## World War II

Army Air Forces 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Anel Shay, Jr. - 26. Lost August 1, 1943, when the B-24 Liberator Shay was serving on as a bombardier crashed as a result of enemy anti-aircraft fire during Operation TIDAL WAVE. Accounted for June 28, 2021. Announced July 1, 2021.

Army Pfc. Morris Swackhammer – 20 Lost November 22, 1944, as part of Operation DRAGOON during a battle with enemy troops northwest of Fraize village in France. Swackhammer was hit by a spray of bullets from a German machine gun. After the village was liberated, his body could not be found, and it is likely either German troops or residents of Fraize removed it. Accounted for June 28, 2021. Announced July 6, 2021.

Navy Storekeeper 1<sup>st</sup> Class Harry Walker - 36. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for March 9, 2021. Announced July 6, 2021.

Navy Seaman 2<sup>nd</sup> Class Arthur Thinnes – 17. Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for March 24, 2021. Announced July 6, 2021.

**USMC Pfc. Glenn White – 19.** Lost November 22, 1943, during intense fighting against Japanese resistance on the small island Betio in the Gilbert Islands. Accounted for June 7, 2021. Announced July 7, 2021.

**US Army 1<sup>st</sup> Lt. James Wright – 25.** Lost September 11, 1944, as part of Patton's Third Army during a fierce battle at the Moselle River near Dornot, Germany. Accounted for July 9, 2021. Announced July 20, 2021.

**US Army Pfc. Bill Morrison – 29.** Lost November 8, 1944, when his unit was engaged in battle with German forces near Hurtgen, Germany, he was reported killed in action. His body was not able to be recovered. Accounted for July 9, 2021.

### Army Pfc. Berton McQueen - 20 Lost

November 22, 1944, as part of Operation DRAGOON during a battle with enemy troops Clefcy. McQueen was mortally wounded by German artillery and taken to an aid station where he died. His battalion was forced to abandon Clefcy his body was not recovered. Accounted for July 9, 2021.



**US Army Pfc. Stephen Mason – 21.** Lost November 3, 1944, during Operation MARKET GARDEN after his patrol failed to return from a mission to the enemy lines near Beek, Netherlands. His body was unable to be recovered. Accounted for July 9, 2021.

Army Air Forces 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Alan Petersen - 23. Lost August 1, 1943, when the B-24 Liberator Shay was serving on as a bombardier crashed as a result of enemy anti-aircraft fire during Operation TIDAL WAVE. Accounted for June 28, 2021. Announced July 1, 2021.

**US Army Pvt. Andrew Ladner – 30.** Lost November 30, 1942, while his unit was part of an effort to cut off Japanese supply and communications coming from Sadananda Village on the island of New Guinea. Accounted for July 9, 2021.

**Army Pfc. William Groh - 22.** Lost November 13, 1944, while his unit was part of the Hurtgen Forest offensive he was reported wounded in action. No one ever saw him after that, and he was not listed a prisoner of war. Accounted for July 9, 2021.

### Oregon Native from Korea To be Laid to Rest

"Finally, home." It's been nearly two years since New Mexico resident Katherine Gandara got a long-awaited phone call about the uncle she never met: Official word that a set of remains returned by North Korea had been identified as Corporal Norvin Brockett, a Powell Butte resident.

At the age of 17 Brockett convinced his family to let him join the Army and fight for his country in Korea. In December 1950, Brockett was a member of Battery A, 57<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery Battalion, 7<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. He was reported missing in action on 6 December 1950, when his unit was attacked by enemy forces in the vicinity of the Chosin Reservoir, North Korea.

The Battle of Chosin Reservoir was a decisive battle in the Korean War. On 27 November, the Chinese Army surprised UN Forces at the Chosin Reservoir resulting in a brutal 17-day battle in freezing weather and rough terrain. The cold weather accompanied by frozen ground resulted in frostbite casualties, icy roads, and weapon malfunctions. In the end over 17,000 UN forces were killed or wounded or missing in action or died from their wounds. The Chinese suffered 3 time that amount.

On July 27, 2018, North Korea turned over 55 boxes purported to contain the remains of American service members killed during the Korean War. The remains arrived at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-

Corporal Norvin Brockett was laid to rest on July 21, 2021, at Arlington National Cemetery.

### A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE AMERICAN LEGION POST 21 VETERANS MEMORIAL ROSE GARDEN BY: RICH PIMM

The Memorial Rose Garden was established in April 2000 when American Legion Auxiliary member Liz Hamilton asked Billie Axtell (a World War II Veteran and longtime Legionnaire and groundskeeper) if he would plant a rose bush on the south lawn to remember and honor her late husband, Harold Hamilton. Billie said "yes" he would be honored to. I volunteered to make a plaque with any personal information she requested to place beside the rose. Bob Cook said he would make a wooden stand for the plaque. The news spread like wildfire and soon other members wanted their loved ones honored as well. The original dedication took place July 9, 2000, and the rededication followed 10 months later Memorial Day, May 28, 2001.

Before we knew it there were 111 names, plaques and rose bushes in what is now our Rose Garden with no more room for roses. It was decided to erect a Memorial Monument with the original 111 names, and space for an additional 29 veterans to be remembered and honored.

