# Letter to Quilts of Valor Foundation

I shall forever treasure this precious quilt. It will never leave me. Now I want to share the memories this quilt will harbor, memories triggered by my touching a special name on the awesome Vietnam Wall.

David Berry was a senior at Newberg High School my first year on the faculty there. He was in both my journalism and creative writing classes — as a "sleepy student", doing the bare minimum to escape flunking, sitting by the door so he could be last in and first out. I always worked to help less active students, but much as I tried, I could not find the right buttons to push with Dave. So, I went to Principal Edgar Miller for info. This is what I learned: "The first day of school this fall, Dave's twin brother Doug, dropped out, joined the Army, and was killed in action during his first week in Vietnam; but David says he will sign up, then stay the course to graduate, get his diploma, and THEN request duty at the front. Says he wants that black book!" Ironically, Dave was called up three days before graduation. As he left, he asked

the Principal to make sure his diploma was safe, that he'd be back to get it.

When sent to Vietnam, David requested duty as a medic in combat zones. After a crash course in First Aid showed he couldn't do much that involved the sight of blood, he volunteered to protect a helicopter landing clearing, offloading reinforcements and onloading wounded, often under fire from the surrounding forest.

On his first short break home, he came to my classroom office for a catch up for both of us. As he left, I told him I was honored that he had stopped by to see me, and that he was in my prayers.

The very first day he returned to duty after that trip home, he was killed as he answered a cry for "Medic" and crawled out into that helicopter clearing to help a wounded soldier. Both he and the wounded were killed by low level strafing from an ambush.

David Berry's funeral was conducted at a church in Newberg. A Marine guard in full dress stood behind his casket at attention during the entire service – the same Marine who had been assigned to 24-hour guard duty for his lone casket for the journey from Vietnam to home. At the end of the service, NHS Principal Miller stepped up and laid Dave's diploma inside the opening.

Next, the Marine guard took the microphone and from a card read the Combat Citation, then reverently laid the Purple Heart atop the diploma. At this moment, the mourners in the Chapel rose to honor this gesture, with our National Anthem sounding in the background.

David Berry had gotten his diploma. He also had performed the ultimate duty of the military by giving his all in service to his country.

# **World War II**

Army Air Force 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Peter Timpo – 20. Lost when the B-24 Liberator, he was the bombardier on, was hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire and crashed during Operation Tidal Wave. Accounted for July 20, 2022. Announced April 5, 2023.

Navy Electrician's Mate 3<sup>rd</sup> Class Cecil Barncord – 24. Lost December 7, 1941 during the attack on Pearl Harbor – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for October 14, 2016. Announced April 6, 2023.

Navy Mess Attendant 2<sup>nd</sup> Class Archie Callahan – 19. Lost December 7, 1941 during the attack on Pear Harbor – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for November 27, 2017. Announced April 6, 2023.

Army Air Force 1<sup>st</sup> Lt. John Thomas – 23. Lost August 1, 1943 when, the B-24 Liberator he was piloting, was hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire and crashed during Operation Tidal Wave. Accounted for September 30, 2022. Announced April 20, 2023.

# Vietnam

U.S. Air Force Colonel Ernest De Soto – 37. Lost April 12, 1969 De Soto, his navigator and another aircraft were returning from a cancelled mission when both aircraft ascended into heavy cloud cover. The lead aircraft noticed De Soto's plane was not in sight and immediately began an aerial search without success. De Soto was posthumously promoted to Colonel while in missing status. Accounted for March 23, 2023.

U.S. Air Force Captain Fredrick Hall – 25. Hall was the Navigator on a F-4D Phantom II, his pilot and another aircraft were returning from a cancelled mission when both aircraft ascended into heavy cloud cover. The lead aircraft noticed De Soto's plane was not in sight and immediately began an aerial search without success. Hall was posthumously promoted to Captain while in missing status. Accounted for March 23, 2023.



# Korea

Army Sgt. 1<sup>st</sup> Class Ellis Coon - 30. Lost December 1, 1950 during the Battle of Ch'ongh'on when he was captured. Ellis died as a prisoner of war in Camp #5 of malnutrition and lack of medical care. Accounted for September 27, 2022. Announced April 5, 2023.

.Army Sgt. Richard Crotty – 22. Lost September 1, 1950 during a battle with the Korean People's Army near Yongsan, South Korea. Accounted for February 3, 2023. Announced April 17, 2023.

