Run participants numbered more than 90 individuals contributing to the poker hands, silent auction, raffle and 50/50 drawing. With donations of many businesses, we awarded four cash prizes totaling more than \$2,500 dollars. Let's not forget the buffet breakfast prepared and served by our legion staff and the great afternoon meal of Bert's Chuck Wagon & BBQ, a local business and generous post supporter.

The American Legion Riders are comprised of Legion members, Auxiliary members and members of The Sons of The American Legion. Riders now proudly honor 60 plus members. Members committed to the distribution of scholarship funds to students within our community and the simple joy of friends and our love of riding.

The event was not without its challenges. Collectively the goal is to address them as we move forward to our next beneficial Scholarship Poker run.



Service Officer: If you are a 40% or more disabled Veteran or surviving spouse of a Veteran, you may be entitled to a Veteran's property tax exemption. If you're a disabled Veteran or the surviving spouse or registered domestic partner (partner) of a Veteran, you may be entitled to exempt \$21,386 or \$25,665 of your homestead property's assessed value from property taxes. The exemption amount increases by 3 percent each year. The exemption is first applied to your home and then to your taxable personal property. To qualify for the exemption, you must be a U.S. citizen who has been a member of the U.S. Armed Forces and you were discharged or released under honorable conditions. At least one of these requirements must also be met:

- Served at least 91 consecutive days beginning on or before January 31, 1955.
- Served at least 179 consecutive days beginning after January 31, 1955.
- Served for 178 days or less and was discharged or released from active duty under honorable conditions because of a service-connected disability.
- Served for 178 days or less and has a disability rating from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.
- Served for at least one day in a combat zone.
- Received a combat or campaign ribbon or an expeditionary medal for service in the U.S. Armed Forces.
- Be receiving a nonservice-connected pension from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

If you are an Oregon resident and a qualifying Veteran or a Veteran's surviving spouse/partner and live in your home, you may file a claim and receive the exemption. The filing period is between January 1 and April 1. If you are an actively serving Oregon National Guard member, you may be entitled to Veteran's property tax exemption. Filing dates are listed on the application. The application form and instructions are available on the Yamhill County Veterans Property Tax Exemption website online

at https://www.co.yamhill.or.us/content/Veterans-propertytax-exemption. Surviving Spouse Exemption Claim forms are also available. Surviving Spouses must attach proof of marriage/registered domestic partnership (partnership) to the deceased Veteran, the Veteran's death certificate, and the Veteran's military discharge or release papers (DD–214 or other equivalent documentation). You also can't have entered into a new marriage or partnership.

100 Days in The Ghan is a captivating story of one ordinary kid who felt called to serve following 9/11 and was ultimately severely wounded in action.

Wiggins story begins on 9/11 and walks readers through a series of events that lead him and his friends to join the military. Upon completing training Wiggins finds himself in the Nation's oldest and most prestigious Special Operations Unit, the Airborne Rangers.

During his time in the Rangers, Wiggins deploys in support of the Global War on Terrorism five different times. An ambush on May 13, 2004, left Wiggins now 25 deaf and with other serious injuries. Wiggins dies on a



battlefield in Afghanistan (The Gan) several times only to prove all of the doctors wrong and makes a near full recovery.



More than three years later, Wiggins was living in Oregon, serving as president of Evergreen Defense and Security Services and working on obtaining his bachelor's degree at Linfield College.

In addition to 100 Days in the Ghan, Dr. Wiggins has also

written: Disabled Leadership, A hope for Hawthorne, A Happening in Hawthrone and co-author of The Sprit in the North.

World War II

Army Air Forces Tech Sgt. Elton Gomillion – 22. Lost August 1, 1943 when the B-24 Liberator he was an engineer on was hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire and crashed during Operation TIDAL WAVE. His remains could not be recovered. Announced July 31, 2023.

Army Air Force Staff Sgt. Wesley Jones – 22. Lost when the B-24 Liberator he was a gunner on was hit by enemy antiaircraft fire and crashed during Operation Tidal Wave. His remains were not recovered. Announced August 1, 2023.

Army Air Force 2nd Lt. Walter Miklosh – 21. Lost June 26, 1944 when the B-29 Superfortress he was serving as a navigator on crashed into a rice paddy in the village of Sapekhati, India after a bombing raid on Imperial iron and steel works at Yawata Island, Japan. All 11 crew members were killed instantly in the crash. Announced August 4, 2023.

Army Sgt. Bernard Sweeney – 22. Lost December 16, 1944 when his unit was engaged in battle with German Forces near Strass Germany in the Hűrtgen Forest. Due to the heavy fighting his remains were not recovered. Announced August 7, 2023.

Army Air Force 1st Lt. Alfred Pezella – 27. Lost when the B-24 Liberator he was serving on as a bombardier was hit by anti-aircraft fire and crashed during Operation Tidal Wave. His remains were not recovered. Announced August 8, 2023.

Army Air Force Sgt. Willard Kendall – 23. Lost February 25, 1944 when the B-17G Flying Fortress that he was the tail gunner on was struck by anti-aircraft fire after a bombing raid on aircraft factory in Regensburg, Germany. Announced August 10, 2023.

