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2020 Annual Report

In January the US Army Corps of Engineers completed their annual report which provides an interesting snapshot of the 2020 year in review at Raystown Lake.

Recreation

In June, Raystown was granted a waiver to allow camping and beach use, and the remainder of the summer and fall saw extremely high visitation as trend changes related to COVID-19 pushed visitors outdoors and to the lake. Despite a 2 month delayed opening, Raystown's Seven Points campground was the number 1 revenue generating facility out of approximately 770 USACE campgrounds across the country. The campground saw a 35% increase in occupancy (50 percent occupancy in 2019 to 85 percent in 2020) and a total revenue increase of over \$175,000 from 2019 (despite fees remaining the same).

Resource

The natural resource staff partnered with the PA Game Commission to complete Rx fire and forest management, aquatic herbicide was applied to 82.5 acres of hydrilla, and there were 3 active timber sales underway in 2020. Due to COVID-19 there was no fish structure building program, but the staff worked with the PA Fish and Boat Commission to fell 25 shoreline trees for fish habitat. Additionally, stone deflectors were constructed as part of the shoreline stabilization project in Susquehannock.

Maintenance

Significant maintenance projects completed this past year include new roofs on the Visitor Center, Aitch shelter, and Corbin's Island shelter, new restroom facilities at Nancy's Campground, Corbin's Island and Shy Beaver, an expanded parking lot at Corbin's Island and campsite improvements in Susquehannock. In addition, significant engineering work continues on the Raystown Dam tainter gates. SUNOCO completed all pipeline construction work on the project and donated a pontoon boat to the FRL for various projects.

Finally a warm up at the end of February after a rough month of weather! The Friends of Raystown Lake is gearing up for spring. Plans are underway for the Raystown Bike Fest in May, and as the snow melts we will begin working on some repairs to the Allegrippis Trails. RayCEP is beginning to look at candidates for the upcoming season and working to secure grant funding for the upcoming season. FRL and Sunoco are working through red tape and forms to complete the donation of the pontoon boat. FRL along with several other organizations have been awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Army Corps of Engineers to build a disc golf course in the Seven Points Area. Fish structure construction will occur in April and the annual lake cleanup is scheduled for early May. Putt's Camp is receiving reservations for the upcoming year. So, things are underway and FRL continues to meet via Zoom for the immediate future. At some point when conditions allow the group to get together for a meeting, postponed elections will be held. Reminder that 2021 memberships are due and all the money goes

Raystown Lake Disc Golf Course

Birdie, Fairway, Backhand, Driver, Tomahawk. If you know anything about the sports of golf or ultimate frisbee, these terms probably sound familiar to you. Combine the two and you get disc golf, the newest outdoor recreation activity coming soon to Raystown Lake!

The US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Raystown Lake Project was recently selected as a recipient of \$25,000 as part of the Handshake Partnership Program that will be used to build a new 18-hole disc golf course in the Seven Points Recreation Area at Raystown Lake.

The Friends of Raystown Lake will partner with the US Army Corps of Engineers, the Standing Stone Disc Golf Club (SSDGC), Let's Go Throw, and the Huntingdon County Visitors Bureau (HCVB) to help design, construct, and promote the course. Rick Romo, owner of Let's Go Throw, is looking forward to the new opportunities the course will provide all Raystown visitors, stating that "the goal in designing and building this course will be that all visitors to our beautiful Raystown Lake region will have access to disc golf, which provides another means to live a healthier life."

The course will use the varied terrain and topographical features in the Seven Points area to make the course engaging for individuals or families learning how to play, novices seeking to build their skills, and experts looking for a challenge. Additionally, the course will attract a new user group, disc golfers, to Raystown Lake while also providing a new recreational activity to existing user groups, including campers, boaters, hikers, bikers, and more.

Pennsylvania Interscholastic Cycling League



At our FRL meeting this February, we were joined by guest speaker Melissa Davies from the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Cycling League (PICL) who shared information about the organization and potential events they have planned on the Allegrippis Trails in 2021.

PICL is a non-profit 501(c)3 organization that was founded in 2015 with the goal of "providing fun, safe, and competitive mountain biking opportunities for middle (grades 6-8) & high school students across Pennsylvania". The group is a subsidiary of the National Interscholastic Cycling Association (NICA) which works to empower youth across the country "to be part of a

thriving and engaged cycling community".

This year, PICL plans to hold a "Allegrippis Coaches Retreat" on May 13-16 to provide training to team coaches and their 2nd annual "Awesome Allegrippis Adventure Weekend" from October 22-24 for approximately 400-600 youth and 200 coaches from across the state, which will feature scavenger hunts, group rides and stewardship events.





The group also participates in a NICA program known as the Teen Trail Corps which focuses on encouraging youth to serve and volunteer their time towards bike related advocacy activities, such as trail work. As a part of this program, PICL coaches and youth participants plan to volunteer during their spring and fall events and work with FRL trail coordinators to perform trail maintenance tasks.
