSP is a certified professional speaker, certified coach, and author. She's a go-to expert for farm families who want better communication and conflict resolution to secure a successful farm transition. In front of a packed room of 418 registered attendees, Froese spoke about succession planning and how to communicate with families

during that process.

Committee members engage with others from around the state at conferences and workshops and through their district and county Farm Bureau.

#### **Farmers Name their Fields National Ag Week Partnership**

We paused harvest to host our daughter's sixth birthday party at Norman North, a field along a winding gravel road. The dusty path contains just two houses and a hill you wouldn't want to attempt in slick conditions.

Whether remote or often seen, the fields we drive past on interstates, highways or rural routes have names. Farmers identify some by numbers, but most have names known only to their keepers. Thank goodness for Google pins that I can text to navigate new employees to Dump Road, Big Top or Myrtice 33 that adjoins with Don 40 (and which side is which). Likewise, I would need directions to find The Y or Seldom Seen – field names that local farmers shared with me.

Field location, size, the owner or, most commonly, the surname of the previous owner, dictate field names. My family owns Lievens Back Bottom, Beecher North and Haxton Homeplace but the previous owners' names still identify the field, a culturally influenced practice and a nod to the past.

The Big and Little Bottoms have everything to do with rivers and nothing with glutes. Doug's Southeast, Pat's North and Ostrom South of Lane indicate directions from that landowner's homestead. Sometimes, round numbers like 40 or 80 in the name represent the acreage but we do

have anomalies like Donna 73. The add-ons of Cemetery and Railroad in the name reference local landmarks except for Sunoco, which alludes to the gas station that once was.

The labels carryover into vehicles, equipment and structures with most names preceded by "the," such as The Kodiak, The One Ton, Truck Six, The Lower Shed or The New Bin that turns 30 years old this year. We will forever remember Jaws, the 1974 steel-bodied, white and rusty farm car for which the Secretary of State generated a random license plate with "JAW" plus some numbers. Dad put a hitch on that Chevelle, and Mom used it like a truck.

From a record-keeping standpoint, field names are associated with large amounts of data, such as acreage totals, government numbers, insurance identification, satellite images, guidance lines, crop nutrient information and production histories. The names also preserve stories. In the Big Bottom, my family learned of 9/11. At the Wataga Farm my husband asked permission for my hand, and during our farm's harvest at the State Ground, our daughter was born. Within those field boundaries, we live life and make a living.

# ESA

Fisheries Service, collectively known as the Services, administer the ESA.

However, the ESA requires that all federal agencies, including EPA, make sure that any action they authorize, fund or carry out won't jeopardize the existence of listed species or "destroy or adversely modify" any designated critical habitat for that species. The role EPA has in implementing the ESA is to ensure that the use of pesticides is not likely to jeopardize listed species or destroy or adversely modify their critical habitat when we register pesticides.

All pesticide products that EPA determines "may affect" a listed

species or its designated critical habitat may be subject to the Endangered Species Protection Program (ESPP.) The goal of ESPP is to carry out EPA's responsibilities under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA). EPA reviews each registered pesticide at least every 15 years to ensure that each pesticide can carry out its intended function(s) without creating "unreasonable adverse effects to human health and the environment" and updates their respective labels. Currently, many pesticide labels are being updated to include ESA requirements.

Follow these steps to ensure you are in compliance with ESA:

Read the pesticide label. Pesticide labels and applications requirements could be changing. BASF's Liberty Ultra label was

recently updated, section 9 outlines Mandatory Spray Drift Management and Section 11 outlines Mandatory Runoff Mitigation requirements. Some pesticide labels direct users to check specific application requirements within 6 months of application on US EPA's web site , https://www.epa. gov/endangered-species/bulletins-live-two-view-bulletins . If a pesticide has an "Active Bulletin" then the pesticide has mitigation measures identified to protect the listed species in that area. BLT will indicate the number of mitigation points needed to apply the pesticide in compliance with ESA. These Bulletins contain enforceable pesticide use limitations.



The purpose of the "STB" campaign is to build community resilience. In doing so, residents are better prepared to save lives by knowing how to help in bleeding emergencies. These trainings enhance public health and safety

while fostering collaboration among community organizations. Bleeding is a common injury in farming such as open wounds and amputations. The fatal injury rate in agriculture is 7.5 times higher than any other industry. Trauma-related deaths are often caused by bleeding. A person with a severe bleeding injury can bleed out in 3 to 5 minutes. Rural residents typically

wait twice as long for emergency medical services than urban residents. STB is a trauma training initiative that teaches residents how to apply pressure, pack wounds and apply tourniquets in order to improve survival rates until first responders arrive. 


## WHAT IS ILLINOIS AGRICULTURE?