# The Forgotten History of America's Memorial Day and What it Commemorates

Memorial Day is more than just the "unofficial start of summer" for many Americans it is one of the United States earliest holidays to honor those men and women who died while in service.

On May 5, 1868, following the end of the Civil War, a collection of Union veterans created Decoration Day as a time for people to decorate the graves of those who were killed in combat with flowers.

Decoration of graves became widespread after Abraham Lincoln's assassination in 1865. There were, at this point, over 600,000 American Soldier in the ground. This gave the previously existing informal ritual a new significance. It was this year that the federal government began making a National Cemetery for the Union war dead.

In the 1880s, the ceremonies became much more standardized. Largely due to the efforts of the Grand Army of the Republic, a veterans organization for Union Soldiers. Pamphlets with rituals, Bible verses and poems were distributed to local post commanders.

While many will complain that Memorial Day is not a day for barbecuing and drinking beer, this observance goes back to at least 1913. The Grand Army of the Republic opposed a Memorial Day race in 1911. However, they were increasingly elderly and had less power than they had even 20 years prior. Ironically, the race the Grand Army of the Republic opposed is one of the biggest Memorial Day traditions still going today – the Indianapolis 500.

Arlington National Ceremony hosted the first large observance in 1868 with flowers being placed on both Union and Confederate graves and presided over by General Ulysses S. Grant and his wife.

However, by World War I the holiday had expanded from those killed in the Civil War to any American soldier killed in during any war.

Memorial Day did was not made an official national holiday until the passage of the Uniform Monday Holiday Act on June 27, 1968 by Congress and President Johnson which made it the last Monday in May. "The bill that we sign today will help Americans to enjoy more fully the country that is their magnificent heritage," Johnson said.

This year will mark 155 years of the United States honoring America's fallen soldiers on Memorial Day.

# WHAT IS ARMED FORCES DAY?

On August 31, 1949, Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson announced the creation of an Armed Forces Day to replace separate Army, Navy and Air Force Days. The single-day celebration stemmed from the unification of

the Armed Forces under one department -- the Department of Defense. Each Brand of the military was asked to drop sponsorship of its specific service day in order to celebrate the newly announced Armed Forces Day. The Army, Navy and Air Force adopted the newly formed day. The Marine Corps declined to drop support for Marine Corps Day but supports Armed Forces Day, too.

"Our Servicemen and women are serving throughout the world as guardians of peace-many of them away from their homes, their friends and their families. They are visible evidence of our determination to meet any threat to the peace with measured strength and high resolve. They are also evidence of a harsh but inescapable truth--that the survival of freedom requires great cost and commitment, and great personal sacrifice."

President John F. Kennedy, 1963

The theme of the first Armed Forces Day was "Teamed for Defense." It was chosen as a means of expressing the unification of all the military forces under a single department of the government. Although this was the

"Armed Forces Day, above all, honors the dedicated individuals who wear the uniforms of their country. Each serviceman, wherever he may be, whatever his task, contributes directly and importantly to the defense of the nation. The task of each one is the task of all the Armed Forces: to protect the freedoms which underlie the greatness of America."

General Earle Wheeler, 1967 Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff. theme for the day, there were several other purposes for holding Armed Forces Day. It was a type of "educational program for civilians," one in which there would be an increased awareness of the Armed Forces. It was designed to expand public understanding of what type of job is performed and the role of the military in civilian life. It was a day for the military to show "state-ofthe-art" equipment to the

civilian population they were protecting. And it was a day to honor and acknowledge the people of the Armed Forces of the United States.

The first Armed Forces Day was celebrated by parades, open houses, receptions, and air shows. In Washington D.C., 10,000 troops of all branches of the military, cadets, and veterans marched past the President and his party. In Berlin, 1,000 U.S. troops paraded for the German citizens at Templehof Airfield. In New York City, an estimated 33,000 participants initiated Armed Forces Day "under an air cover of 250 military planes of all types." In the harbors across the country were the famed mothballed "battlewagons" of World War II, the Missouri, the New Jersey, the North Carolina, and the Iowa, all open for

public inspection.

"This is the day on which we have the welcome opportunity to pay special tribute to the men and women of the Armed Forces ... to all "Our servicemen and women shoulder the burden of defense as one of the responsibilities of citizenship in this free country. Having participated in protecting our rights and having met oppression on the battlegrounds of the world, they are able to appreciate and savor the blessings of citizenship in the country they serve."
