#### Adjutant Memo:

Here is an interesting story that I ran across. I don't know if any of you have had a similar situation, I have so I thought I would share.

A man on a business trip put his bag in the above compartment and sat down in my assigned seat. It was going to be a long flight. I'm glad I have a good book to read. Perhaps I will get a short nap. Just before takeoff, a line of soldiers came down the aisle and filled all the vacant seats, surrounding me. I decided to start a conversation.

"Where are you headed?" I asked the soldier seated nearest to me. "Petawawa. We'll be there for two weeks for special training, and then we're being deployed to Afghanistan."

After flying for about an hour, an announcement was made that sack lunches were available for five dollars. It would be several hours before we reached the east, and I quickly decided a lunch would help pass the time. As I reached for my wallet, I overheard a soldier ask his buddy if he planned to buy lunch. "No, that seems like a lot of money for just a sack lunch. Probably wouldn't be worth five bucks. I'll wait till we get to base." His friend agreed. I looked around at the other soldiers. None were buying lunch.

I walked to the back of the plane and handed the flight attendant a fifty-dollar bill. "Take a lunch to all those soldiers." She grabbed my arms and squeezed tightly. Her eyes wet with tears, she thanked me. "My son was a soldier in Iraq; it's almost like you are doing it for him." She picked up ten sacks and headed up the aisle to where the soldiers were seated. She stopped at my seat and asked, "Which do you like best - beef or chicken?" "Chicken," I replied, wondering why she asked. She turned and went to the front of the plane, returning a minute later with a dinner plate from first class. "This is your thanks."

After we finished eating, I went again to the back of the plane, heading for the restroom. A man stopped me. "I saw what you did. I want to be part of it. Here, take this." He handed me twenty-five dollars. Soon after I returned to my seat, I saw the Flight Captain coming down the aisle, looking at the aisle numbers as he walked, I hoped he was not looking for me, but noticed he was looking at the numbers only on my side of the plane. When he got to my row he stopped, smiled, held out his hand, and said, "I want to shake your hand." Quickly unfastening my seatbelt I stood and took the Captain's hand. With a booming voice, he said, "I was a soldier and I was a military pilot. Once, someone bought me a lunch. It was an act of kindness I never forgot." I was embarrassed when applause was heard from all of the passengers. Later I walked to the front of the plane so I could stretch my legs. A man who was seated about six rows in front of me reached out his hand, wanting to shake mine. He left another twenty-five dollars in my palm. When we landed I gathered my belongings and started to deplane. Waiting just inside the airplane door was a man who stopped me, put something in my shirt pocket, turned, and walked away without saying a word. Another twenty-five dollars! Upon entering the terminal, I saw the soldiers gathering for their trip to the base. I walked over to them and handed them seventy-five dollars. "It will take you some time to reach the base. It will be about time for a sandwich. God Bless You." Ten young men left that flight feeling the love and respect of their fellow travelers. As I walked briskly to my car, I whispered a prayer for their safe return. These soldiers were giving their

all for our country. I could only give them a couple of meals. It seemed so little...

A veteran is someone who, at one point in his life, wrote a blank check made payable to 'citizens of United States' for an amount of 'up to and including my life.' That is Honor, and there are way too many people in this country who no longer understand it.'


#### Legion Riders:


Sons of the American Legion hosted a Korean War Breakfast on July 28th. Thank you to everyone who came out to support this great event. We look forward to next years breakfast.

## **Suicide Prevention Month**

September is recognized as Suicide Prevention Month, a critical time to raise awareness about the issue of suicide, particularly among veterans. The month is dedicated to increasing understanding, providing support, and promoting resources that can help prevent suicide among those who have served in the military.

Veterans are at a higher risk for suicide than the general population due to factors such as combat-related trauma,

## Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency— July Announcements

#### World War II

**U.S. Army Technician Fifth Grade (Tech5) Harold D. Pittis, 21** Announced on August 1, 2024; Accounted for on March 20, 2024: In February 1945, Pittis was assigned to Company G, 2nd Battalion, 318th Infantry Regiment, 80th Infantry Division. His regiment was engaged in fierce fighting near the town of Biesdorf, Germany, when he was reported killed in action by small arms fire on Feb. 8. His body was unable to be recovered due to intense fighting against heavily reinforced German forces on an elevated position.

