

A Note From Trailblazer's Executive Director

Hello Trailblazers!

I trust you have enjoyed a wonderful summer and beautiful autumn. The leaves have turned amazing and brilliant hues of yellow, orange, gold, and red here in Colorado. It warms my heart to watch the transformation of nature and the cycle of life it takes from a colorful spring, through summer, to an autumnal paintbrush of color, signifying a respite is coming.

Although deciduous trees may be barren and stark, life remains safely inside their trunks to wait for the dawn of the next season. As nature can show us, we too can take a respite from the busyness of our lives and find joy in the warmth of the sun or the quiet change taking place around us, and prepare ourselves for a fresh start in the new year.

In this newsletter I have shared testimonials from some of our beneficiaries about how Trailblazer's efforts have impacted their lives. I thought you might enjoy reading their stories. Your warm support brought smiles to their faces and cultivated confidence in having a better life.

As we move into winter we are wrapping up the goals we made for 2025. Those goals were to:

- distribute 300 of water filters, but our team actually installed 400
- drill 70 wells, but due to the heavy flooding this fall, the team was able to drill only 58
- construct 50 latrines, however we did not receive enough donations to make that happen. We managed to get 32 latrines constructed

The agriculture team met their goals and conducted:

- 16 integrated farming system trainings with a total of 236 participants
- 14 homestead garden trainings with a total of 236 participants
- 12 fertilizer and pesticide application techniques trainings with a total of 226 participants
- one compost training with a total of 18 participants
- one chicken raising course with a total of 18 participants, and
- visited 48 farmers to monitor their economic progress

The team provided 28 Village Fund refresher courses, and made Village Fund introductions with 8 villages.

In 2026 you can continue to make a significant impact and transform lives. Your support means the world to us and to the recipients. We deeply thank you for your ongoing interest to improve health and reduce poverty in the lives of villagers in rural Cambodia. Our work is only possible because of your compassion and giving. Health Program

Better Overall Health



In 2024, Trailblazer installed latrines in Stueng Village, Bakong Commune, Prasat Bakong District, Siem Reap Province. The beneficiary families, identified as poor by the government and selected by the village committee, received support through this initiative. To ensure proper use and hygiene, our Health Program team conducted 'Hygiene and Latrine Use Training' for the recipients. Among those who benefited was Ms. Kimhouy and her family.

Ms. Kimhouy says that before having a latrine, her family lived in conditions where open defecation or shared, unhygienic facilities were the only options. She said:

My family was forced to dig holes in the fields to defecate, but during the rainy season it was very difficult. The lack of proper sanitation led to unpleasant odors, environmental pollution, and a lack of privacy. During the rainy season, the situation worsened, with waterborne diseases spreading easily. Women and children, in particular, faced safety concerns when relieving themselves at night or in remote areas. Without a proper latrine, my family suffered frequent health issues such as diarrhea, typhoid, and other sanitation-related illnesses. The medical expenses for treating these illnesses were a financial burden, reducing the family's ability to save or invest in education and other needs. Children often missed school due to sickness, and adults lost workdays, further affecting their economic stability.

After receiving a latrine, there was a significant improvement in our hygiene and sanitation situation. My family had a clean and private space for sanitation, reducing the spread of diseases. Fewer medical expenses meant the family could allocate money to other important areas, such as education and nutrition. Personal dignity and comfort also improved, especially for women and girls.

Now, the family experiences better overall health, leading to improved productivity at work and school. The surroundings are cleaner, and there is a noticeable reduction in the presence

of flies and bad odors. The family feels safer and more comfortable, and their quality of life has significantly improved. Additionally, there is a sense of pride in having a hygienic home environment, which positively impacts their social standing within the community.

Ms. Kimhouy expresses her deep gratitude to Trailblazer and its Health Project for providing her family with a latrine. This essential facility has significantly improved their health, hygiene, and overall comfort, making daily life much easier and safer.

Food Security Program

Sustainable Farming (Trailblazer's Integrated Farming System)

A few years ago, Trailblazer organized an agricultural training course on the Integrated Farming System in Rom Deng Village. This training is aimed to help local farmers improve their livelihoods by using sustainable farming methods.

Mr. Chhon was one of the beneficiaries of this training. A recent interview was conducted with him and his family to understand how the training has impacted his family's life and farming practices.

