#### The 1973 Yom Kippur War


Despite the complete defeat of three Arab armies in the 1967 Six Day War, how was it that Israel failed to anticipate the assault on two fronts six years later? And how did the IDF (Israeli Defence Force) regain control in the 'Valley of Tears'?

Colonel Malkin will be discussing the war's context and conduct, its political background and intelligence failures, utilising his intimate knowledge of both the area and the protagonists, gained from 5 years living in Palestine and Israel.


#### **Previously: Agincourt: Myth and Reality**

At our June meeting Professor Anne Curry gave an excellent talk on the battle, setting the political climate with France that resulted in the battle at Agincourt and its context in the wider history of the Hundred Years War.

A surprise was the that the facts of the battle have been continually "upgraded" or changed by many of the subsequent generations. This has led to numerous myths being born of the battle, from Shakespeare's version of events in Henry V to the Laurence Olivier's version of it in 1944.

Neither being particularly true.

By 1944 It had become a marker of "Englishness" and, as such, entited many people to claim their ancestors were present at the battle, fighting the European foe.



She also explained some very real concerns over the exact location for the battle and pointed out that more research was needed to categorically fix the location. She believes the currently accepted location to be close but not exact.

Intrigued? Did your ancestors fight in France during the period?...discover whether they did here.

It was a fascinating and memorable journey with Professor Curry and our thanks go out to her.

#### First trailer for '1917' aired

Excitement began to rise back when it was first announced that Sam Mendes would direct Steven Spielberg's production house's star-studded film '1917'. Including Benedict Cumberbatch, Colin Firth, Mark Strong and Richard Madden, the cast are followed through what has been described as the 'hellscapes' of the Western Front. The movie will have a limited opening on Christmas Day before full release on 10<sup>th</sup>January 2020. Read more.

#### **Generals in the Making**

Benjamin Runkle's new book on Marshall, Eisenhower and Patton among others addresses the contribution of luck and fate in the rise of some of the most prominent generals of the Second World War. As Runkle recounts, "Eisenhower was called to the War Department after Pearl Harbor because the head of the War Plans Division's Asia department was killed in a plane crash on December 10, 1941. This accident forced [George] Marshall to find a replacement, thereby setting in motion the partnership that was crucial to winning the war." Read more

#### Operation Banner remembered 50 years on

14<sup>th</sup> August marked the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Operation Banner commencing in Northern Ireland. Over 300,000 British personnel served and 1,441 died in the following 38 years. To mark the anniversary, the Royal British Legion hosted a commemoration of this longest deployment of British forces at the National Memorial Arboretum.

#### Site chosen for All-Ireland Military Museum

A cross-border committee has selected the site of the Battle of the Boyne for the new All-Ireland Military Museum, with its location being just 30 minutes from Dublin and 90 from Belfast. The ambition is to mirror the scope and success of the UK's 150-acre National Memorial Arboretum in the Midlands. Read more

#### From Haversacks to Skate Bags: The Secret History of Military Packs

Revealing developments over the last 160 years, Jon Custis has published his research into the influence that civilian backpacks have had on military packs, and vice versa. From the US Civil War to America's entry to the Second World War, army packs evolved gradually but it was in 1941 that the US Army Quartermaster borrowed heavily from a 1910 Norwegian creation and called upon the National Ski Association to assess the design. #### 'War Is a Racket II'

Vietnam veteran Robert F. Boland has taken General Smedley Butler's 1935 book 'War is a Racket', expanded on the theme and brought it up-to-date with his 'War Is a Racket II: How the United States Government Manipulated the Country into Unnecessary Wars and Military Interventions'. Boland's book takes the reader from the Revolutionary War up to the Iraq War and reminds us that the US currently has 800 military bases in 70 countries. Read more

#### **County Antrim museum curator honoured**

Starting with his grandfather's Great War belt and chocolate tin, David McCallion has gone on to collect a vast array of military memorabilia and share his collection with the public as the 'War Years Remembered' museum. In mid-July he was awarded the 'Points of Light' award from then-PM Theresa May. Read more
