Military advisers to the South Vietnamese Army remained, as did Marines protecting U.S. installations, and thousands of Defense Department civilians.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington D.C., also known as the Wall, was dedicated on November 10, 1982 with 57,939 names. Since then, 379 names have been added for the total of 58,318.

I visited the Wall several years ago a black granite Vshaped Wall inscribed with the names of the men and women who were killed or missing in action in Vietnam. Looking at the Wall, a feeling of sadness came over me just seeing all the names inscribed there. As I stood there looking at the wall, I did not hear any noises or voices. Just peacefulness.

I then walked along the Wall touching the names as I walked. The Wall was cold but yet warm. I felt at peace with myself as I walked. After I finished walking, I noticed a group of high school kids walking behind me who were also touching the Wall, not talking and not being disrespectful.

After I finished walking the Wall, I stepped back to let them pass, each one of them touched my arm and in a low voice said, "Thank Tou". They walked up the hill, looked back at me and waved good-bye. Their kindness brought big tears to my eyes. I walked a short distance up the hill, turned and said "good-bye." I then stood at attention and saluted them. I left with a feeling of peacefulness and contentment. God bless the Veterans on the Wall and rest in peace my fellow Veterans.

On March 29, 2023, the post celebrated National Vietnam War Veterans Day. A local Vietnam Veteran, Jesse Anderson, wrote a song about the Vietnam Memorial Wall. His brothers Tom and Doug served in Vietnam, but sadly Doug has passed from Agent Orange. Jesse and his wife Cheryl sang Jesse's song on Vietnam Veterans Day

On this sunny Saturday afternoon these riders were on a mission to search out and regain the elusive American Legion Rider Totem. Then do whatever it took to return the prize trophy to its preferred resting place, behind the bar at American Legion Post 21.

What is this Totem one might ask? And why are they in search of it?

On March 17, 2017, the "TOTEM" had its inception at Post 21, alongside its ugly stepbrother the "Hot Potato". "The Hot Potato shall be discussed in a future newsletter." The coveted totem was designed to encourage riders to visit other posts around our region, remain involved and support each other. World War II

Army Pvt. Leroy Slenker – 28. Lost December 1941 when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands. Slenker was captured and died as a prisoner of war during World War II. Accounted for February 3, 2023.

Army Air Forces Staff Sgt. Edgar Mills – 25. Lost July 15, 1944 when the B-17G Mills was an armorer gunner on was shot down by enemy aircraft fire. His body was not recovered, and the Germans never reported him as a prisoner of war. Accounted for February 2023.

U.S. Army Air Forces Tech Sgt. Frack Ferrel – 31. Lost August 1, 1943 when the B24 Liberator bomber he was on as an engineer was hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire and crashed during Operation TIDAL WAVE. His remains could not be recovered, and there is no evidence that he was ever a prisoner of war. Accounted for March 8, 2023.

Army Air Forces 1st Lt. William Montgomery – 24. Lost June 2, 1944 when the B-24H Liberator he was piloting was struck by anti-aircraft fire during a bombing raid on a German airfield near Versailles, France. Accounted for January 10, 2023. Announced March 13, 2023.

Korea

Army Cpl. Carmen Carillo - 20. Lost May 17, 1951 during a battle with the Chinese People's Volunteer Forces in Gangwon Hongchun Korea. Following the battle, his remains could not be recovered, and there is no evidence that he was ever a prisoner of war. Accounted for February 3, 2023. Announced March 1, 2023.





Quilts of Valor Quilting to Honor & Comfort

A Quilt of Valor[®] (QOV) is a quality, handmade quilt. It is awarded to a Service Member or Veteran who has been touched by war. The Quilt says unequivocally, "Thank you for your service and sacrifice in serving our nation."

The Oath of Enlistment states, "I do solemnly swear that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic."

All enemies, foreign and domestic. These Veterans vowed to lay down their lives for you and me, no questions asked. We cannot judge what being "touched by war" means to a Veteran. It will be different for each one, no matter where or when they served.

Trust that these Veterans have been touched by war. Trust that they will tell you if they do not feel they should receive a Quilt of Valor. Be inclusive, not exclusive, for who today has not been touched by war, veteran or civilian, abroad, or in our own country?

I will always tear up when I think about their words, "this is the first time anyone has thanked me for my services," fifty years after they served. War demons live and remain with Veterans for all of their lives.

Quilts of Valor are groups of volunteers who get together to sew quilts for veterans to say, "Thank you for your service".

The mission of Quilts of Valor Foundation is to cover all service members and veterans with a comforting and healing Quilts of Valor.

Then our members award the QOV to the service member or veteran in a group event or privately with family and friends present.
