Following is a summary of News Stories of the most recent identified POW/MIA members from World War II, Korean War and Vietnam.

# World War II

Marine Corps Pfc. Robert Jenks – 20. Lost November 22, 1943 after several days of intense fighting with Japanese forces at Tarawa Atoll, Gilbert Islands. Accounted for February 4, 2020. Announced May 5, 2020.

Marine Corps Pfc. Thomas Johnson – 18. Lost November 23, 1943 after several days of intense fighting with Japanese forces at Tarawa Atoll, Gilbert Islands. Accounted for May 6, 2020.

**Army Pfc. Charles Andrews – 25.** Lost December 4, 1944 when his unit was engaged in battle with German forces in the Hürtgen Forest, Germany. Accounted for May 6, 2020.

Navy Seaman 2<sup>nd</sup> Class Floyd Helton, 18 – Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for April 23, 2020. Accounted for May 15, 2020.

Marine Corps Pfc. Mervin Galland – 24. Lost November 22, 1943 after several days of intense fighting with Japanese forces at Tarawa Atoll, Gilbert Islands Accounted for May 6, 2020.

Navy Metalsmith 1<sup>st</sup> Class Leonard Smith, 29 – Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for April 16, 2020. Accounted May 19, 2020.

Navy Fireman 1<sup>st</sup> Class Louis Tushla, 25 – Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for March 27, 2020. Accounted May 19, 2020.

Marine Corps Pfc. Charles Miller – 19. Lost November 22, 1943 after several days of intense fighting at Tarawa Atoll, Gilbert Islands. Accounted for May 19, 2020.

# Korean War

Army Cpl. R. B. Cherry – 19. Reported missing November 27, 1950 near Anju, North Korea. It has been determined that he had been a Prisoner of War in Camp 5 and died of pneumonia in the winter of 1950. Accounted for May 19, 2020.

Army Sgt. William Cavender – 20. Lost November 28, 1950, when his unit was attacked by enemy forces near Chosin Reservoir, North Korea. May 19, 2020.

Army Sgt. Jesse Hill– 20. Lost December 2, 1950, when his unit was attacked by enemy forces near Chosin Reservoir, North Korea. May 19, 2020.

## THE KOREAN WAR

## A 'Forgotten' Conflict That Shaped the Modern World.

The Korean War has been called "the Forgotten War" in the United States, where coverage was censored, and its memory decades later is often overshadowed by World War II and the Vietnam War.

The three-year conflict in Korea, which pitted communist and capitalist forces against each other, set the stage for decades of tension among North Korea, South Korea and the United States. It also helped set the tone for Soviet-American rivalry during the Cold War, profoundly shaping the world we live in today

The Korean War began when North Korean troops pushed into South Korea along the 38<sup>th</sup> Parallel on June 25, 1950. The war pitted South Korea and the United States, fighting under the auspices of the United Nations, against North Korea and China. Other nations contributed troops, too, but American forces did most of the fighting. The Soviet Union supported North Korea at the beginning of the war, giving it arms, tanks and strategic advice. But China soon emerged as its most important ally, sending soldiers to fight in Korea as a way to keep the conflict away from its border.

The war ended up being a see-saw affair that saw the UN forces retreat from North Korea to the Pusan perimeter in southeastern Korean and then forge forward again across the 38th parallel only to be driven south once more by the Chinese forces.

The human cost of the war was catastrophic. In the first month of their operation alone, the Strategic Air Command groups dropped 4,000 tons of bombs. Besides high explosives, the bombers used napalm. In retirement, USAF Chief of Staff, General Curtis LeMay described the devastation saying, "we eventually burned down every town in North Korea... and some in South Korea too. We even burned down [the South Korean city of] Pusan -- an accident, but we burned it down anyway." Estimates of the casualties vary widely, but there is reason to believe that besides the three and a half million military dead, wounded and missing on both sides, more than two million civilians died in North Korea. In the end the border dividing the two countries remained exactly where it had been before the North Korean invasion.

Technically, the Korean War did not end. The fighting stopped when North Korea, China and the United States reached an armistice in 1953. But South Korea did not agree to the armistice, and no formal peace treaty was ever signed.

"There is still a technical state of war between the combatants." Neither North nor South Korea had achieved its goal: the destruction of the opposing regime and reunification of the divided peninsula.



# **D-DAY – THE 101<sup>st</sup> AIRBORNE CRICKET**



Shortly after midnight in the early hours of June 6, 1944 Operation Overlord was launched and nearly 20,000 paratroopers dropped behind enemy lines in Normandy to be the first soldiers on the ground on D-Day. Conditions were terrible. Thick cloud cover and fog made it nearly impossible to spot their landing targets, and the night sky was pierced with heavy Nazi anti-aircraft rounds and sniper fire.

For those paratroopers who made it to the ground, many were separated from their units and unsure of their locations. Alone in enemy-held territory, they had to find their comrades in the fogblanketed dark without tipping off the enemy. Good thing they had their clickers.

Hours earlier, when boarding the aircraft members of the United States 101st Airborne Division were each handed a small metal box that would serve as a low-tech emergency communication device. By pushing down on the lid of the box with the thumb and releasing, it made a sharp clicking sound.

Their instructions were simple. If you're on the ground and hear someone approaching, click once. Two clicks in reply means a friend. No click could mean trouble.

The intention was to discard the cricket (or clicker) twenty-four

hours after landing. Allied commanders were worried that the devices would fall into Nazi hands and be used to trick soldiers into thinking that an approaching foe was friendly. The D-Day clickers were only in action for 24 hours, but who knows



how many lives were saved by this simple ingenuity.


Many of the troops retained their crickets long after the war and have since become iconic symbols to the men of the U.S Airborne and the memory of D-Day.

The Treaty of Versailles held Germany responsible for starting the war and imposed harsh penalties in terms of loss of territory, massive reparations payments and demilitarization.
