World War II

Army Staff Sgt, Louis Doddo – 30. Lost July 8, 1944 during a massive Japanese attack against the 105th on the Island of Saipan. His remains were never found nor were any recovered. Accounted for November 3, 2020. Announced November 30, 2020.

Navy Fire Controlman 2nd Class, Harold Trapp – 24 and his brother Electrician's Mate 3rd Class, William Trapp – 23. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for November 24, 2020. Announced December 1, 2020.

Navy Chief Carpenter's Mate, Tedd Furr – 39. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for November 5, 2020. Announced December 1, 2020.

Navy Chief Warrant Officer, John G. Connolly – 48. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for December 3, 2020. Announced December 8, 2020.

Navy Fireman 1st Class, Paul Saylor – 21. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for November 24, 2020. Announced December 10, 2020.

Army Pvt. Hillary Soileau – 23. Lost and declared missing February 3, 1943. during the Battle of Mount Austen, the Galloping Horse and the Sea Horse on Guadalcanal when American forces went on the offensive to clear Guadalcanal of Japanese forces. Accounted for December 22, 2020.

Korean War

Army Cpl. Roy Thomas – 22. Lost and declared missing December 12, 1950 when his unit was attacked by enemy forces near Chosin Reservoir, North Korea. His remains were never found. Accounted for December 22, 2020.

Army Pfc. William Sharp – 18. Lost July 24, 1950, reported killed in action after his unit sustained heavy casualties while under attack by the North Korean army's advance near Hwanggoon, South Korea. His body was not recovered nor were any remains found. Accounted for December 22, 2020.

Research Groups Find Wreck of "Unsinkable Battleship" USS Nevada.

The USS Nevada, dubbed "unsinkable" has been found off the coast of Hawaii where it lay since 1948.


A group of marine archeologists from Search Inc. and Ocean Infinity, discovered the Nevada almost three miles underwater and about 65 nautical miles southwest of Honolulu.

The Nevada was the longest-serving battleship of the United States Navy. The US Nevada served as a battleship for the US Navy for 30 years. Its lifespan was exceptional, given the troubled waters in which it sailed.

The Nevada was commissioned during WWI and was in service during the Spanish Flue pandemic of 1918 and lost crew members to the disease outbreak while docked in Ireland.

After operating in the Pacific for most of the 1930s, the Nevada was moored at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, when the Japanese Imperial Navy launched a surprise attack on the Pacific Fleet on Oahu on the morning of Dec. 7, 1941.

The Nevada was the only ship to get underway during the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor. Moored at the end of Battleship Row, the Nevada took advantage of the lull after the first wave to get underway. But it had not made it to sea before the second wave of aircraft descended on the harbor, striking the ship with a half-dozen bombs. The crew was forced to beach the sinking ship at the head of the channel.



After frenzied temporary repairs, the Nevada sailed on its own power to the U.S. West Coast in April 1942, where it spent the next year being repaired and overhauled.

The Nevada returned to combat during the Battle of Attu in the Aleutian Island in May 1943 and appeared at three of the major battles of World War II, she supported the D-Day invasion and became part of the Iwo Jima and Okinawa invasions in 1945. In the latter battle, the ship was hit by a kamikaze plane and an artillery shell. The Nevada was preparing to be part of the invasion force on the Japanese mainland when the war ended in September 1945.

With the end of World War II, the Navy deemed the three-decade old battleship too ancient for the fleet. Its final job was to serve as a target during two atomic bomb tests at Bikini in the Marshall Islands in 1946 – though even that dirty work left the ship only badly damaged and radioactive, not sunk.

The U.S.S. Nevada is an iconic ship that speaks to American resilience and stubbornness. Rising from its watery grave after being sunk at Pearl Harbor, it survived torpedoes, bombs, shells and two atomic blasts.

The ship was decommissioned in August 1946, and two years later it was towed to sea off the Hawaiian Islands and used for target practice for other Navy ships. Even that four-day pummeling didn't sink the battle-scarred ship. It was finally scuttled by an aerial torpedo.

The physical reality of the ship, resting in the darkness of the great museum of the sea, reminds us not only of past events, but of those who took up the challenge of defending the United States in two global wars.

Although the Navy was aware of the vicinity of the ship's sinking, its exact resting spot was unknown until now. The search for the USS Nevada was conducted aboard Ocean Infinity's Pacific Constructor vessel, which had set sail for a range of tasks in early 2020, well before the coronavirus had morphed into a pandemic.
