



### ***Pastor Joel's New Year Reflection***

As the new year begins, I believe there is value in pausing for a moment—remembering who we are, where we have come from, and what has carried us this far. At the same time, we ask an important question: **Where is the Spirit leading us next?**

In February, I will celebrate my 3rd anniversary as your pastor. As I begin my 4th year among you, my overriding feeling is one of *great joy*. I feel fortunate to be here. You welcomed me warmly, and together we have grown in faith and ministry.

Serving St. Paul's and St. Peter's is a gift—and each church brings its own unique character. St. Paul's is clearly the more "town" church, while St. Peter's is the "country" sibling. Both congregations have seen seasons when pews were fuller. Both have deep roots in both the Reformed and Lutheran traditions. While Sunday attendance is similar at both places, there are more children at St. Peter's, and St. Paul's is especially strong in mission outreach. St. Paul's has its famous dart team; St. Peter's remembers a championship baseball team with pride. Quilting—past or present—has held both congregations together. And St. Paul's tradition of baking pies and making sandwiches is something to behold!

Woven through all these experiences—past and present—is our God who journeys with us, renews us, and invites us forward. St. Peter's is blessed by Ellen Erb, whose tireless work has shaped a very special music program. St. Paul's is equally fortunate to have Mindy Does who has grown a meaningful mission ministry. The blessings these women bring give us the strength to take on the challenges we face!

A common trait both congregations share is the presence of families who have been part of these churches for generations. Think of the baptisms, confirmations, meals, music, and celebrations hosted in these sacred spaces. So much life has passed through these doors.

Along with joy, there have also been hard seasons. Over the decades, people have experienced loss, hurt, and challenge. In times of personal and community tragedy, the churches have stood as places of strength and compassion. And now, shifting attendance patterns, financial pressures, and the uncertainties of our time rattle us.

Another commonality is the way people serve. Many have come early to unlock the doors or stayed late to wash the last dish. Many have prayed faithfully, loved generously, and offered their time, energy, and resources. Hundreds of people, across many decades, have kept our ministries alive.

So where do we go from here?

Churches change very slowly. Nothing happens overnight, so we need to be thinking 2, 3, 4, 10 years into the future. I believe the next few years will require courage and strength—perhaps more than we have ever had to exert. While I love serving here, have no desire to leave, and know you are glad for my presence, this wonderful match does not mean we can rest on our laurels.

I sense the Spirit calling us into an uncertain future. At times, the road ahead seems steep and shadowed. Do we have the energy to climb it? Will new families and children join us in carrying the load? Will we have the resources to maintain buildings that are aging and becoming more expensive to care for?

I believe both congregations are relatively healthy and stable, which makes *now* the right time to engage in difficult conversations about what comes next. Do we forge ahead as we are? Close one church and move into the second? Merge and rebuild? I served churches where the same conversation was repeated year after year with no action, and frustration grew. People leave over inaction as much as they leave because they feel the church went in the wrong direction. I pray that in 2026 we cultivate a spirit of kindness and generosity, especially when we disagree. Whatever direction we choose, we choose it *together*.

We need to commit to one another. We need to wrestle with difficult questions—not settling for simplistic answers or avoiding them altogether—while still maintaining a spirit of love and compassion. I pray we honor the histories and traditions that shaped us, even as we remain open to the fresh stirrings of the Spirit.

I'd be lying if I said all of this doesn't make me anxious. Philippians 4:13 is a favorite verse for many: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." I believe it is even truer when we say, "**we** can do all things through Christ who strengthens **us**."

Even if these conversations about our future make me pause, I wholeheartedly believe God has called me here to walk with you—and to help lead us faithfully in conversations and decisions we might prefer to avoid.

Together, with the courage of the Holy Spirit and God's unending grace, we will move forward.

## North Street Mission Wooster, Ohio

**Volunteer Projects:** We will begin each morning by serving breakfast to the homeless at our host location. Each day following breakfast, we will work with one of several community organizations such as People to People Ministries (local food pantry), Salvation Army, Boys and Girls Club, Habitat for Humanity, Community Gardens, Every Women's House (domestic violence shelter), Friendship Meals, and the Wilderness Center among other possibilities.


