As the world was being destroyed by the *mabul*, and Noach's ark was fighting off the waters of the deadly flood, Noach was kept busy. As Chazal teach us, Noach didn't have a spare moment to himself, as he was always on his toes ensuring the survival of each species in his care, making sure every single animal was fed.

Recently, I thought of the following question: Hashem clearly surrounded Noach with open miracles, as the only way his man-made ark which he constructed single-handedly was able to withstand a flood that literally wiped out the entire world was through miracles. Why, then, didn't He allow Noach to just rest in the *tevah* while providing another miracle that the animals would just survive on their own, without the need for Noach to feed and take care of them? Why did Hashem have Noach busy with such trivial matters?

Perhaps, one can suggest that really Hashem had Noach busy with the animals' survival and wellbeing for the sake of Noach's personal survival and wellbeing. Noach was witnessing the annihilation of the entire planet, and perhaps, while experiencing such a moment of darkness and destruction, Noach would have fallen into his own darkness and depression; thus, to save Noach, He specifically had him busy with chesed, feeding animals. Perhaps, the Torah here is teaching us a crucial lesson for life. Whenever you are experiencing darkness, in whatever way, whether it be physical, emotional, psychological, financial, interpersonal, spiritual, or other – it is imperative to tap into a reservoir of light. As many can attest, helping others and doing chesed brings happiness and light into one's life like no physical pleasure can match. Noach and his family weren't running around the ark with animal feed for nothing; they were given the opportunity to be involved with chesed to imbue the ark with light in a world of darkness.

Each of us has countless opportunities to help, lift, and empower those around us. Grab each of those opportunities like gold; there's nothing better than **giving** to Hashem's children – our fellow brothers and sisters.
