We have been working through the electrical updates for a while, cleaning up around the clubhouse and working on painting the exterior. We have been fortunate to have members who do construction to help with some of it, an electrician who likes rocks and hired professionals as needed.

Now we are required to get the trees trimmed back from the clubhouse. Plus, the pumphouse has some shifted blocks that require attention and some roof repair.

Next is deciding what to do with the clubhouse floor. We are leaning toward pulling all the lino tiles and painting the floor like in the Metal Shop. For a long-term solution, this is the most cost effective.

as to what goes on. There are lots of decisions that happen to keep this clubhouse open.

Three-day intensive beginning cabbing workshop

9 a.m.-5 p.m. June 10, 11, 12 (Friday, Saturday, Sunday)

In this three-day workshop, we will teach you how to cut cabochons. We're taking our six-week course and packing it into three days.

The course will cover:

- Shop Safety
- Use of cabbing machines, trim saws
- Cabbing various shapes and their theories
- Proper use of grinding and polishing wheels
- Getting all the scratches out
- Polishing techniques
- Working various materials
- How to choose slabs
- How to create a cab that is easier to set or wrap
- And most of all, how to make a pretty shiny cab.

We will also show you how to use the Groove Wheel to put a channel around a cabochon and add a wire for a simple wrap (pictured at right).

BEGINNING WIRE WRAPPING

10 a.m. -1 p.m. Sunday, May 15

This beginner project is building a cage to hold a tumbled or odd-shaped stone. This class is designed for those who have never wire wrapped or want to strengthen their basic skills. You will learn how to straighten wire, bend, curl, create a bail, use of the tools, use of half-round wire, and adding your own flair to the finish of the top. In this kit for class, you will receive a full spool



of both wires so when you go home you can continue to practice. Kit will includes:

- 1 tumbled stone
- 1 spool of 22 gauge wire
- 1 spool of 21 gauge half-round wire

INTERMEDIATE WIRE WRAPPING

1-4 p.m. Sunday, May 15

This class is designed for those who have been wrapping and want to learn how to wrap a cabochon or other non-drilled stone. Skills gained in this class are designing and planning where the wires are going, how to measure the needed wire, planning where to put the half-round wire to hold it all together and finishing up a bail. Bring you own stones and sketch book. We will start with creating



it on paper and work to achieve it. If you do not have a stone, we will have stones available for purchase. Wire will be provided.

Cost for each class: \$40.

Brad's Bench Tips

Cutoff wheels

Cutoff wheels are inexpensive and do a great job cutting or shaping steel. You can use them to sharpen tool points, cut piano wire to length, make slots, and sharpen worn drills. Other uses include modifying pliers and making your own design stamps.

My preference is the one inch diameter size. Be sure to hold the wheel firmly so nothing moves to break the disk, and definitely wear your safety glasses. Those are little flakes of steel coming off the disk.

By the way, cutoff wheels are poor at soft metals like copper, silver and gold. Soft metals clog up the cutting edges.





Sanding disks

One of my favorite flexshaft tools that saves a lot of time is the snap-on sanding disk. I mainly use the medium and fine grits but sometimes like the very fine ones sold for working with platinum.

Ordinarily, you'd think of placing the disk on the mandrel with the grit side facing away from your hand, but notice that you end up with your elbow up in the air. Instead, try flipping the disk so that the grit side is toward your hand. It's a much more comfortable position because the elbow is down near my side, and it lets me hold the work up close where I have a better view of what I'm sanding.

I use these snap-on disks so frequently that I keep multiple mandrels with different grits already mounted in the bur stand. Some mandrels have the grit facing out and some facing in.

Easier prong setting

When setting stones in a prong mount, the tool is less likely to slip off the prong if you grind a groove into its face or rough up the face a bit with sandpaper. Some folks prefer a prong pusher for doing this, and others like a set of pliers. The easiest way to create a slot on the pusher is with a file, and the easiest way to create a slot on one jaw of your pliers is with a cutoff wheel. Then do a rough polish on the slot with a medium grit, knife-edge silicone wheel.
