From the Finance Officer:

I would like to take a moment to thank the programs who have helped us pull together information needed by our accountant to file our taxes. We are still waiting for some information, but have the extension approved and will continue to chop away at what we need.

I have recently had a number of questions regarding how to get reimbursed for expenditures made on behalf of the Post. It has been a number of months ago that I talked about the necessity of documenting and getting prior approval before making purchases. If through your program finances, we have to file taxes on your behalf you are now going to be required to follow the process created by the post.

To be reimbursed, you must complete a “Prior approval for reimbursement form” as requested. While the form indicates that it requires the signature of the Finance Officer and an E-board member, your program treasurer and additional board member needs to sign the form before you purchase or can be reimbursed.

Receipts must be kept according to the IRS rules for 7 years. On a monthly basis, any program or entity using our tax ID must submit copies of their records to the post finance office monthly.

Thank you all for helping us keep our records up to date.

First was the Oregon memorial wall escort to Evergreen Museum. A great turn out of the post riders and other groups involved,

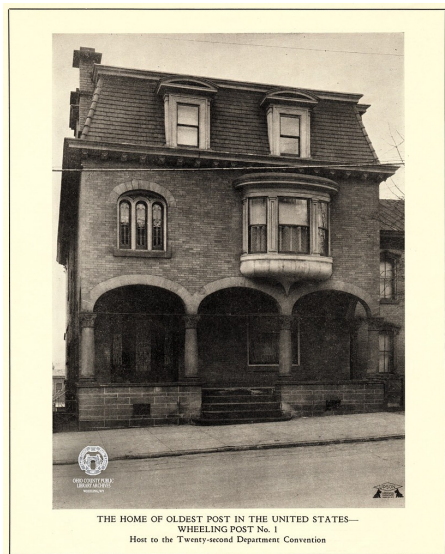

The Oldest American Legion (the first ever) still in operation is Post 1 West Virginia

The oldest American Legion post in the United States is widely recognized as Wheeling Post No. 1 in Wheeling, West Virginia. Its claim is based on its formation date of March 1, 1919, which predates the national founding of the American Legion by two weeks.

On March 1, 1919, five World War I veterans—Edmund Lee Jones, Joe Reass, Tom Cummins, George Houston, and P.J. McGinley—gathered in Jones' office in the Laconia Building in Wheeling to form the World War Veterans of America. This group later became Wheeling Post No. 1 of the American Legion.

The national American Legion was officially founded during the Paris Caucus held from March 15–17, 1919, by members of the American Expeditionary Forces. Wheeling Post No. 1 sent delegates to the subsequent St. Louis Caucus in May 1919 to ensure their inclusion in the national organization.

During the chartering process, an internal disagreement led to the post being temporarily named "Fort Henry Post No. 1." However, at the first West Virginia Department Convention in October 1919, the original founders successfully petitioned to have the charter restored under the name Wheeling Post No. 1.

Wheeling Post No. 1 has played a significant role in veteran support and community service for over a century. In March 2025, the post celebrated its 106th anniversary, hosting national American Legion Commander James A. LaCoursiere Jr. for the occasion.

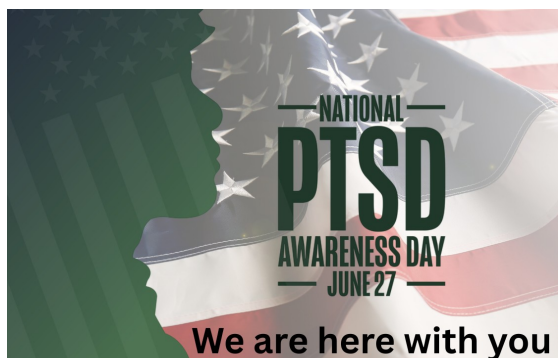

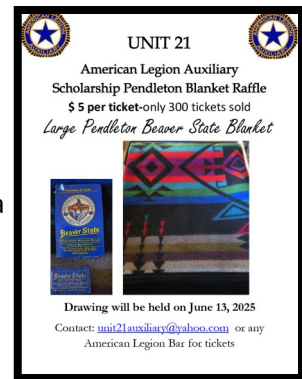

Remembering the USS Frank E. Evans (DD-754)

The USS Frank E. Evans (DD-754) was an Allen M. Sumner-class destroyer of the United States Navy, named in honor of Marine Corps General Frank Evans, a distinguished officer who served with valor during World War I.

Commissioned in 1944, the Evans served with distinction in World War II, participating in operations in the Pacific Theater. The destroyer continued her service through the Korean War, providing naval gunfire support and escort duties. In the Vietnam War, she was once again called to duty, symbolizing the enduring commitment of the U.S. Navy across multiple generations of conflict.



Tragically, the USS Frank E. Evans is best known for the catastrophic collision that occurred on June 3, 1969. During a joint naval exercise with the Royal Australian Navy in the South China Sea, the Evans was accidentally struck by the Australian aircraft carrier HMAS Melbourne. The collision sheared the Evans in two, and 74 U.S. sailors lost their lives—many of them young men who had just served off the coast of Vietnam.

The stern of the ship remained afloat and was later towed and sunk as a target, while the bow sank quickly after the collision. The incident remains a somber chapter in naval history and a stark reminder of the risks service members face, even outside of combat.

Efforts have long been underway by families and veterans to have the names of the 74 lost sailors added to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., honoring their service during a wartime deployment. The story of the USS Frank E. Evans is one of bravery, sacrifice, and the enduring bond of shipmates. She lives on in the hearts of those who served aboard her and in the memories of the families she left behind.



Hero Spotlight: James P. Fleming – United States Air Force Pilot and Medal of Honor Recipient

During the Vietnam War, countless acts of bravery emerged from the chaos of battle, but few stand out as clearly as the actions of Captain James P. Fleming, a United States Air Force pilot who risked his life to save a group of stranded Green Berets in 1968. Born on March 12, 1943, in Sedalia, Missouri, Fleming was commissioned into the Air Force through the ROTC program at Washington State University. He would go on to fly the UH-1F Huey helicopter with the 20th Special Operations Squadron, known as the “Green Hornets.” On November 26, 1968, Fleming was part of a mission to support a team of Army Special Forces soldiers pinned down by enemy fire along the Cambodian border. The team was surrounded and under heavy attack with no clear way out. Despite intense enemy gunfire and extremely dangerous flying conditions, Fleming made multiple passes into the landing zone in an attempt to rescue the stranded soldiers. One helicopter had already been forced to leave due to damage, and another had run out of fuel. On his final daring attempt, Fleming hovered his Huey with the tail boom dangling over the edge of a riverbank as the Special Forces team sprinted aboard under fire. Once the men were safely inside, he pulled away from the hostile zone and returned to base—a feat that saved six lives and demonstrated exceptional valor. For his incredible heroism, James P. Fleming was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Richard Nixon in 1970. He is one of just 18 U.S. Air Force members to receive the nation's highest military decoration during the Vietnam War. Fleming retired as a colonel after 28 years of service, leaving behind a legacy of courage, selflessness, and dedication to duty. His story is a powerful reminder of the sacrifices made by those who served during Vietnam—and a testament to the Air Force creed: “These things we do, that others may live.”

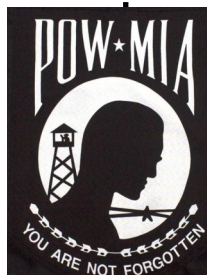
