Adjutant Memo:

We have all served but a few have gone up and beyond. I'd like to introduce a former member of Post 21 Gary Heaton of Lafayette who entered the US Army in September of 1965. After training he was assigned to Company C, 1st Battalion, 16th Infantry in Vietnam. On the 26th of April 1966 First Class Grenadier Heaton and his platoon were on a search and destroy mission against the Viet Cong. His platoon made contact with an estimated Viet Cong platoon in a base camp area and came under immediate small arms and automatic weapons fire. When the platoon was engaged, private Heaton was not in a position to fire his grenade launcher. With complete disregard for his own safety he moved to an open area to fire at the insurgents more effectively. Many times the Viet Cong bullets tore up the ground around him, but he continued to place devastating volumes of fire to the hostile positions. He expended his M79 ammunition, defied the intense Viet Cong fire and called back to his comrades to throw him more had grenades so he could continue to fight. The aggressiveness and bravery of Private Heaton spread to other members of his platoon and soon the insurgents were forced to withdraw from there intrenched positions. Private Heaton's outstanding display of aggressiveness, devotion to duty and personal bravery is in keeping with finest traditions of the military service. For his actions he was awarded the Bronze Star with 'V' device in June of 1966. I only wish that Gary was still a member of Post 21 so that one day I could shake his hand.

What's coming? Well, in talking with members who have been around for years, they can't ever remember the post having a budget. I, personally, have never worked for an organization that didn't have an operating budget. So, we are 7 months into the year, but we are working with our finance committee on creating a Post budget for calendar year 2024. We hope to have a draft ready for preview and presentation to the Executive Committee on August 19, then to the general membership on August 21 st. Our goal is to begin the 2025 budget in October and have it approved by December 31, 2024 or at the very latest, January 20, 2025.

Our finance committee is made up of myself as the chairperson, Debra Godwin, Club Manager, Juan Palacios, Commander and Steve Randles, Member. Both of our office managers participation is critical in assisting the committee and helping to develop a budget. One improvement that we will be implementing is that individual's who spend their own money on something for the post, will be required to complete a prior approval for reimbursement form. See form above right corner. This would be required when it is requested that you purchase something out of pocket, and then wish the post to reimburse you for your expenditure. An example would be that an item is needed and the best price is through Amazon. The post does not have credit cards for those types of purchases, so an individual using their amazon account and their personal credit or debit card purchases the item. That type of purchase that is not typically an emergency would require completion of the prior approval form before purchasing the item. This form is not required for emergencies.



At-Large

The PGA of America is one of golf's largest organizations and works daily to build interest and increase participation in the game. Honoring Military and Veterans, PGA Helping Our Patriots Everywhere (HOPE) introduces the game of golf through a developmental 6-8 week curriculum. Veterans are trained by PGA Professionals with expertise in adaptive golf and military cultural competency. In the Pacific Northwest, programs are funded and supported by PGA REACH. The PGA of America REACH Foundation is the 501(c)(3) charitable foundation of the PGA of America. Golfers of the PGA HOPE programs include military Veterans living with physical and cognitive challenges such as Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and amputees, among other challenges. The program is offered at no cost to Military Veterans and is fully funded by PGA REACH. PGA HOPE has a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Department of Veterans Affairs, which enables Recreational Therapists to refer Veterans to the PGA HOPE program as a form of therapy.

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The Purple Heart: Symbol of Valor and Sacrifice

The Purple Heart is a prestigious military decoration awarded to members of the United States Armed Forces who have been wounded or killed in combat. Established by General George Washington in 1782, it is one of the oldest military awards still in use today and holds deep significance for those who have served their country in times of war.

History and Origins

The origins of the Purple Heart can be traced back to the Revolutionary War. General George Washington, then the commander-in-chief of the Continental Army, established the Badge of Military Merit on August 7, 1782. This badge was intended to recognize acts of valor and merit in combat, and it was awarded to only three soldiers during the Revolutionary War.

The Badge of Military Merit fell into disuse after the Revolutionary War, but its legacy was revived on February 22, 1932, on the 200th anniversary of George Washington's birth. At that time, General Douglas MacArthur, then the Army Chief of Staff, pushed for its revival as a way to honor soldiers wounded in action during World War I.

