Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ at Bethlehem,

I promised last month to continue the adventures encountered by a mission

team that I was a part of in my last call at Christus Lutheran in Camden. We had loaded up the church van and taken our Vacation Bible School on the road to West Virginia. As I wrote last month, we at Christus, were an urban congregation, inner-city folks, traveling to meet what we imagined as country folk in the hills of West Virginia. What else was in store, we had no idea. *Go, and I will show you*, God said to Abraham in Genesis, Chapter 12. We went with a sense of adventure to a place we did not know, well one that we'd only discovered by searching the ELCA directory for West Virginia congregations. One could hardly think of that as a Holy Spirit led process, but nevertheless, we set out trusting God.

The VBS was fun, and we enjoyed working together with people who we'd just met to accomplish that part of the mission. However, it became clear in the end, God had much more in mind than we could imagine. Every evening we returned to the youth camp that had become our temporary home for dinner, sharing and prayer. On the last night, one church family that our adult leader, Yvette, had really connected with, asked if they could join us for our final evening song and prayer. Sure, we invited them to dinner too.

As we gathered after dinner, we set out all our remaining candles in a glass plate in the center of the group: white, purple, and red. Youth hurried to light this unusual mix of leftovers for the opening song. At a time of sharing, our visiting mom surprisingly revealed that she had moved her family from Camden, our home, to West Virginia 10 years earlier. Wow, what a coincidence, no wonder she felt a connection to us! The mood quickly changed as she told why. She had moved after her oldest son had been killed on a drug corner. Grieved, she couldn't bear to remain in Camden, neither would she have chanced similarly losing other children.

What corner was she referring to? The corner of 26th and River, one block from our church and very near where Yvette had raised her family.

Unbelievable coincidence? Keep reading. Many tears, songs, prayers for healing and a lot of hugs

later, we glanced down at the candles around which we'd gathered that evening. Over the hours, they had melted into many multicolored swirling rivers, solidifying around the edges into something altogether new, leaving in the center, a still warm and malleable heart shaped puddle of wax. What did our youth see in that puddle of wax? They saw the heart of Christ. A heart poured out, melting us down and bringing us all together, under the most unlikely of circumstances, with a plan that only God could imagine – for healing. All we had to do was go.

Now, I must tell you that in my experience, we don't often get to see that clearly what God is up to with our efforts at mission. Sometimes, they feel even clumsy, almost always out of our comfort zones. Most of the time, God works in ways hidden. But God is always there working.

Where is God sending you/us? Can you/we give it a try, sort of like an adventure? Maybe that's starting a new ministry, participating in bible study, becoming a member of the Friday night soup kitchen team, or in little ways sharing the great things Jesus has done for you so that others might know him and be called into his mission to heal the world. May you be open to whatever God puts on your heart. Let's also support and keep our Bethlehem youth in prayer as they prepare for next summer's mission trip to West Virginia.

I'll close as I did last month. Where is God sending you? Is there anything unfamiliar, uncomfortable or even awkward about God's call that gives you hesitancy? Can you give it a try anyway, sort of like an adventure? God said to Joshua as he set out to enter the promised land. Be strong and very courageous. I'll go with you wherever you go. I believe in that promise.

October 8, 2018

Pastor Carol provided a brief update regarding the beginning processes of the 2019 narrative budget process that will be put together for a presentation to the council.

Bethlehem is in full planning and preparation mode for the Thanksgiving Interfaith Service that we are hosting on November 18th. Margaret Drafall is seeking the assistance of pie bakers, greeters, kitchen help, ushers, set-up, tear-down, and everything else needed to host this event.

Cindy Lange provided a very comprehensive policy and procedure for Church use and possible rentals of the church and facilities. The council adopted the proposal, and additional info is available from the church office.

Pledge Sunday will be held 11/18/18.

The council also agreed to implement the Tithe.ly app from ELCA as a giving option on a 12-month trial basis beginning in November.

Color Space Consulting will be assisting with social media/website for our Christmas season invitational process. This contracted service will include / social media/ marketing material, design, invitations, banners, etc. set-up along with some training.

Our Special Congregational Meeting held on September 30, 2018, had a motion made to borrow from the endowment fund to finance up to the \$80,000 needed to move forward with the project of the fire safety improvements bringing the building into code compliance for the issues found during the 2016 fire inspection. Discussion followed the motion and the motion passed with 69 yes votes and five no votes.

Once the Congregation had voted to approve, Barkley met with the architect to discuss moving forward with this project. The architect is comfortable with either of the contractors. The council then approved accepting the bid provided from Shales McNutt to complete the work. Barkley mentioned that he would look into a grant or other potential project funding opportunities.

LIGHTING UP THE FRONT WALK

After many, many years of darkness on the front steps, Bethlehem requested a proposal from a local lighting contractor to replace the six fixtures with new LED fixtures. Due to the age of the current wiring of the existing lights, new wiring will be installed as well as a new underground box for the main feed. Existing lights and wiring will be

removed and replaced.



We hope to have the project completed by mid-November for the Interfaith Thanksgiving service. The new lights will provide light

and safety for our visitors as they enter the church.

Property Trust has approved this project at a cost of \$6,500. Three members have pledged an amount of \$1,500 for the project. The lighting contractor has also given us three months to pay for it.
