## Russell Hamler of famed WWII Merrill's Marauders dies at 99.



Russell Hamler, 99, the last member of the famed American jungle fighting unit in World War II nicked named "Merrill's Marauders" died on Tuesday, December 26<sup>th</sup>. Hamler was the last living Marauder according to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

President Trump award the Marauders the "Congressional Medal of Honor" in 2022. Dozens of Marauders were awarded individual decorations after the war, from the Distinguished Service Cross to the Silver Star. The Army also awarded the Bronze Star to every soldier in the unit.

They battled hunger and disease between firefights with Japanese forces during their secret mission, a grueling journey of roughly 1,000 miles on foot that killed almost all of them.

Merrill's Marauders — nicknamed for the unit's commander, Brig. Gen. Frank Merrill — were tasked with cutting off Japanese communications and supply lines along their long march to an occupied airfield. Starting with 3,000 soldiers, the Marauders completed their mission five months later with barely 200 men still in the fight.



Hamler was wounded in the hip by a mortar fragment during a battle. The injury immobilized Hamler in his foxhole for more than 10 days until rescuers arrived and evacuated him to a hospital in India.

Marauders spent most days cutting their way through dense jungle, with only mules to help carry equipment and provisions. They slept on the ground and rarely changed clothes. Supplies dropped from planes were their only means of replenishing rations and

ammunition. Malnutrition and the wet climate left the soldiers vulnerable to malaria, dysentery and other diseases

The Marauders eventually captured the airfield, the only all-weather strip in northern Burma, their key objective, according to the U.S. Army Center of Military History. The unit was disbanded afterward.

Hamler was awarded a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart. He became an aircraft mechanic for Trans World Airlines and retired from it in 1985.

# DOUBLE FUNERAL FOR WWII AIRCREW MISSING FOR 79 YEARS.

On Halloween 2023 when many families worldwide are making lasting memories two families with a unique bond nearly 80 years in the making came together on the hallowed ground of Arlington National Cemetery to lay their loved ones to rest in a double funeral.

2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Pile and TSgt Triplett flew together, died together and now their families have chosen to have them buried side-by-side, at Arlington.

During World War II TSgt. James Triplett was serving as a radio operator aboard a B-24H Liberator bomber during a large mission to bomb the industrial city Kassel in northern Germany. 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Pile served as the navigator on the September 27 mission. While in flight the aircraft encountered heavy resistance from enemy ground and air forces resulting in the rapid loss of 25 Liberators including Triplett's and Pile's. Although six of the crew were able to bail out Triplett and Pile were not able to escape the crash and their bodies were not recovered following the war.

In 1944, before even learning of his disappearance, Bill Triplett, James' younger brother put together a box containing small things such as chocolates, cigarettes and coffee, which he thought were in short supply. He labeled the box, took it to the post office and sent to England with hopes that his brother would receive it in time for Christmas.

One day later, the doorbell rang at Bill's house. His wife, Ellen, answered the door to find a man holding the same wooden box.

"It had been sent back labeled 'address unknown." "That was the first indication that James was missing."

It was a normal fall day for the Triplett's family in Oregon in 1944. In a quiet corner of their house high up on a shelf in the pantry, sits a small unassuming piece of the family's history. It will go on to serve as both a reminder of loss and a beacon of hope for future generations. Their heirloom remained untouched and unopened for over 30 years: A plain, wooden box,

In 2007, a team from DPAA met a local historian who took the team to a wooded area he believed was the crash site of the James' B-24 Liberator. The team excavated the crash site in 2015 and 2016 and found aircraft data plate with the tail number of James' aircraft. The team also recovered an identification tag for one of the crew members from James' aircraft.

James' family and Lt. Pile's family both provided a DNA sample in hopes that his uncle could be identified. Lt. Pile's family also provided a DNA sample. The families were notified that their loved ones have been identified. The families decided to hold a double funeral and honor both lives at once. Tech Sgt Triplett. And 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Pile were given a proper funeral and full military honor and laid to rest alongside each other at Arlington National Cemetery on October 31, 2023.

#### **World War II**

Army Air Force Staff Sgt. Franklin Hall – 21. Lost January 21, 1944 when the B-24 Liberator "*Queen Marlene*" he was a left waist gunner on was attacked by German forces in France. Accounted for July 2023. Announced November 27, 2023.

Army Sgt. George Bishop – 22. Lost May 6, 1942 when he was captured by the Japanese after they invaded the Philippine Islands. Sgt. Bishop was forced to endure the Bataan Death March then held as a prisoner of war. Sgt. Bishop died as a prisoner of war at Cabanatuan Prison Camp. Accounted for November 28, 2023.

Army Pfc. Hood Cole – 26. Lost January 14, 1945 when his unit was attacked by German forces near Baerenthal, France. Due to the intense fighting his body was unable to be immediately recovered. Accounted for February 22, 2023. Announced December 12, 2023.

Army Pvt. Homer Mitchell – 20. Lost December 10, 1944 when his Division was attacked by German forces while tasked with holding defense positions in the Pachten Forces near Dillingen, Germany. Accounted for July 24, 2023. Announced December 18, 2024.

Army Pvt. Robert Hurst – 21. Lost May 6, 1942 when he was captured by the Japanese after they invaded the Philippine Islands. Pvt. Hurst was forced to endure the Bataan Death March then held as a prisoner of war. Pvt. Hurst died as a prisoner of war at Cabanatuan Prison Camp. Accounted for July 10, 2023. Announced December 21, 2023.

#### Vietnam

Marine Captain Ronald Forrester – 22. Lost December 27, 1972 when the A-6A Intruder he was navigating on a nighttime combat mission ceased radio communications and never returned to base. Accounted for December 4, 2023.
