Following is a summary of News Stories of the most recent identified POW/MIA members from World War II, Korean War and Vietnam.

World War II

Edward A. Nalazek – USMC Pfc. – Lost November 21, 1943 – Tarawa. Accounted for November 21, 2019.

Alfred Edwards – USMC Pfc. – Lost November 20, 1943 – Tarawa. Accounted for November 21, 2019.

George M. Johnson – USA-AF 2nd Lt. – Lost October 20, 1944 – Tarawa. Accounted for December 16, 2019.

Leo T. Keninger – USN Fireman 1st Class – Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for December 5, 2019.

John V. Phillips – USA Sgt. – Lost August 27, 1942 – Philippines. Accounted for December 16, 2019

Orval A. Tranberger – USN Seaman 1st Class – Lost during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941 – USS Oklahoma. Accounted for December 5, 2019.

Lowell Twedt – USA-AF 2nd Lt. – Lost Bolzano, Italy October 20, 1944. Accounted for December 13, 2019.



The first of 27 Tuskegee Airmen listed as MIA has been identified.

A crash site in recently discovered in Austria contained the remains of Captain Lawrence Dickson, a 24-year-old pilot who trained at the Tuskegee Army Airfield.

Qualifying as a pilot, Dickson flew with the 332nd Fighter Group, known as the "Red Tails" for the color of their aircrafts' tails. Two days before Christmas 1944, Dickson took off from his base in Italy, in a P-51D mustang headed for Nazi-occupied Prague. He experienced engine trouble and subsequently crashed.

More than 70 years later the government contacted his family with possible news about his remains. The crash site

was a few miles away from where his plane was last seen in Italy and the plane debris was consistent with a P-51, the plane he was flying in 1944.



The details of Dickson's service are illustrative of the bravery and perseverance Tuskegee Airmen displayed while fighting a war for a country that actively devalued them. Despite the fact that the Army Air Forces discriminated against Dickson and his black colleagues, he faithfully served his country in the 100th Fighter Squadron and earned a Distinguished Flying Cross and a Purple Heart for his service.

Who were the Tuskegee Airmen?

The Tuskegee Airmen were the first African American military aviators in the United States Armed Forces and helped pave the way for the military's desegregation after World War II. Before the Tuskegee Airmen, no African American had been a U.S. Military pilot. The budding flight program of the Tuskegee Airmen received a boost when First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt inspected the program in March 1941 and flew with African American chief civilian instructor C. Alfred "Chief" Anderson who had been flying since 1929 and was responsible for training thousands of rookie pilots. Anderson took his prestigious passenger on a half-hour flight in a Piper J-3 Cub. After landing Mrs. Roosevelt cheerfully announced, "Well, you can fly all right!"

The subsequent brouhaha over the First Lady's flight had such an impact it is often mistakenly cited as the start of the Civilian Pilot Training Program at Tuskegee, even though the program had been going for nearly 5 months. Eleanor Roosevelt was a Trustee of the Rosenwald and helped secure the financing needed for construction of Moton Field in Tuskegee, Alabama.

The Tuskegee Airmen overcame segregation and prejudice to become one of the most highly respected fighter groups of World War II. The Tuskegee Airmen's achievements, together with the men and women who supported them, paved the way for full integration of the United States Military.
