World War II

Army Air Forces Tech Sgt. James Triplett – 36. Lost September 27, 1944 when the B-24H Liberator Bomber he was serving as a radio operator was hit by enemy fire and crashed. Accounted for October 25, 2022.

Army Air Forces Pvt. John Ropp – 31. Lost April 9, 1942when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands and was captured and was subjected to the 65-mile Bataan Death March. Ropp died as a prisoner of war at Cabanatuan Prison Camp. Accounted for October 25, 2022.

Army Air Forces Cpl. Charles Eeds – 23. Lost April 9, 1942when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands and was captured and was subjected to the 65-mile Bataan Death March. Ropp died as a prisoner of war at Cabanatuan Prison Camp. Accounted for October 25, 2022.

Army Pvt. James Tash – 20. Lost April 9, 1942when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands and was captured and was subjected to the 65-mile Bataan Death March. Ropp died as a prisoner of war at Cabanatuan Prison Camp. Accounted for October 25, 2022.

Army Air Forces Staff Sgt. David Holeman – 39. Lost July 19, 1942when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands and was captured and was subjected to the 65-mile Bataan Death March. Ropp died as a prisoner of war at Cabanatuan Prison Camp. Accounted for August 23, 2022. Announced November 7, 2022.

Army Pfc. Francis Martin – 25. Lost January 17, 1945 when the covoy he was on was ambused by German forces. Martin was not among those who escaped. The fighting was too severe to recover Martins remains. Accounted for June 21, 2022. Announced November 14, 2022.



Army Staff Sgt. James Rotunno – 27. Lost January 20, 1945 when his unit was engaged with German forces during the Battle of Reipertswiller in France and were surrounded, along with four other companies. The surounded companies were ordered to break-out, only two men made it through German lines. The rest were either captured or killed. Rotunno was among those killed. Accounted for September 27, 2022. Announced November 14, 2022.

Army Cpl. Joseph Gunnoe – 21. Lost November 6, 1944 when he went missing as his unit attempted to withdraw from the Hűrtgen Forest. He was delcared killed in action after the war. Accounted for September 14, 2022. Announced November 22, 2022.

Korea

Army Sgt. Allen Tuttle – 23. Lost December 2, 1950 after his unit attempted to withdraw from Kunu-ri, North Korea when he was reported missing in action. Tuttle died as a prisoner of war in March 1951. Accounted for October 26, 2022.

Army Sgt. Alfred Sidney – 23. Lost May 18, 1951 when his unit was attacked near Hangye, South Korea and Sidney was captured. Sidney died as a Prisoner of War at Camp #1. Accounted for August 23, 2022. Announced November 4, 2022.

Army Cpl. Tommie Hanks – 27. November 26, 1950 when he went missing as his unit was attempting to withdraw from east of the Ch'onch'o River near Anju, North Korea. Accounted for August 2, 2022. Announced November 9, 2022.

Vietnam

Army Staff Sgt. Sanford Finger – 29. Lost October 26, 1971 when the CH-47B Chinook helicopter he was a passengr on crashed while flying from Tuy Hoa to Cam Rahn Bay in Vietnam. Remains of four of the 10 soldiers on board were recovered but Finger was not accounted for. Accounted for August 23, 2022. Announced October 27, 2022.

Army Reserve Chief Warrant Officer Larry Zich – 24. Lost when the Uh-1H Iroquois on which he was the co-pilot did not return from a combat support mission. Accounted for October 25, 2022. Announced November 8, 2022.



FIVE WORLD WAR II US BOMBERS FOUND OFF CROATIA

Searchers have located the wrecks of five B-24 bombers that crashed into the Adriatic Sea during World War II, three of which are associated with 23 still-missing crew members.

The search mission – conducted over a two-week period in August off the coast of Croatia – was a partnership between Project Recover and the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency. It was the culmination of a lengthy process of researching military records and obtaining needed permits from Croatia.

Along with the B-17, the B-24 Liberator was a mainstay for U.S. strategic bombing in the European theater, with almost 19,000 of the heavy bombers built during World War II. It was utilized by all the American service branches in Europe and the Pacific.

The wrecks of an estimated 30 U.S. warplanes are believed to lie submerged in what was a frequent "ditching area" for crippled warplanes in the vicinity of the search area in the Adriatic Sea, which lies between Italy and the Balkans.

Most of those aircraft took off from Italy and would bomb Europe. Then, if they were attacked and limping and couldn't make it back to Italy, they didn't go directly back across the Adriatic. Instead, the pilots flew down the coast of what was then Yugoslavia – now Croatia – and ditched the aircraft in waters not controlled by the Nazis. Some crews made it to safety; others did not.

The finding of five B-24s is the largest underwater aviation discovery to date. Divers were able to positively identify three of the bombers, which are associated with 23 crew members who remain missing since World War II.

Decisions about further missions to search for remains of crew members would be made by DPAA. The wrecks were found in waters roughly 300 feet deep, which is near the safe maximum depth for divers.

Project Recover hopes to return to waters off Croatia for further searches.

There's quite a bit of local knowledge from fishermen, other divers, that kind of thing on potential new areas to look at. There's a lot more to be found.

REMEMBER PEARL HARBOR

The Japanese plan was simple: Destroy the Pacific Fleet. That way, the Americans would not be able to fight back as Japan's armed forces spread across the South Pacific.

On December 7th Japanese planes filled the sky over Pearl Harbor. Bombs and bullets rained onto the vessels. An 1,800-pound bomb smashed through the deck of the *USS Arizona* and landed in her forward ammunition magazine. The ship exploded and sank with more than 1,000 men trapped inside. Next, torpedoes pierced the shell of the battleship *USS Oklahoma*. With 400 sailors aboard, the *Oklahoma* lost her balance, rolled onto her side and slipped underwater.

Less than two hours later, the surprise attack was over, and every battleship in Pearl Harbor—USS Arizona, USS Oklahoma, USS California, USS West Virginia, USS Utah, USS Maryland, USS Pennsylvania, USS Tennessee and USS Nevada—had sustained significant damage. (All but USS Arizona and USS Utah were eventually salvaged and repaired.)

The attack on Pearl Harbor killed 2,403 U.S. personnel, including sailors, soldiers and civilians. Additionally, 1,178 people were wounded. 129 Japanese soldiers were killed.

The day after the attack President Franklin D. Roosevelt addressed a joint session of the U.S. Congress. "Yesterday, December 7, 1941—a date which will live in infamy—the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan. No matter how long it may take us to overcome this premeditated invasion, the American people in their righteous might will win through to absolute victory."

We received 244 entries and with the Veterans at the Veterans Day Dinner voting, the winning pictures were chosen. Commander Juan Palacios and Auxiliary President Gregoria Hernandez made a trip to Dayton elementary to present the winners Gage-3rd grade and Lea-4th grade with totes full of art supplies for each of their classrooms. They also traveled to Lafayette to present art supplies to Hannah, the 5th grade winner, for her classroom to share.

Auxiliary Service Officer, Carol Doege, donated 150 crochet hats to Dept. of Oregon Auxiliary President, Debra Godwin, for distribution to the Veterans at the Dalles and Lebanon Veteran homes and White City rehabilitation.

The Auxiliary voted to help Veterans by donating money to the Portland VA's gift shop and to help our community by donating funds to the McMinnville High School Cheer Team for their trip to the Texas Nationals.

On November 16th at the Post 21 General Meeting, Commander Palacios drew the winning ticket for the Depoe Bay Vacation Raffle. John Ambrose, a Post 21 member, was the winner.