Criteria and Recognition

The modern Purple Heart is awarded to members of the U.S. Armed Forces who have been wounded or killed in combat with a declared enemy of the United States. It is also awarded posthumously to the next of kin of service members who are killed in action or die of wounds received in action.

The criteria for receiving a Purple Heart have evolved over time, but generally, it is awarded to those who have sustained wounds that require treatment by a medical officer and that result from enemy action. It can also be awarded for injuries that are the result of friendly fire in the heat of battle.

Symbolism and Honor

The Purple Heart is a symbol of courage, sacrifice, and patriotism. It is a tangible recognition of the personal risks and hardships endured by those who have served their country in combat. Recipients of the Purple Heart join a distinguished fraternity of individuals who have made significant sacrifices in defense of their nation's ideals and freedoms.

Legacy and Impact

Since its reintroduction in 1932, hundreds of thousands of Purple Hearts have been awarded to deserving service members across all

branches of the U.S. military. Each Purple Heart tells a story of bravery and resilience in the face of adversity, reminding us of the human cost of war and the valor displayed by those who answer the call to serve.



Famous Purple Heart Recipients Actors, Athletes, Writers and Artists

- ♦ James Arness—Best-known for portraying Matt Dillon
- in Gunsmoke, actor James Arness (1923-2011) earned a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart following time served in World War II. He was severely injured in his right leg during the Battle of Anzio.
- Robert "Rocky" Bleier—During his rookie season as a halfback with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1968, NFL great Rocky Bleier was drafted into the U.S. Army to serve in the Vietnam War. While on patrol with the 196th Infantry Brigade, his platoon was ambushed, and he suffered an injury in his left thigh and lost a portion of his right foot.
- Charles Bronson—American actor Charles Bronson (1921-2003) was known for being a hero and a vigilante on screen and in real life. In 1943, he enlisted in the Air Force and, with the 39th Bombardment Group, flew 25 missions and sustained multiple wounds that were later recognized with a Purple Heart.
- ♦ James Garner—Actor, producer and voice artist was best-



injuries from a mortar round and friendly fire.

- Bill Graham—Famed German-American rock concert promoter Bill Graham (1931-1991) was famous for launching the careers of many 1960s rock stars, including the Grateful Dead and Janis Joplin. After escaping the Nazis in Germany at the age of 10, Graham went on to serve in the Army during the Korean War, where he earned both a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart.
- Ron Kovic—Marine Corps Sergeant Ron Kovic was wounded, and subsequently paralyzed, after coming in contact with North Vietnamese soldiers in the Vietnam War. Kovic went on to become one of the most outspoken anti-war activists of the conflict, penning the memoir Born on the Fourth of July in 1976. The book was made into a film of the same name, made by fellow Purple Heart recipient Oliver Stone.

- ♦ Ernest "Ernie" Pyle—The famous war correspondent Ernie Pyle (1900-1945) was killed in April of 1945 by Japanese fire while accompanying the Army's 77th Infantry. Pyle earned acclaim, and a Pulitzer Prize, for his works accounting the lives of rural Americans and soldiers during World War II before he was shot and killed near Okinawa.
- Rod Serling—Screenwriter and playwright Rod Serling (1924-1975) left a lasting impression on the legacy of television with his science-fiction smash hit The Twilight Zone. He is one of the most decorated Hollywood figures, having received a Purple Heart, a Bronze Star and the Philippine Liberation Medal, among other military decorations. Serling was awarded the decoration after he was wounded in combat in the Philippines.
- Warren Spahn—Major League Baseball All-Star and Cy Young Award winner Warren Spahn (1921-2003) created a lasting legacy after a nearly 20-year career with the then Milwaukee Braves. After finishing the 1942 season in the minor leagues, Spahn enlisted in the Army. He was wounded by a piece of bridge shrapnel in 1945 while helping to repair the collapsing Ludendorff Bridge in Germany.
- Oliver Stone—Prominent writer and filmmaker Oliver Stone, writer of Scarface, used his military career to inspire his professional work. Stone rose to prominence after writing and directing a trilogy of films based on the Vietnam War, beginning with the revered anti-war film Platoon. In 1967, Stone enlisted in the Army and requested combat duty in Vietnam. He was awarded a Purple Heart with Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster, the National Defense Service Medal and others.
- ♦ Kurt Vonnegut—Novelist and playwright Kurt Vonnegut (1922-

2007) served in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps during World War II, where he was captured by the Germans and subsequently taken as a Prisoner of War and held in a slaughterhouse in Dresden. The experience earned him a Purple Heart and inspired his best-

selling novel Slaughterhouse-Five.