Army Pfc. Lex Lilard – 20. Lost April 9, 1942 when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands. Lillard was subjected to the 65-mile Bataan Death March and was held as a prisoner of war at Cabanatuan POW camp where he died in captivity. Announced August 14, 2023.

Korea

Army Sgt. 1st Class James Wilkinson – 19. Lost September 8, 1950 when Company during fighting along the Nakong River, South Korea. Due to the intense fighting his body could not be recovered and there was never any evidence that he was a prisoner of war. Announced July 26, 2023.

Army Cpl. Gordon McCarthy – 20. Lost December 2, 1950 when his unit was attacked by enemy forces near the Chosin Reservoir, North Korea. Following the battle his remains could not be recovered and there is no evidence that he was a prisoner of war. Announced July 26, 2023.

Army Pfc. Albert Gosnell – 18. Lost when his unit was forced to retreat in the vicinity of Taejon, South Korea. Due to the intense fighting his body could not be recovered and there was never any evidence he was a prisoner of war. Announced July 27, 2023.

Army Cpl. Francis Jury – 23. Lost December 2, 1050 when his unit was attacked by enemy forces near the Chosin Reservoir, North Korea. Following the battle his remains could not be recovered and there is no evidence that he was a prisoner of war. Announced August 9, 2023.

Army Sgt. Richard Sharrow – 22. Lost July 25, 1950 when his unit was engaged in battle with the North Korean Army near Yongdong, South Korea. Due to the heavy fighting his remains were unrecoverable. Announced August 14, 2023.

Army Pvt. Alvin Thurman – 21. Lost November 6, 1951 when his unit was attempting to withdrawal from Hill 200 now known as the Korea Demilitarized Zone. Due to the intense fighting his body was unrecoverable. Announced August 15, 2023.

Army Pfc. James Miller – 21. Lost July 30, 1950 when his unit took part in the unsuccessful defense of the town of Sangui. Following the battle, his remain could not be recovered and there is no evidence that he was ever a prisoner of war. Announced July 28, 2023.

Vietnam

Marine Capt. Ralph Chipman - 29. Lost December 27, 1972 when the A-6 Intruder he was serving on as a pilot during a nighttime combat mission his radio communications ceased, and he never returned to base. His remains were never recovered. Announced August 9, 2023.



What is Gold Star Mother's Day?

Gold Star Mother's Day is observed on the last Sunday in September which will be Sunday, Sept. 24, 2023. Gold Star Mother's Day is intended to recognize and honor those mothers who have lost a son or daughter in the service of the U.S. Armed Forces.

Organizations around the country honor Gold Star families through ceremonies, luncheons and teas. They give back to their community by remembering fallen service members. Service organizations provide opportunities to remember the fallen and their families.

Each year there are events and meetings to publicly express love, sorrow and reverence towards Gold Star Mothers and their families. Flags are also mandated to be displayed at half-staff on government buildings on this day.

The Gold Star is a symbol of a loved one lost in combat. "During World War I, a practice developed across the country where Families displayed flags featuring a blue star, a sign that a family member was fighting in the war. Some flags would display more than one star."

The history of National Gold Star Mother's Day begins with a young country thrown in the midst of a great war. Army Captain Robert Queissner, whose two sons were serving on the front line during World War I, created what is now called the Service Flag. Families displayed the flag with a blue star to represent a child serving in the military during times of war or hostilities. When a service member died, the families stitched a gold star over the blue star.

The exact origins of this tradition are not fully known, but at some point, gold star flags would go up to signify the family member had died on duty. The term "Gold Star Family" went into the national vocabulary thanks to the sacrifices of man and women serving in uniform.

Gold Star Mother's Day isn't observed in quite the same manner as federal holidays such as **Labor Day**, **Memorial Day**, or **President's Day**, but that does not mean it hasn't been given official recognition.

In 1936, the 74th Congress declared, "the last Sunday in September shall hereafter be designated and known as 'Gold Star Mother's Day,' and it shall be the duty of the President to request its observance as provided for in this resolution."



What is Patriot Day?

Patriot Day is a United States national observance that honors the memory of those who were killed in the September 11 attacks. It was first observed in 2002, after the proclamation by President George W. Bush.

On September 11, 2001, al-Qaeda launched a series of coordinated terrorist attacks upon the United States, killing almost 3,000 people. In the immediate aftermath of the tragic events, President Bush proclaimed September 14, 2001 as a National Day of Prayer and Remembrance for the Victims of the Terrorist Attacks on September 11, 2001. A year later, September 11 was made a national day of mourning referred to as Patriot Day. This observance has been proclaimed annually since 2002.

In 2009, it was renamed "*Patriot Day and National Day of Service and Remembrance."* On Patriot Day, the national flag is flown at half-mast on all United States government buildings and establishments. Individuals are also encouraged to display flags on their homes.

A moment of silence is traditionally observed at 8:46 AM. Many organizations and establishments hold memorial ceremonies to honor the victims of 9/11.
