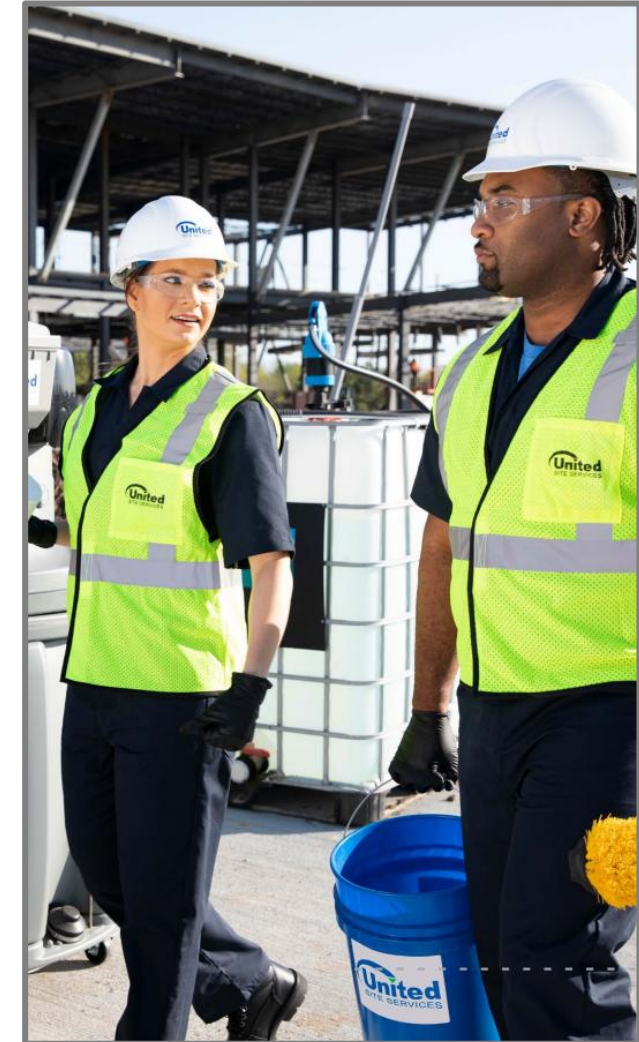

What is Lytx:

Advanced Camera System

United Site Services is committed to your safety and the safety of those around you. That's why we've implemented Lytx—an advanced camera system that captures driving behavior and delivers both positive reinforcement and constructive feedback to help improve performance and reduce risk.

Documenting Driving Performance

The Lytx system helps protect you by documenting your driving performance in the event of an accident. It also identifies signs of fatigue, aggressive driving, and other risky behaviors—allowing for timely coaching and support.

LYTX SYSTEM FEEDBACK

RISKY DRIVING

- Harsh braking
- Rapid acceleration
- Hard cornering
- Following too closely (tailgating)
- Unsafe lane changes
- Speeding
- Rolling stops

DRIVER DISTRACTIONS

- Cell phone use
- Smoking while driving
- Eating or drinking
- Not wearing a seatbelt
- Driver inattentiveness (looking away from the road)

FATIGUE AND ALERTNESS

- Drowsiness or signs of fatigue
- Yawning or head nodding
- Eyes closing or not scanning the road
- Collision-Related Events
- Near misses
- Low-speed impacts
- Sudden stops

POSITIVE DRIVING

- Defensive driving techniques
- Safe following distances
- Smooth acceleration and braking
- Proper seatbelt usage
- Compliance with speed limits
- Proactive hazard avoidance

WELCOME!

A Lytx intervention is a coaching opportunity conducted by a safety rep when a major violation—or a pattern of smaller violations—occurs.

Lytx violations have a point system. The more dangerous the incident, the more points acquired. Upon crossing the threshold, a Lytx intervention is warranted.



LYTX INTERVENTION

The purpose of the intervention is to:

1. Document violations
2. Inform the driver of the observed violations
3. Identify the root cause of the behavior
4. Provide actionable recommendations to prevent future occurrences



ZERO TOLERANCE POLICY

Zero-Tolerance Policy

Effective August 1, 2025, United Site Services adopted a zero-tolerance policy for cell phone violations.

Cell Phones and Seat Belts

As emphasized in previous modules, cell phone use while driving is **strictly prohibited**. Additionally, seat belts must be worn at all times by both drivers and passengers whenever the service truck is in motion.

Bottom Line

Failing to follow these safety policies carries **serious consequences**. Your safety—and the safety of others—depends on it.

CONTESTING AN EVENT

- **To contest an event captured by Lytx, a new hire has the opportunity to request a review through their supervisor or safety representative.**
- The video footage will be re-evaluated, and if the event was flagged in error, it will be removed from the driver's record.
- To contest an event, speak with your OS and safety rep.



TROUBLE SHOOTING THE LYTX CAMERA



Lytx cameras are valuable not only for identifying risky behavior, but also for protecting you—the driver—from liability when you're in the right.

That's why it's critical to ensure the camera is properly mounted and fully operational at all times.
