

A Taste of Metal Clay

Have you heard about metal clay? It is an exciting medium—almost magical—that turns malleable clay into precious metals. Finely ground metal mixed with an organic binder allows you to make deeply textured and easily formed jewelry pieces that can be torch or kiln fired. Metal clay pieces can also be combined with wire or sheet metal using traditional metal smithing techniques. It is very suitable for mixed media combining glass, ceramic, polymer clay and other materials.

If you've wanted to try it but do not want to commit to a six week class or just want to have a fun afternoon trying out a new craft, this class is for you! We will make earrings and pendants that we will torch fire and finish. You will have a lovely finished pair of earrings or a pendant to take home with you at the end of the afternoon.

Camp PMC 101 Certification Course

Have you wanted to explore the alchemy of Precious Metal Clay jewelry making? Do you want to improve your metal clay skills or join a welcoming and helpful online community of PMC students, artisans and instructors? How about discounts on future purchases of PMC products? Camp PMC 101 is a certification program designed for beginners as well as those with metal clay experience. Sponsored by Rio Grande and administered by Carrie Story of Clay Revolution and the Sawtooth School of Art, the program is designed to ensure quality metal clay education.

Students will learn all of the fundamental skills required to successfully work with PMC. You will learn which clays are better to use for specific projects as well as interesting new techniques.



Techniques taught include rolling, texturing, cutting, carving, sculpting, molding, refining, firing and polishing. Extra time is devoted to discussing firing processes and you will learn torch firing as well as kiln firing methods.

You will make 5 projects: a pair of earrings set with a stone that will be torch fired; a double textured pendant with syringe detail; wrapped beads; a sculpted toggle clasp; and a kiln fired by-pass ring with a set stone. Upon completion of the projects and a short multiple choice quiz, students will receive a Certificate of Completion from the Sawtooth School of Art and will be entitled to discounts on PMC products purchased from participating suppliers.

In the second class, you will learn how to make a simple bail as well as several options for setting glass in metal clay along with the firing schedules used for each type of setting. We will finish our pieces in the third session.

JUST A DROP

Hobby shops and model airplane stores carry small plastic dispenser bottles that are handy for putting a drop of flux, oil, or glue just where you want it. They have a length of small metal tubing coming out the top that lets you squeeze out very small drops.



I use one with a short length of tubing for oil when I'm sawing or when drilling harder metals like steel. Another bottle I found in a plastics store has a longer length of metal tubing on it. Plastics people use them for dispensing fast drying glues to join pieces of

acrylic. The long metal tube let's you reach into tight places. Either of these is handy for flux at the soldering station.

FOREDOM MAINTENANCE

If you have a Foredom flexshaft, it makes sense to check it over every so often to be sure it's running properly. But how to do that? You've probably lost the little booklet that came with the unit. Well, being the good company it is, Foredom has put together an extensive set of videos on how to everything.

The series covers set-up, lubrication, replacing a sheath, motor maintenance, and handpiece maintenance. Few if any special tools are needed. You can watch the videos at www.foredom.net/flexible-shaftmachinemaintenance.aspx particularly under "Foredom Basics" or the "Foredom Shafting..." categories.

OLD BUSINESS

Show Report

There are several vendors for which the club has show payments, but do not have contracts. Letters will go out from the president to these prospective show vendors requesting whether they want to participate in the show. The state of FL Department of Revenue does require the club to have a copy of all vendors' resale numbers. Out-of-state vendors will be given the FL form for state sales tax, and the FL Department of Revenue will work with the out-of-state vendors to pay FL sales tax. Plant City Police Department will be contacted to have the club's name on this account; and security has been confirmed.

Raffles will be reinstated for the fall show and this will be at the club table.

More rugs need to be purchased for the show to cover the floor and power chords, etc.

There are 160 vendor tables, thus far.

Club display cases will be out in the lobby of the Plant City venue.

Phil Stephenson will present on Saturday at 5:30 p.m. in the auditorium. Facebook ads will be placed about 6 weeks prior to show.

Mark Bartow is working on a new flyer that will be distributed via email.

The board does want a spring 2022 show, and the club will remain at the Plant City venue for the spring 2022 show.

For the fall 2022 show, however, the show may need to go to the state fairgrounds to accommodate the number of vendors. The fairgrounds venue has enough power "drop downs", but the tables and chairs will need to be rented from the fairgrounds venue. Fact-finding and cost analysis will be performed to compare the Plant City venue and the State Fairgrounds venue for the fall 2022 show.

Entered into executive session at 6:55 p.m.; exited executive session at 7:10 p.m.

Class Updates/Report

The clubhouse is getting busy with open shop time for all club classes. Club president is contacting another prospective course instructor that might fill some gaps in course offerings.
