

Summertime is upon us, and I don't feel like writing an article. I am at the point in my work/rest cycle where I am looking forward to the rest (article written on or about June 13, 2025). And, the truth be known, I have never enjoyed writing. Of all the things that fall under the category of difficult work, writing would be at the top for me. Yes, I write a sermon every week, but writing to speak is different than writing for someone to read.

Okay, I'll get off the pitty-pot and get to it. For my summer respite this year, I am taking a completely different approach than I normally do. My preferred way to get away is to find some place I want to go, rent a house or room in the area, and then go. I travel there, unpack, plop myself down, and let the rest begin. I sleep in, do as little as possible, play as much golf as I can, and take naps daily. After a week or two, I pack up and go home. I find having a week or two to do absolutely nothing in a location away from home incredibly relaxing.

This year I'm going to be a "road warrior." I am taking a road trip out to Denver, Colorado, with four stops along the way. Beginning on Sunday, June 29, my first stop is the Chautauqua Institute outside of Jamestown, NY, for a week of lectures, concerts, and relaxing. From there I will go to see several friends and family across the country...following the Benjamin Franklin "fish rule" ...I'm staying less than 3 days at each place.

Last year I began thinking about people who are priorities in my life. Do I let them know how much their friendship, love, support, and kindness has meant or means to me? Do I put in the time to maintain the relationship, and do I make the effort to be with them? As a single man, I recognize that I have some advantages. I have a lot of freedom. As a result, I decided to go see my loved ones.

One of my important people is rather unique. Some of you know that I have been in a meaningful mentor/mentee, pastor/parishioner, father/son, relationship with a man who has been incarcerated for 19 years, almost to the day. I met him when I was a campus minister, and he was a student at Montana State who had been arrested. At the time of our first meeting, he was in jail for murder. Subsequently he accepted a plea agreement and is now serving a 135-year sentence. He will be eligible for parole in 2037 after serving over 30 years. His name is Branden Miller.

During the first two years of his incarceration he was in the county jail in Bozeman, I visited him every two weeks. After his conviction, he was placed in the Department of Corrections which separated us by several hundred miles, making my visits less frequent. When I moved to New Jersey, our visits were reduced to periodic "face-time visits" through the prison phone system. I have not seen him face to face for 14 years.

From his prison, he can call me on the phone, but I can never call him. For as long as he has been incarcerated, he has called me about every two weeks. We talk for up to an hour. After almost 20 years, we've become very close, and his relationship is important to me. In the past, though, there was always a reason for me to not go and see him. It is too easy to not do something. Last summer I said, "enough! I'm going to go see Branden." For the past year, I have been working on my 2025 itinerary, and I will see Branden face to face in the prison where he is incarcerated on July 11 and 12.

Along with seeing Branden, I will stop and see two of my brothers, one in Michigan and the other in Indiana, and two very good friends (men who are like brothers) with one in Kansas City, MO, and the other in Denver, CO.

Regardless of whether you travel or not, I pray you all have a good summer. Get out and do something in the warm winds. If you travel, I pray traveling mercies for you. If you have visitors to your home, I pray for your patience and that you know it is a gift to others when you share a warm welcome to those you receive.

See you in worship...or on the road.

Take Advantage of QCD – A Benefit for Donors over 70 ½ -years-old

If you give to the church, are over the age of 70 ½, and have a traditional, rollover, or inherited IRA (individual retirement account), you can benefit from a Qualified Charitable Distribution, or QCD. Essentially, you can send money directly from your IRA to the church, and you can reduce the amount of your taxable income by the amount of the donation. There is a limit on the gift size of \$108,000 per individual or \$216,000 per married couple, so please be aware of that (haha!) Regardless of the size of your donation, any gift will reduce the amount of taxes you pay. If you do meet the above requirements, I would strongly encourage you take advantage of this policy and ask your accountant or financial planner to set up such a transaction.