Before receiving the agricultural training, Mr. Chhon worked as a construction worker. He did not have enough knowledge or skills in farming, and his family mostly depended on unstable daily wages. They faced difficulties in earning enough income and had limited access to homegrown food.

Mr. Chhon's family experienced both economic and health challenges. With little income, they could not afford to buy enough nutritious food or take care of health needs properly. Their living conditions were modest, and they often struggled to meet daily expenses.

After completing the Integrated Farming System training, Mr. Chhon began applying what he learned. He started planting many types of vegetables and raising chickens and ducks around his house. These changes greatly improved his family's income and food security. Now, he can harvest and sell vegetables and poultry, earning around 2,000,000 Riel [\$500USD] per month. This is quite a substantial amount when you see that the average annual salary for a farmer in Cambodia is 13,079,500 Riel [\$3,270USD]. It is clear that Trailblazer's Integrated Farming System training is working and helping to reduce poverty and hunger.

Mr. Chhon proudly shared how his life has changed. His home garden is now filled with various crops and livestock, providing a stable source of food and income. His family eats more nutritious meals, and they are no longer dependent on outside work. He is also more confident and proud of being a farmer.

Thanks to the support and training from Trailblazer, Mr. Chhon's family now enjoys a better quality of life. The Integrated Farming System has not only increased their income but also strengthened their health and self-reliance. Mr. Chhon expressed deep gratitude for the opportunity to learn and grow through this meaningful agriculture project.

Economic Development Program

Real and Lasting Benefits

In 2022, the Trailblazer Foundation established the Village Fund project in Ta Koy Village. This community-led micro-finance initiative was created to provide low-interest loans to poor families, helping them improve their livelihoods and break the cycle of poverty.

Among the beneficiary families was Ms. Seuom's. Recently a Trailblazer team member had the opportunity to meet with her and conduct a short interview to better understand how the loan affected her family's daily life and economic situation.

Ms. Seuom reported:

Before receiving a loan, our family lived in very basic conditions. We didn't have enough income to meet our daily needs. I used to borrow money from neighbors or informal lenders, often at high interest rates. Sometimes we sold household items or small livestock just to buy food or pay for school fees.

Our financial situation was very unstable. We often didn't have enough food, and we couldn't afford to buy quality seeds or tools to grow crops. When someone got sick, we struggled to pay for treatment. My children missed school at times because we couldn't pay for their supplies or transport. It was a very hard time.



Economic Development (continued)

After receiving the loan, I used the money to invest in small-scale farming and raise chickens. We were able to grow more vegetables and earn extra income by selling the surplus at the market. I also used part of the money to support my children's schooling. Now, we have a more regular source of income and don't need to borrow from private lenders.

Life is much better now. We can afford daily food and school materials. My children go to school more regularly, and we worry less about emergencies. Our family feels more secure, and we have hope for the future. I am truly thankful to the Trailblazer Foundation and the village fund for giving us this opportunity to grow.

Ms. Seuom's story reflects the real and lasting benefits of the Village Fund project. Access to small, low-interest loans has enabled her family to improve their economic situation, support their children's education, and live with greater stability and dignity. The project demonstrates how local financial empowerment can transform lives in rural communities.

Education Program Breaking the Cycle



Trailblazer Foundation's educational projects aim to provide primary education as a foundation for higher education, a key strategy in breaking the cycle of generational poverty.

Educational Initiatives

Trailblazer's initial project in 2004 was building a government school. Since then, they've expanded their reach with the generous contributions of donors and have constructed a total of 12 government schools to date, and three libraries.

School Construction and Operation

Process: Each school is built in response to a request from the government's Integrated Workshop process

Ownership Transfer: Upon completion and during the inauguration ceremony, Trailblazer signs the school deed over to the appropriate government agency

Government Responsibility: The government then becomes responsible for providing the teaching staff and the Cambodian curriculum

Food Security Integration: Since each becomes a public school, it qualifies for food support through the United Nations World Food Program, helping to address the programmatic area of food security

Reducing Barriers to Access: To ensure students can reach schools that may be shared between villages, particularly at the Junior and Senior High School levels, Trailblazer provides bicycles to partner villages. This intervention directly addresses the barrier of distance, which would otherwise cause many students to drop out.