The monument was designed, approved, finalized, and ordered on June 4, 2004. Measurements were taken and a dig hole made.... oops we hit a water pipe and flooded the hole. Thanks, Oakie (Pennington) for the repairs. Then came the electric work. Thanks Paul Hendrix! Lights, Vases, Pavers, Concrete, Bollards and Chains...Painting. I'd like to say THANKS to all, and I know I'll forget a few. Thanks Dave Smith, Bob Nugent, Rick & John Hamilton, and Don Watts. And a special Thank You to Bob Berweger for all his time and knowledge, again! Thanks to all the Monument was erected. Over the course of time the additional 29 names were added and still more space was needed. In July 2011 a second Monument was erected with 24 names already engraved. Since then, 94 more names have been inscribed on the second Memorial to total 118 names with room for 24 more. Two names were added to the first Memorial by their own request: Billie Axtell and Bob Nugent with space for one more name.... mine.

## We Need a New Memorial Stone!

It will cost approximately \$25,000 to \$30,000 to fund and install a third Memorial Monument. At present there is \$10,110.03 in the Veterans Memorial Rose Garden Account. The estimated cost of the Stone Base is \$13,348.80. Additional costs for installation, fixtures, hardware, concrete etc., is between \$12,000 to 17,000.

To help raise the necessary funds I would like to ask all Military Veterans to Pre-quest to have their names engraved on the Monument when the time comes to meet with the Supreme Commander at a cost of \$100.00.

I love our Rose Garden and I know you do too! All donations and/or contributions will be patriotically, generously, and graciously accepted.

How did Post 21 get a 75 mm Howitzer? By: Galen McBee

Sometime around 1967 or early 68, members of the McMinnville Park Board thought perhaps an old Civil War type cannon might be a good addition to either City or Wortman Park. A letter was sent to the Department of Defense, and the city received a positive reply that yes, as a government agency the city would be eligible to receive a surplus cannon. Still thinking of an historic, 1800's cannon, they were surprised and disappointed when they received a WW II, Korean War era, 75 mm Pack Howitzer. In 1967-68 the Viet-Nam war was raging, and community debate developed over whether a cannon was appropriate for a McMinnville Park.

When I arrived in October 1968, I received a briefing on a City Council meeting where the room was filled with citizens in opposition to the cannon and its placement in one of the city parks. By this time there was no interest by either the park board or the city council in the cannon. I found the cannon chained to a tree in West Wortman and directed its removal and storage at the park's shops.

The cannon remained in storage for years and in the 1980's Gunny Brandon learned of the cannon and would borrow and mount it on a trailer for parades. When the American Legion built their lodge, the cannon was given to the American Legion on Permanent Loan and is currently in their memorial garden at the lodge. I believe this is the appropriate place for the display of this military artifact.

### What is all the activity at the Legion on Sunday?

Have you ever wondered what all the activity is on Sunday afternoons in the Legion Honor Room? It's the Legion Auxiliary Bingo Program. This program has been operating for over 30 years and was first held on the bar side of the Legion Hall with just a handful of players. In recent years it has grown steadily and outgrew the bar side and moved to the Honor Room.

Bingo starts at 1:00pm on Sunday afternoons, with sales beginning at 12:30. The cost to play is \$15.00 for one packet. The packet includes 10 regular games of bingo, 3 early bird games, and 2 blackouts. A double action game is sold on the floor during intermission. Payouts are determined by the percentage of sales – most payouts being \$15 or \$20 per bingo. The first blackout and the double action are also a percentage of sales, but there is a progressive blackout that, if won in 59 numbers or less, pays out a minimum of \$100. For each week it is not won, \$25 is added to the payout amount

This program is managed by Darla "Mike" Gregory, Chris Trudo, and Randi Douglas – All Legion Auxiliary members. They have a loyal following of players, which also includes players from outside Yamhill County. This program has brought in thousands of dollars to The American Legion – Post 21 every year for them to use for their many worthwhile projects.

In addition, the first Saturday of the month is Cancer Bingo starting at 1:00pm with all proceeds being donated to the Willamette Valley Cancer Foundation. Thousands of dollars have been donated to Willamette Valley Cancer Foundation and all the money stays locally for the benefit of those being treated for cancer and their families. The Foundation is very appreciative of our efforts and many of their Board have attended our Cancer Bingo sessions. The cost to play Cancer Bingo is \$10 for a pack of 10 regular games. During intermission two blackouts and double action games are sold on the floor, at \$1 a piece. There is also a B-9 (benign) pot which is added each session. Each player wanting to participate pays \$1 for a chance to win the B-9 pot which is won by having a bingo on B9 in any game, other than the double action. Currently the pot is worth \$200.

If you haven't tried playing Bingo at the Legion on Sundays or Cancer Bingo on the first Saturday of the month, give it a try. Every session is open to the public and we always have a good time for a good cause!

## National Purple Heart Day

National Purple Heart Day, also know as Purple Heart Day, Purple Heart Appreciation Day, and Purple Heart Recognition Day, is observed in the United States every year. It is dedicated to a U.S. Military decoration awarded to those brave men and women who were ither wounded on the battlefield or paid the ultimate sacrifice with their lives. The Purple Heart is the oldest existing military award in the United States, if you consider its forerunner, the Badge of Military Merit. Only four people were ever awarded the Badge of Military Merit. After the Revolutionary War the award fell into disuse but was never officially abolished.

The Purple Heart is currently awarded to any member of the U.S. Armed Forces who has been wounded or killed in action against an enemy or as a result of an act of an enemy.

The Purple Heart is awarded for each wound, but the medal is given only for the first would. For each subsequent wound or injury, oak leaf clusters of 5/16 inch stars are worn in lieu of a new medal.
