



Students are responsible for providing their owns stones, and all students must bring an Optivisor, which may be purchased through Amazon or at Harbor Freight.





Please, please, please make sure that when you are using the using the cabbing machines to take care of them by sweeping the stone across the entire width of the wheel and not just one area. We have multiple wheels that have been worn only in the middle and the edges are basically brand new. This uneven wear is unnecessary if everyone takes his or her time and uses good techniques.



Also, when you're done with your stone, make sure you take the wax off the dopstick. Please don't just leave the waxed dops in the bin. Get them prepped for the next person to use. We also seem to have the dops walk away. Please do not take the club's dops home with you. You're welcome to bring your own.



IN CASE YOU MISSED IT

If you weren't there for the September members' meeting, you missed a presentation given by Lyra Solochek on two ways to help identify rocks: by testing the hardness of a rock using the Mohs' Hardness Scale, and by checking the Specific Gravity. Below are the handouts that might be helpful.


Identifying rocks: Mohs Hardness test

The Mohs Hardness Scale is a convenient way to help identify minerals. A mineral's hardness is a measure of its relative resistance to scratching, measured by scratching the mineral against another substance of known hardness on the Mohs Hardness Scale. This graphic outlines the index minerals and some common objects that are used to determine a mineral's hardness.

This method is especially useful for identifying minerals in the field because you can test minerals against some very common objects (fingernail, a penny, a nail).

The scale is named for its creator, the German geologist and mineralogist Friedrich Mohs.

Identifying rocks: Specific Gravity test

Specific gravity of rocks refers to the ratio of a rock's mass to the mass of an equal volume of water, essentially measuring how much denser a rock is compared to water. Different rocks have different specific gravity. (See chart below.)

Specific Gravity = (Weight of dry rock) / (Weight of rock suspended in water)

What you need: Paper/pen, calculator, mineral, string or paperclip, container of water, scale.

- 1. Weigh the specimen (dry) _____grams
- 2. Place water container on scale and zero it out
- 3. Suspend mineral in water without touching container, get weight. _____grams
- 4. Divide #1 with #2 = _____

Brad's Bench Tips



Tapered reamers

A tool you don't see often these days is a tapered reamer. It's not a tool you'll use everyday, but they're particularly useful for making an irregular hole round or for enlarging a hole to an exact diameter. For example, the small set in the yellow pouch is for holes in the range of 0.3mm to 2.5mm. They are great for sizing a tube to fit a hinge pin. Other times when I'm drilling a hole for riveting and can't find the exact size drill, I simply drill the holes with a slightly smaller bit and enlarge them with a reamer until the wire just fits.

For larger hole sizes in sheet metal up to 14 ga, I really like the reamer with the black handle. It makes quick work of sizing holes from about 3mm to 12mm. You can find them in well-equipped hardware stores.

You may never use the large diameter reamers, but when sawing out a ring from 4mm thick sheet, I found they worked well for rounding and sizing the hole.

It details 24 different techniques for adding texture to your jewelry and metal work without the need for heavy equipment like a mill. The techniques make use of more common tools and materials around the shop — like hammers, stamps, punches, and tool bits for the Dremel or Foredom.

- Description and pictures of the technique
- Procedures for creating the texture
- List of tools and supplies needed
- Options for modifying and personalizing

These methods are both useful and practical. I use them in my own work, and I teach them to others in classes and workshops. What's more is they're practical. None should put a dent in your budget.


