A Navy warship went down in World War II with 49 crew members aboard. Divers finally found it after 75 years!



USS Eagle PE-56 - 1945

The USS Eagle PE-56 (a submarine chaser) was supporting Navy training exercises off the coast of Maine when an explosion tore it in half on April 23, 1945. Only 13 people survived, and 4 officers and 45 crew members went down with the ship.

For 75 years, no one knew exactly where the crew and the submarine hunter came to rest on the ocean floor. But in June 2018, a team of divers working with the Smithsonian Channel located it about six miles from Maine's shore.

The divers spent four years searching for the Eagle PE-56. The divers said that when they saw a four-inch deck gun, they were in absolute awe. The ship was also equipped with anti-submarine gear, not just guns, there was a rack of 15–20 depth charges. They said they had an incredible amount of respect for the sailors who are still entombed with the Eagle 56.

The wreckage sits more than 250 feet below the surface, the ship's steel plating is starting to rust away, but the site has been designated a war grave and has all the protections associated with that.

Finding the shipwreck was a challenge because diving off the coast of Maine is cold and visibility is often less than 20 feet. It's significantly deeper than recreational diving, decompression on these dives will last 1.5 to 2 hours, sometimes longer. The sinking was originally thought to be an accident the USS Eagle PE-56 was the last American warship sunk off the East Coast during World War II.

The US Navy originally dubbed the April 23, 1945, sinking an accident from a boiler explosion, but many survivors reported seeing a Nazi U-boat at the time. Naval historian Paul Lawton and archivist Bernard Cavalcante's research proved the initial assessment inaccurate, and in 2003, the Navy reclassified the sinking as a combat loss.

It also recommended that Purple Hearts be awarded to the 49 dead and 13 survivors. The reclassification made the USS Eagle PE-56 the Navy's largest single combat loss *in New England waters*.





Following is a summary of News Stories of the most recent identified POW/MIA members from World War II, Korean War and Vietnam.

World War II

Duane Cole, 23 – Marine Sgt. – Lost November 20, 1943 during the second day of battle on Betio Island, Tarawa, during an intense confrontation with enemy forces. Accounted for September 3, 2019 – Announced March 11, 2020.

Alton Whitson, 22 – Navy Electrician's Mate 3rd Class. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for January 23, 2019. Announced March 11, 2020.

Russell Roach, 22 – Navy Seaman 1st Class. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for October 17, 2019. Announced March 11, 2020.

Clarence A. Blaylock, 20 – Navy Fireman 3rd Class. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for October 17, 2019. Announced March 11, 2020.

Patrick Chess, 24 – Navy Shipfitter 3rd Class. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for September 17, 2019. Announced February 4, 2020.

Ballard McCurley, 34 – Army Pvt. Lost November 29, 1944 wile engaged in a fierce battle with German Forces in the Hürtgen Forest near Vossenack, Germany. Accounted for January 29, 2020. Announced February 11, 2020.

Jerome Morris, 22 – Marine Sgt. Lost November 22, 1943 during a battle with the Japanese resistance in an attempt to secure the Betio Island, Tarawa Atoll, Gilbert Islands. Accounted for September 27, 2019. Announced March 16, 2020.

Earl Smith, 22 – Army Air Forces 2nd Lt. – Lost August 20, 1943 when the P-38 Lightning fighter he was piloting crashed into the harbor off of Paga Point, Papau. Accounted for March 23, 2020.

THE BATAAN DEATH MARCH

APRIL 1942

Following three months of brutal fighting the island of Bataan surrendered to the Japanese Army in April 1942 leading to the capture of 75,000 Americans and Filipino troops. Following the capture, the Japanese began the forced transfer of theses POWs to the O'Donnell Prison camp over 65 miles north of Bataan. Leading to what became known as The Bataan Death March.

The captured soldiers were already in rough shape after fighting a great number of Japanese soldiers for over three months. In doing so they were left with scarce supplies and inadequate food, water and medical aid. The Japanese provided





very little food and water, the water they did supply was from the side of the road they were marching on.

The prisoners were brutalized during the march those who dropped from exhaustion or sickness, fell behind, or tried to escape were bayoneted,

shot, or beheaded. Those who could not rise the next morning were often buried alive or beaten to death.

No one knows the exact number of deaths that occurred during the march and during the internment at Camp O'Donnell. Of the 22,000 American prisoners of war on Bataan only about 15,000 survived.

America avenged its defeat in the Philippines when General Douglas MacArthur, who in 1942 had famously promised to return to the Philippines, made good on his word. In February 1945, U.S.-Filipino forces recaptured the Bataan Peninsula.

After the war, an American military tribunal tried Lieutenant General Homma Masaharu, commander of the Japanese invasion forces in the Philippines. He was held responsible for the Death March, a war crime, and was executed by firing squad on April 3, 1946.