Pat Tillman—NFL footballer Pat Tillman (1976-2004) played with the Arizona Cardinals from 1998 until May 2002 when he quit the league to join the U.S. Army. He was a member of the 75th Ranger Regiment, nine months after September 11, 2001. After turning down a \$3.6 million contract, Tillman was deployed to Afghanistan, where he was killed in a friendly-fire inci-

Famous Purple Heart Recipients Military Heroes and Change-makers

Charles Denver Barger—Charles Barger (1892-1936) and Vietnam veteran Curry T. Haynes have been awarded the



most Purple Heart medals in U.S. military history. With 10 Purple Hearts to his name-one silver and four Bronze Leaf Oak Clusters-Barger is one of the most decorated war heroes from World War I.

John F. Kennedy—President John F. Kennedy (1917-1963) is the only president to have received a Purple



Heart. He received the Navy's highest honors after bravely contributing as a gunboat pilot during World War II. While volunteering for motorized torpedo boat duty, the Japanese attacked Kennedy's boat, plunging many of his

shipmates overboard into a sea of burning oil. Kennedy dove into the waters to rescue three of his fellow shipmates and swallowed some of the water.

John Kerry—Former Secretary of State John Kerry served a four-month tour of duty as an officer-in-charge



of a swift boat during the Vietnam War. For his service, he was awarded three Purple Heart medals in addition to the Silver Star Medal and the Bronze Star Medal. His war injuries include a shrapnel wound in the left arm, a shrapnel

wound in the left leg and an impact wound to his arm after he was thrown against a bulkhead during an explosion.

George S. Patton—Unsurprisingly, "Old Blood and Guts" General George S. Patton (1885-1945) earned a Purple



Heart after the establishment of the medal for sustaining combat wounds during World War I. The highly decorated soldier went on to command the U.S. Seventh Army and the U.S. Third Army in World War II, earning recogni-

tion and fame for his critical leadership style and colorful personality.

Calvin Pearl Titus—Medal of Honor Recipient is somewhat of a military legend. While serving in China with the



Army's 14th Infantry Regiment in 1900, Titus famously scaled a 30-foot tall brick wall in order to help his company gain control of the wall and weaken the enemy stronghold. Titus earned a Purple Heart for injuries sustained

the following day. He was 76 years old by the time he was officially honored with the medal.

John McCain—The military record of Arizona Senator John McCain (1936-2018) has been widely revered. While serving in



the Vietnam War with the Navy, the former presidential hopeful received the Silver Star, two Legion of Merits, the Distinguished Flying Cross, three Bronze Star Medals, two Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medals, the Prisoner of War Medal and two Purple Hearts. In October of 1967, McCain

was captured by the North Vietnamese and held as a Prisoner of War until 1973.

Lewis Lee "Red" Millett — Military iconoclast Red Millett (1920-2009) earned the Medal of Honor for his valor leading the final



American bayonet charge in the Korean War. In addition to the most prestigious military honor, Millett received a Distinguished Service Cross, a Silver Star, two Legions of Merit, three Bronze Star Medals, three Air Medals and four Purple Hearts.

Audie L. Murphy—As one of the most decorated soldiers of World War II, Audie Murphy (1925-1971) received every one of



the Army's combat awards for valor, including the Medal of Honor for single-handedly holding off an entire company of German soldiers in France and then spearheading a successful counterattack. He received three Purple Hearts during his time of service. After the war, Murphy went on to become a successful actor, starring in more than 40 feature

films, until he died in a plane crash in 1971.

