





ROCKHOUNDING REPORT

Graves Mountain in Georgia

Graves Mountain is located in Lincolnton, Ga. I love this mine as there is so much potential to leave with gorgeous specimens. I also love breathing in the pine air. It is a large area to dig as you have the option to dig the top or the bottom of the mountain. I wear a brace and am able to get around, but it can be very dangerous if you are not paying attention. Take your time as you choose a spot to work.

What can you find there? Here's a quote from their website:

You should not miss any opportunity to collect here because the rutile, lazulite, and pyrophyllite are said to be some of the finest in the world. The collecting area at Graves is huge! There are three main rock types here: quartz-sericite schist, sericitekyanite-quartz rock (quartzite) and quartz conglomerate. You may still be able to collect rutile, kyanite, lazulite, iridescent hematite, pyrophyllite, pyrite, ilmenite, muscovite, fuchsite, barite, sulfur, blue quartz and quartz crystals with a hematite coating. Don't forget the micro phosphate and phosphosulfate minerals that can be collected here. Woodhouseite, variscite, strengite, phosphosiderite, cacoxenite, crandallite along with accessory quartz, pyrite, pyrophylite, dickite, jarosite and sulfur crystals.

I have found rutile and a lot of the quartz with the iridescent hematite coating. There are endless ways to find beauties here. After it rains, it's best to walk around and surface hunt. One can also bring a screen and shovel and sift through the dirt. Many people have found rutile this way. I found a piece of it by using chisels and breaking through the quartz. This is also how I find the channels of iridescent hematite that formed in the cracks of the quartz. I enjoy using the chisels and shovels to dig through these areas because you can also find pockets with beautiful crystal points. Once you see the

yellow ochre dirt start digging slowly as the beauties will be close to it.

I suggest bringing a hand truck or cart because it is a long walk from the parking area. Tools to consider would be a bucket, rock hammer, chisels, shovel, pry bar, flat head screw driver, head lamp (if you choose to go in caves), and paper towels to wrap your finds. The tools and all your finds will be heavy so sometimes I take multiple trips back to the truck. This is a very rustic environment. There is nothing except the mountain so you will need to bring your drinks and food with you. I suggest rain gear because every time I go there is at least one rain storm. A walking stick can help when you walk on the steep areas. There are porta potties but no running water, so I usually bring a big jug of water to wash off. I also suggest bringing a change of clothing and sturdy boots. If you dig the way I do you will be covered in a glittery rouge that your car might not enjoy. It is brutally hot in the summer. I wear a big straw hat and sunshirt. This greatly helps.

I suggest your first time digging here to either go with someone who has been before, or to go to one of the scheduled Rock Swap/Dig Dates. They tend to do one in the spring and one in the fall. It's a great way to learn from people who have been digging there for years. They also usually have motorized carts on those days to help people up and down the mountain.

What I usually do is grab one of my mining friends and call Norman Junior up to do a private dig. You need at least two people to do this. You will meet him, sign a waiver, and give a donation. You choose what you can afford. Here is his information:

Open shop for faceting will hopefully be starting up soon, so if you have completed your three stones in the faceting classes, you may sign up to use a machines once we have the times set up. This open shop is like all the others, you will be using our equipment, but you need to supply your own materials.


