I have come across some Gnome earring patterns. They're rather large, but you could make one and decide whether you want to make a second for earrings or make the first one a pendant. There won't really be one every month, I only have 6 patterns. They are approximately 2 ¼ inches across and 5 inches in length. January's Gnome will be for Valentine's Day. Future designs will be St. Patrick's Day, Easter, 4th of July (Patriotic), Halloween, and Christmas.

You'll need to know Brick Stitch and bring your own supplies. If you don't know Brick Stitch, call and we can set up a time for you to come and learn.

- Valentine Gnome Saturday Jan. 14 & 21 (12:30-3:30 p.m.) but if you can't make both of those, I'll be around on Thursday, Jan. 19 & 26 from 1-4 p.m.
- St. Patrick's Gnome Saturday Feb. 11 & 18 (12:30-3:30 p.m.)
 Table Crafts will be open on Feb. 23 from 1-4 p.m. if you need extra time
- Easter Gnome Saturday Mar. 11 & 18 (12:30-3:30 p.m.) Table Crafts will be open on Ma.r 16 & 23 from 1-4 p.m. if you need extra time.
- Patriotic Gnome Saturday May 13 & 20 (12:30-3:30 p.m.) Table Crafts will be open on May 18 & 25 from 1-4 p.m. if you need extra time. (This will get him done in time for Labor Day, 4th of July, and Labor Day)

- 11/0 Delicas in red, white, and beige (something you'd consider flesh color) 1 tube of each color. Available at bead stores or JoAnns, Michaels, and Hobby Lobby
- Beading thread of your choice.
 Fireline or Wildfire in either 4 or 6
 Ib. K.O. thread or Nymo also work well. (Note: K.O. or Nymo work best for fringe)
- Beading needle. Size 11 or 12
- Scissors or fish line cutter work well to cut your cord.

FIELD TRIP

Peace River Fossil Trip

The Peace River is one of the most well known rivers to find fossils in Florida. We will be meeting at the Zolfo Springs boat ramp off the Peace River. The boat ramp is located in a park where we can find an area to walk into the water to dig and sift for shark teeth and other fossils. If you have a boat (kayak, paddle board, etc.) you can bring it and buddy up with other members that would like to fossil down or up river from the boat ramp. One of the easier ways to find teeth in the Peace is to dig with a large shovel and sift, using a large sifter with pool noodles (or equivalent) to keep it afloat in the water. Camille, Steven, and Carlo will be there to help with sifting and help identify species of shark teeth and other various fossils you might find. Fossil hunting will take place until about 4 p.m.

IMPORTANT!

Fossil Permit: Any fossilized shark teeth can be kept without needing a fossil permit. However, all other fossils, including mammal bone, such as horse teeth, dugong/whale bone, etc., require a fossil permit to be collected. The fee is \$5 and may be applied for or renewed here: https://bit.ly/3iu762b

Please make sure to mail in your application before attending the trip. If not, you can still keep any and all shark teeth that you find.

Sifters:

We will have a few additional sifters available for use, but not many. Please consider making your own, you can use it sifting in the river, but also future trips at the beach as well. They are easy to make, and just require PVC pipe, 1/4-inch wire netting, some purple glue, zip ties and pool noodles. Your sifter should be large enough to hold a few scoops of material but comfortable enough to fit in your grasp. Here are a couple of video tutorials for making your own sifter:

What to bring:

- Swimsuits/swim shorts / waders (if you have them)
- Long sleeve sun shirt
- Sunscreen
- Water booties (water shoes, something to protect your feet)
- Brimmed hat
- Sunglasses
- Bug spray
- Lots of drinking water
- Lunch and snacks
- Beach towel/blanket
- Sifter (if you have one)
- Shovel/scoop such as a large garden shovel, a long handle sifter shovel
- Bag/jar to house your prized finds while in the water

 e.g., a mesh bag
 with a clip on it that you can attach to clothing/hands free
- Backpack/something to easily carry belongings to meet up point down and back up the beach.
 A beach wagon is also an option, but it can be difficult to maneuver down the beach if loaded down.
- Optional: snorkel, mask, fins, wetsuit

Brad's Bench Tips

Cutting a bolt

Whenever you have to cut a threaded bolt shorter, it's often difficult to get the nut to thread back onto it. And the smaller the bolt, the more difficult it is to restore any distorted threads. The problem is easily solved with the use of a nut. Here's how I do it.

First, screw a nut onto the bolt before cutting it. Grip the bolt by the threaded section that is to be sawed off. Then saw the bolt to the desired length, taper the end with sandpaper or file, and unscrew the nut from the bolt.

Unscrewing the nut over the freshly cut end of the bolt will straighten out any damage that sawing and filing did to the threads. Gripping the bolt by the piece to be sawed off localizes any crushing damage to the piece that will be thrown away.



Depth gauge for drilling

Sometimes you need to drill a number of holes all to the same depth. One quick and easy way to do this is to wind some tape around the drill bit so that the tape just touches the part surface when the hole is deep enough.

You can set the depth either by measuring from the tip of the drill to the tape or by drilling to the correct depth, leaving the bit in the hole, and wrapping tape around the bit at the surface level

Note that a little extra tape left free on the end will blow away debris from the drilling.

It details 24 different techniques for adding texture to your jewelry and metal work without the need for heavy equipment like a mill. The techniques make use of more common tools and materials around the shop — like hammers, stamps, punches, and tool bits for the Dremel or Foredom. Each technique is explained in detail with:

- Description and pictures of the technique
- Procedures for creating the texture
- List of tools and supplies needed
- Options for modifying and personalizing

These methods are both useful and practical. I use them in my own work, and I teach them to others in classes and workshops. What's more is they're practical. None should put a dent in your budget.

First payment for the Spring Show has been made. Check was made and voided for the faceting cabinets, and vendor was paid by credit card. Tracking everyone that is paying for the upcoming April classes.

We have volunteers for most all the days signing up. Once this weekend is over phone calls will be made to encourage volunteers