#### U.S. Army Air Forces Staff Sgt. Alvin R. Scarborough, 22

Announced on August 9, 2024; Accounted for on September 21, 2023: In late 1942, Scarborough was a member of 454th Ordnance Company (Aviation), when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands in December. Intense fighting continued until the surrender of the Bataan peninsula on April 9, 1942, and of Corregidor Island on May 6, 1942. Thousands of U.S. and Filipino service members were captured and interned at POW camps. Scarborough was among those reported captured when U.S. forces in Bataan surrendered to the Japanese.

#### U.S. Army Air Forces Private 1st Class Harry M. Seiff, 23

Announced on August 9, 2024; Accounted for on December 18, 2023: In summer 1942, Seiff was a member of the 20th Pursuit Squadron, 24th Pursuit Group, U.S. Army Air Forces, when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands in December. Intense fighting continued until the surrender of the Bataan peninsula on April 9, 1942, and of Corregidor Island on May 6, 1942.

#### U.S. Army Air Force 2nd Lt. Francis E. Callahan, 22

Announced on August 12, 2024; Accounted for on June 20, 2024: In spring 1944, Callahan was assigned to the 732nd Bombardment Squadron, 453rd Bombardment Group, 2nd Combat Bomb Wing, 2nd Air Division, 8th Air Force in the European Theater. On April 8, Callahan, the navigator onboard a B-24H "Liberator" Little Joe, was killed in action when his plane was shot down by enemy fighter aircraft fire while on a bombing mission to Brunswick, Germany. Airmen aboard oth-

er aircraft flying in formation with Little Joe did not report seeing any crewmembers exiting the aircraft before it crashed in the vicinity of Salzwedel.

#### World War II

#### U.S. Navy Reserve Lieutenant Jay R. Manown Jr., 26

Announced on August 12, 2024; Accounted for on May 23, 2024: In the fall of 1944, Manown was an aviator assigned to Navy Torpedo Squadron 20 (VT-20), USS Enterprise. On Sept. 10, Manown and two other crew members aboard a TBM-1C Avenger (Bureau Number 17018), took off from the USS Enterprise on a mission to conduct air strikes against enemy targets in Malakal Naval District, Palau Islands. Witnesses from other aircraft in the formation saw Manown's plane struck by enemy anti-aircraft fire and crash into water near Malakal. Manown will be buried on October 29, 2024, in Kingwood, West Virginia.

#### U.S. Army Private William E. Calkins, 20

Announced on August 15, 2024; Accounted for on April 17, 2024: In late 1942, Calkins was a member of Company B, 31st Infantry Regiment, when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands in December. Intense fighting continued until the surrender of the Bataan peninsula on April 9, 1942, and of Corregidor Island on May 6, 1942. Calkins will be buried in Hillsboro, Oregon, on Sept. 13, 2024.

#### U.S. Army Air Forces Private Robert W. Cash, 20

Announced on August 15, 2024; Accounted for on April 3, 2024: In summer 1942, Cash was a member of the 28th Materiel Squadron, 20th Air Base Group, when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands in December. Intense fighting continued until the surrender of the Bataan peninsula on April 9, 1942, and of Corregidor Island on May 6, 1942.

#### U.S. Army Pvt. Kwack K. Woo, 31

Announced on August August 19, 2024; Accounted for on March 13, 2024: In February 1945, Woo was assigned to Company E, 2nd Battalion, 318th Infantry Regiment, 80th Infantry Division. His regiment was engaged in fierce fighting near the town of Biesdorf, Germany, when he was reported killed in action by small arms fire on Feb. 9. His body was unable to be recovered due to intense fighting against heavily reinforced German forces on an elevated position. Woo will be

buried in Agawam, Massachusetts, on Sept. 28, 2024.





### Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency— July Announcements

#### World War II

#### U.S. Army Pvt. 1st Class Clossie D. Brown, 36

Announced on August 15, 2024; Accounted for on April 25, 2024: Brown was assigned to Company F, 2nd Battalion, 157th Infantry Regiment, 45th Infantry Division in the European Theater during World War II. Shortly before midnight on New Year's Eve 1944, German forces launched a major offensive operation in the Vosges Mountains in Alsace-Lorraine, France, known as Operation NORDWIND. The German attack surged through Allied defenses along the Franco-German border, and the ensuing battle enveloped two U.S. Corps along a 40-mile-wide front. In the following few weeks, Company F found itself assigned to a 7-mile sector at Reipertswiller and Wildenguth, France. At some point on Jan 21, Brown was killed, but due to the intensity of the fighting his body was unable to be recovered. Brown will be buried in Frankfort, Indiana, on Sept. 24, 2024.

#### Korean

#### U.S. Army Master Sgt. David P. Sluder, 33

Announced on August 2, 2024; Accounted for on September 27, 2023: In July 1950, Sluder was a member of Battery B, 63rd Field Artillery Battalion, 24th Infantry Division during the Korean War. He went missing in action after his unit was attacked by enemy ground forces in the vicinity of Samgyo-ri along the Kum River, South Korea, on July 14.

#### U.S. Army Corporal Frederick A. Higgins, 20

Announced on August 14, 2024; Accounted for on June 22, 2023: In June 1950, Higgins was a member of Medical Detachment, 15th Anti-aircraft Artillery, Automatic Weapons Battalion, 7th Infantry Division, Eighth U.S. Army in the Korean theatre. Higgins was captured as a prisoner of war (POW) after his unit was forced to retreat from Hagaru-ri in the vicinity of Jangjin, North Korea. In 1953, several POWs returned during Operation Big Switch reported Higgins had been a prisoner of war and died in July 1951, at Prisoner of War Camp #1. Higgins will be buried in Kent, Washington, on Sept. 20, 2024.

#### U.S. Army Corporal Waymon Slaten

Announced on August 15, 2024; Accounted for on August 14, 2024: In September 1950, Slaten was a member of Baker Company, 1st Battalion, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division. He was reported missing in action after his unit engaged in combat actions with the enemy on Hill 209, west of Yongsan, South Korea, on Sept. 1, 1950. Due to intense fighting in the area, his body could not be recovered at that

#### Korean

#### U.S. Army Sgt. Kester B. Hardman, 22

Announced on August 16, 2024; Accounted for on May 2, 2024: In Dec. 1950, Hardman was assigned to M Company, 3rd Battalion, 38th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division. He was reported missing in action after his unit engaged in intensive combat actions in the vicinity of Sunchon, Democratic People's Republic of Korea. Following the armistice in 1953, North Korean forces claimed Hardman died in the spring of 1951 while in captivity at POW Camp 5, on the Pyoktong Peninsula.

#### U.S. Army Pvt. 1st Class Arlie P. Barrett, 19

Announced on August 22, 2024; Accounted for on June 7, 2024. In August 1950, Barrett was a member of Easy Company, 2nd Battalion, 19th Infantry Regiment, 24th Infantry Division. He went missing in action after his unit engaged in combat actions with the North Korean People's Army along the Naktong River west of Yongsan, South Korea, on Aug. 10, 1950. Barrett will be buried in Mountain Home, Tennessee, on Sept. 27, 2024.



### POW/MIA Recognition Day is a U.S. observance dedicated to honoring the sacrifices of

American prisoners of war

(POWs) and those who are still missing in action (MIA). It is observed annually on the third Friday of September.

POW/MIA Flag: The black-and-white POW/MIA flag, featuring a silhouette of a man, a watchtower, and a barbed-wire fence with the words "You Are Not Forgotten," is a significant symbol of this day. The flag is flown at many government buildings, military installations, and veterans' organizations across the country.
