The magic of faceting

I recently attended the Franklin (N.C.) Faceting Symposium where fellow faceters gathered to share techniques, ideas and fellowship in a three-day event hosted by the United States Faceting Guild. Seminar topics included cutting soft stones, gemstone photography, fantasy cutting, metal and copper laps, machine maintenance, Gem Cut Studio and much more. This free event takes place in Franklin the last w



more. This free event takes place in Franklin the last week of July every year. Pencil it in your calendar for 2026! It's well worth going.

Not familiar with faceting? Here's some information on a lapidary art form experiencing renewed interested across the country.

What is faceting?

Faceting refers art of cutting and shaping a gemstone with flat surfaces called "facets," and polishing each of these to maximize the light refraction and reflection within the stone to create brilliance, sparkle and visual appeal.



What materials can you cut?

You can facet just about anything, but to get the brilliance of a traditional gemstone, the stone should be translucent with minimal inclusions. Precious and semi-precious stones — garnets, aquamarines, emerald, rubies, sapphires, topaz and tourmaline — are commonly used in jewelry. Quartz varieties (amethyst, citrine, smoky) are also popular, and great for beginners as the cost of the rough is relatively low. Diamonds are also faceted, but requires specialized

equipment to cut.

Glass is a great beginners' material. It comes in many colors and is fairly easy to facet. I keep jars of glass marbles around to use when testing new designs and to practice before cutting more expensive material.

Synthetics are lab-grown material that can have the same properties as a real gemstones. Corundum, spinel, morganite, alexandrite and emeralds are some examples. Don't let the crazy chemistry-lab terminology of some materials scare you away — LuAg, YAg, etc. I love cutting synthetics, as you don't have to worry about imperfections and inclusions. The results are very satisfying. If you're cutting for a competition (USFG has annual contests), I recommend using synthetics.

Who should try it? How do I get started?

This form of lapidary art seems to appeal to technically minded people, as math and science come into play. But fear not. Even if you're not a "math person," you can still enjoy the process. There are designs available online to follow, and there's even a CAD program called Gem Cut Studio that could create or optimize a design. That said, faceting isn't for everyone. You must be patient and have an eye for details.

Faceting machines and laps can be pricey, so it might be challenging to get started. But you're in luck. Our Club has a fantastic faceting course, using four Ultra-Tec machines (gold standard for faceting machines). You may learn the process without having to pay thousands of dollars to get started.


Introducing a new lapidary instructor

Brad's Bench Tips

Drilling a stone

One of the things my students often ask to do is drill a hole through a piece of gemstone. The usual thought is to get a diamond drill, but I've been disappointed with them. I think the reason is that the tip of the drill is just pivoting in the hole and fails to cut well. When it looks like the drill isn't cutting, the tendency is to push with more force. The drill gets hot, and the diamond grit falls off.

A much better approach is to use a core drill. This is a small hollow tube with a coating of diamond grit at the business end. The diamonds easily carve out a circular arc without undue pressure or heat buildup.

Core drills are readily available from lapidary and jewelry supply companies. They come in sizes as small as 1mm and are very reasonable in price. For instance, a 2mm diameter drill is about \$6.

Chuck the core drill in a drill press, Dremel or Foredom and be sure to keep the drilling zone wet to cool the tool and to flush out debris. Also, if you're drilling a through hole, ease up on the pressure as the drill is about to cut through. Otherwise you may chip off some of the stone surface around the hole.



"24 Easy Metal Textures" - With No Rolling Mill Required

It details 24 different techniques for adding texture to your jewelry and metal work without the need for heavy equipment like a mill. The techniques make use of more tools and materials around the shop — like hammers, stamps, punches and tool bits for the Dremel or Foredom.

Each technique is explained in detail with:

- Description and pictures of the technique
- Procedures for creating the texture
- List of tools and supplies needed
- Options for modifying and personalizing

These methods are both useful and practical. I use them in my own work, and I teach them to others in classes and workshops. What's more is they're practical. None should put a dent in your budget.

TBMSC Board Meeting Minutes

August 4, 2025

Present: Ellen Sisco, Lyra Solochek, Christy Gorrow, Greig Lundergan, Carlo Lucin, Brenda Gregory, Patti Kepple Call in: Kathy Reid, Linda Collins, Cindy Britten, Miles Bhave Call to Order: 6:30 p.m.

1. Approval of Minutes from July meeting

Motion to approve by Brenda Gregory. Seconded by Carlo Lucin. All approve.

2. Treasurer's Report - Linda Collins

Deposits are coming in for the November show. Also deposits from the June tailgate.

- No insurance payment this month. New policy starts September and October. Discount available if paid in full instead of in installments.
- Looked into investing \$10,000 into a CD or Money Market: Bank of America only allows \$20,000 and up: 5% for \$20K and up for 6 months. Linda will continue to research other banks and options.
- Move to approve Treasurer's Report by Christy Gorrow, seconded by Patti Kepple. All approve

3. Show updates

- Ellen Sisco, regarding Hart Gem Show. Spoke to Russell Hart. We had told him we needed something in writing within 30 days, but otherwise, we're backing away. He says he will pursue doing a show regardless of our involvement.
- Greig Lundergan, update on November show: About 10 booths left for vendors. Discussion on where to put the demo table and class table. Some prefer front near club table. Others prefer back. How to get more members to demo during show? Final payment to the fairgrounds due Aug. 15.

4. Old Business

- Construction update Ellen Sisco. Got some information about removing concrete in the back since it currently is a hazard. Demolition estimate \$2,000. Idea proposed to put both handicap parking in the front instead of the back, and make the front entrance the ramped entrance. Will research more about ADA requirements.
- Evaluating various flooring alternatives. Received one estimate for an epoxy flooring, which will be \$6,500-\$7,000 per 1,000 square feet. Drawback: everything must be moved out, all old flooring must be removed. Luxury Vinyl Planks could be an alternative.
- Other renovation work: Itemized estimate received from a contractor. Ellen Sisco will email quote to board members.
- New fire extinguishers have been purchased for the metal clay area and the casting shed. They need to be mounted on the wall before we call fire marshal for annual inspection.

5. Department Updates


