Wreaths Across America REMEMBER the Fallen. HONOR those who serve. TEACH our children the value of freedom.

National Wreaths Across America Day has become such a big tradition that it's hard to believe it began from just one personal tribute and this photo, which went viral.



So how did it happen? Here's the Scoop: The Worcester family of Harrington, Maine, owns their own tree farm. In 1990s they had a surplus of wreaths during the holiday season, so the family patriarch, Morrill – who had long felt indebted to our fallen veterans – got help from a Maine politician to have those spare wreaths placed beside graves in Arlington National Cemetery in areas that received fewer visitors each year.

Several volunteers stepped up to help, including veterans from The American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars posts and a truck company owner who transported the wreaths to Arlington, Virginia, where a small ceremony was held at the cemetery's Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. This remained a small

yearly tradition for nearly 15 years until a photo taken at the 2005 ceremony went viral. Almost immediately, thousands of people wanted to know how to help or how they could begin a similar tradition in their states.





Unable to donate thousands of wreaths to each state, Worcester began sending seven wreaths to every state, one for each branch of the military, and for POW/MIAs. In 2006,

with the help of the Civil Air Patrol and other civic organizations and volunteers, including in the trucking industry – there were 150 simultaneous ceremonies held across the country. By 2008, the movement to remember, honor and teach had grown so much that Congress had declared the third Saturday in December National Wreaths Across America Day.

In 2014, Wreaths Across America and its thousands of volunteers laid over 700,000 memorial wreaths at 1,000 locations in the United States and beyond, including ceremonies at the Pearl Harbor Memorial, as well as Bunker Hill, Valley forge and the sites of the 9/11 tragedies.

The goal of covering every headstone at Arlington National Cemetery was met in 2014 with the placement of 226,525 wreaths with the assistance of thousands of volunteers. The event continues to grow. This year, the organization shipped a staggering 1.75 MILLION wreaths to 1,640 locations that will hold ceremonies across the U.S. A few dozen locations overseas will participate. The organization said this was the first year they were granted permission to place wreaths at Normandy to honor those who died during World War II's D-Day invasion.

Veterans and Gold Star families are many of the roughly 2 million volunteers who prepare the wreaths, ship them across the country and put them on the graves.

To all of those who have volunteered time, efforts and money to the cause, cheers to you!

Pearl Harbor History "A Day That Will Live in Infamy"

On Sunday, December 7, 1941, a Japanese attack force of 408 aircraft launched from 6 aircraft carriers and initiated a surprise attack on the U.S. Pacific Fleet, stationed at Pearl Harbor on the island of Oahu, Hawaii. The first wave of 183 aircraft was launched north of Oahu shortly before 8:00am. One hundred forty Japanese bombers armed with armor-piercing bombs and torpedoes and forty-three fighter aircraft concurrently targeted the eight battleships berthed in "Battleship Row" along the coast of Ford Island. During this wave of attacks, each ship at Battleship Row was struck by enemy aircraft. The damaged sustained by the U.S. battleships was compounded by the fact that each ship, other than the USS Nevada (BB-36), was moored to another vessel or in drydock, which left the crewmembers unable to get their ships underway. After a brief lull, Japanese aircraft launched a second wave of airstrikes, which inflicted additional damage, but was not as deadly as the first wave, since U.S. service members were prepared for a second attack. The attack was over within approximately 90 minutes, leaving 2,403 Americans killed and 1,178 wounded.

In just under two hours, the Japanese had sunk or damaged 21 ships: all eight battleships (*Arizona, California, Nevada, Oklahoma, West Virginia, Pennsylvania,*

Maryland, and Tennessee), three light cruisers (Helena, Honolulu, and Raleigh), four destroyers (Cassin, Downes, Helm, and Shaw), one target ship (Utah), and four auxiliaries (Curtiss, Sotoyoma, Vestal, and Floating Drydock Number 2).

The Japanese also strafed and bombed the planes, hangers, and other buildings located near the airfields, including dormitories and mess halls. By the time the U.S. military personnel at the airfields realized what was happening, there was little they could do. A few individuals picked up guns and shot at the invading planes. A handful of U.S. fighter pilots were able to get their planes off the ground and were able to shoot down a few Japanese planes despite being outnumbered, of the 402 U.S. aircraft at Pearl Harbor, 188 were destroyed and 159 were damaged.

A total of 2,335 servicemen were killed and 1,143 were wounded. Sixty-eight civilians were also killed and 35 were wounded. Nearly half of the servicemen that were killed were on board the *Arizona* when it exploded.

The following day, President Franklin D. Roosevelt addressed Congress declaring that December 7, 194 "a date that will live in infamy." Congress declared war on Japan.

Yesterday, December seventh, 1941, a date which will live in infamy, the Unites States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan.

Department of Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency Makes 200th Identification from USS Oklahoma remains.

The <u>USS Oklahoma</u>, moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, was sunk by Japanese aircraft during the attack on Pearl Harbor. A total of 429 crewmen aboard the USS *Oklahoma* were killed in the early morning hours of Dec. 7, 1941, after the ship quickly capsized from the numerous torpedo hits

From December 1941 through June 1944, Navy personnel recovered the remains of those who perished, interring them in the Halawa and Nu'uanu Cemeteries in Hawaii.

The remains were disinterred by the American Graves Registration Service from the two cemeteries in September 1947, and transferred to the Central Identification Laboratory at Schofield Barracks in Hawaii. At that time only 35 men were identified out of the 429 killed. Nearly 400 unidentified remains were buried as Unknowns in 46 plots at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, known as the Punchbowl, in Honolulu.

In 2015, as part of the USS *Oklahoma* Project, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, through a partnership with the Department of Veterans Affairs, exhumed all of the unknown remains from the USS *Oklahoma*, and began the lengthy identification process. As of March 2018, DPAA made their 200th identification from the ship's casualties.


