



The Battle of the Coral Sea: A Turning Point in the Pacific

In May 1942, the vast blue waters of the Pacific Ocean churned with tension. The world was deep in the throes of World War II, and Japan, emboldened by a string of victories, set its sights on expanding its reach across the Pacific. Their next target was Port Moresby in New Guinea—a foothold that would threaten Australia and shift the balance of power.



But the Allies were watching.

Through skilled intelligence work, American forces cracked Japanese communication codes. They learned of the planned assault and quickly prepared a counterstrike. Two American aircraft carriers, USS Lexington and USS Yorktown, along with Australian naval support, rushed to the Coral Sea. They didn't know exactly what lay ahead—but they knew they had to stop the Japanese advance.

In a clash unlike any before, the Battle of the Coral Sea became the first naval battle where opposing ships never directly saw or fired upon each other. Instead, the carriers launched wave after wave of planes, their pilots dueling in the skies above the open sea.

On May 7, 1942, the fighting exploded. American bombers struck and sank the Japanese light carrier **Shoho**, famously radioing back, "Scratch one flattop!" The following day, the battle intensified. Japanese planes heavily damaged Yorktown, while American pilots inflicted serious damage on the Japanese carrier Shokaku. But the price was high: after

repeated attacks, the USS Lexington suffered uncontrollable fires and had to be abandoned, her crew watching in heartbreak as she was scuttled beneath the waves.

Though the losses were heavy on both sides, the strategic outcome was clear. Japan was forced to cancel its invasion of Port Moresby. For the first time in the war, a major Japanese advance had been stopped.

The Battle of the Coral Sea was a costly, hard-fought drawbut it marked a crucial shift. It showed that Japan's dominance could be challenged, and it paved the way for even greater victories, like the pivotal Battle of Midway just a month later.

Today, the Coral Sea is remembered not just for the ships and men lost, but for the bravery and determination that helped turn the tide of war.

Children of Fallen Patriots Day

is observed annually on **May 13** to honor the children of U.S. military service members who have died in the line of duty. Established in 2014 by the Children of Fallen Patriots Foundation, the day aims to recognize the sacrifices and resilience of these children and to raise awareness about the challenges they face. The date was chosen because it coincides with the establishment of Arlington National Cemetery in 1864, a symbol of national remembrance for fallen service members.

The Children of Fallen Patriots Foundation provides college scholarships and educational counseling to Gold Star children—those who have lost a parent in military service. Since its inception in 2002, the foundation has awarded over \$70 million in assistance to more than 3,500 students. Despite these efforts, it's estimated that nearly 25,000 children have lost a parent in military service over the past 35 years, many of whom still need support.

While not yet a federally recognized observance, Children of Fallen Patriots Day has been officially proclaimed by governors and mayors across 27 states and the District of Columbia. The foundation continues to advocate for nationwide recognition to ensure that the sacrifices of these children are acknowledged and supported.



To observe the day, individuals and communities are encouraged to participate in awareness campaigns, support fundraising efforts, and engage in activities that honor the memory of fallen service members and the children they left behind. Donations to the Children of Fallen Patriots Foundation directly contribute to educational opportunities for these children, helping to se cure a brighter future in honor of their parents' ultimate sacrifice.