Lewis "Chesty" Puller—Chesty Puller (1898-1971) was a Marine Corps Lieutenant General who earned hero status after fighting off guerillas in Haiti and Nicaragua. For his service in World War



II and the Korean War, Puller became the most decorated Marine in U.S. military history. He received five Navy Crosses and one Army Distinguished Service Cross, in addition to one Purple Heart. Some believe that Puller should be awarded the Medal of

Honor posthumously.

Colin Powell—Former Secretary of State and Army Four-Star General Colin Powell earned many medals, ribbons and foreign



decorations during his lengthy military career. Powell served in Vietnam, where he was awarded a Purple Heart following his first combat tour. When his command helicopter crashed, Powell rescued several of his comrades from the flames, including World

War II Medal of Honor Recipient Jack Treadwell. The rescue earned Powell the Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy.

Other Notable Purple Heart Recipients

Cordelia "Betty" Cook is best known for her service in the U.S. Army: She was the first American woman to be awarded both the Bronze Star Medal and the Purple Heart.

The Kentucky native had served in World War II as a combat nurse, leaving behind her new husband to do it. She'd married Army officer Capt. Harold E. Fillmore just one short month before being deployed.

The two would not see each other for 21 months! They were finally reunited in December 1944. By then, Betty was a heroine. Harold was recuperating from an injury at an Army hospital in France.

Her Bronze Star Medal was awarded for her service between November 1943 and

January 1944. According to newspaper reports, Betty took charge of 340 cases during that time. She saved nearly 250 men. Betty's service earned her both the Bronze Star Medal and the Purple Heart, making her the first American woman to get two awards for her service in World War II.







and a part of our bond between humans and animals.

Sergeant Reckless was a small Mongolian mare who held official rank in the United States military. She was estimated to be three or four years old when purchased by the United States Marine Corps for \$250 in October 1952. She was trained to be a pack horse and used to carry ammunition and supplies for the Recoilless Rifle Platoon of the 5th Marine Regiment.

But it wasn't long before Sergeant Reckless proved herself to be much more than just a pack animal. She quickly learned to navigate the treacherous terrain of the Korean War, carrying supplies and evacuating

wounded soldiers to safety without hesitation. She often travelled to deliver supplies on her own, without a handler. In fact, she became so vital to the unit that they renamed themselves the "Reckless Rifle Platoon."

On one particularly harrowing day, Sergeant Reckless made 51 trips to the front lines, carrying over 9,000 pounds of supplies and ammunition. She was hit by shrapnel twice, but she refused to stop working. She even made the trip up and down the steep and rocky hills with a wounded soldier on her back.

After the Korean War, Sergeant Reckless retired to Camp Pendleton, California, where she lived out the rest of her days. She passed away in 1968, but her legacy lived on. She was the first animal to be officially promoted to the rank of Sergeant in the United States Marine Corps, and she received many awards including two Purple Hearts.

Sergeant Stubby In 1917, as the 102nd Infantry, 26th Yankee Division of the US Army trained and camped around the Yale Bowl in New Haven, a stray dog wandered into camp. Private J. Robert Conroy found the short-tailed puppy and named him "Stubby." The dog quickly became the mascot of the 102nd Infantry, despite an official ban on pets in the camp. When the division shipped out for Europe to fight in the First World War, Private Conroy managed to smuggle Stubby aboard the SS Minnesota the transport that brought the Connecticut troops to France. Stubby received special orders (as the division's mascot) that allowed him to travel to the front lines with the rest of the troops when it came time for battle.



In April 1918, as the 102nd Infantry joined an attack on the German-held town of Seicheprey, France, they fell under a hail of grenade fire. Stubby, who took part in the attack, received shrapnel wounds to his leg and chest. After he had his wounds treated, he was transported to a Red Cross Recovery Hospital, where he proceeded to walk around the hospital visiting wounded soldiers and boosting morale wherever he went. By the end of World War I, Stubby was a veteran of 17 battles. During this time Sgt Stubby earned two Purple Hearts. Today, Stubby's taxidermied remains reside at the Smithsonian Institute National Museum of American History, Armed Forces Collections, in Washington, DC. He has been honored numerous times over the years. Stubby has a brick in the Walk of Honor World War I monument in Kansas City, was featured in a children's book, and was part of a traveling tour to Connecticut. He remains the "grandfather of war dogs"


